
The project was carefully planned and the execution thereof has taken staff from the Division: Strategic Communication and the Department of Information and Communication Technology Services (ICT) several months to complete.

[Dealing with] welcoming students with disabilities in higher education

I envisage a future filled with opportunities and possibilities for persons with disabilities, but enabling students with disabilities to participate on an equal footing with their peers and taking their rightful place in society is no easy task. 99

According to recent research published by our Department of Industrial Psychology, persons with disabilities are accommodated and tolerated in the workplace, but rarely embraced and welcomed. It is our duty as Institutions of Higher Education to ensure that all our students have a sense of belonging at our tertiary institutions.

During the September break, the first Higher Education Disability Services Association (HEDSA) symposium was hosted on our Main Campus and tertiary institutions from across South Africa came together to discuss new beginnings and new directions, setting standards and working together.

The accommodation of persons with disabilities has to be an institutional process and not the work of a few motivated, passionate individuals manning a support programme.

Revising our perceptions and attitudes is the first step in accommodating students who present themselves, learn or perform in ways that are different from others. It is vital to remember that their similarities with other students are much more significant: we are first and foremost dealing with students.

Each student with a disability has very specific needs and because of an inaccessible society has previously been marginalised. The aim is to enable the student to reach his/her full potential and not to provide an unfair advantage to students

with disabilities over non-disabled students.

Any assistance rendered or advice given should be in consultation with all role players concerned. Individualised interventions and accommodations are provided following input from the particular student and other parties involved. The specialised services offered by a support team must be utilised within the framework of all parties involved taking responsibility for their involvement.

The international guidelines from the United Nations Convention on the rights of Persons with Disabilities and our own Constitution promoting Human Rights are available for guidance in the absence of a dedicated South African law protecting the rights of persons with disabilities. Tertiary institutions also need to acknowledge the importance of content regarding disability within different curriculums. The general public needs to be exposed to the issues pertaining persons with disabilities on a much wider and more extensive scale. This will also assist to create a greater awareness and sensitivity amongst non-disabled people.

Chemistry brings dti awards home

he research group of Prof. André Roodt, Head of our Department of Chemistry, won the first prize in the category development of small medium and micro enterprises (SMME) at the annual Department of Trade and Industry's (dti) award ceremony. Prof. André received the prize for the hitech project Development of novel nuclear pharmaceuticals in the Technology and Human Resources for Industry Programme (THRIP).

The dti Deputy Minister Bongi Maria Ntuli and Director-General Tshediso Matona presented the prize at the gala dinner held at Gallagher Estate, Gauteng.

The dti's Annual Technology Awards recognise excellence in research and aim to raise awareness on the benefits of using technology to improve the competitiveness of enterprises in the local and global arena. Individuals and organisations are recognised for their efforts in advancing and promoting technology interests and emerging enterprises.

Prof. André, also vice-president of the

European Crystallographic Association, who has just returned from a series of lectures abroad after being elected Fellow of the Royal Society of Chemistry in the UK, received funding in excess of R3 million over the past two years to set up a specialised laboratory for synthesising active compounds. The research aims to produce new nuclear medicinal agents for the early diagnosis of cancer, heart and brain

defects, and even HIV/ Aids.

Two doctorate students, Alice Brink and Marietjie Schutte, are actively involved in this project. They are the recipients of prestige scholarships introduced by our Rector and Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Jonathan Jansen, under the UFS Research Initiative (the Advanced Biomolecular Systems Cluster) to complete their Ph.D. studies. - Supplied

Dr Khotso Mokhele: An ambassador for African science

ur university's new Chancellor, Dr Khotso Mokhele, has been instrumental in the reentry of South Africa into the international science community as an ambassador for South African and African science.

He represented the country on the Executive Board of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation (UNESCO) and also, more recently, as Vice-President for Scientific Planning and Review of the International Council for Science (ICSU) 2005-2008.

He was honoured with the Legion of Honour (Chevalier) by the President of the Republic of France in recognition of his personal efforts in strengthening scientific ties between France and South Africa, a National Science and Technology Forum Award.

Dr Khotso's vision and actions have been guided by his deep conviction that a truly democratic society will only emerge in South Africa when all people are empowered to be its architects, advocating unhindered access to education to create a critical mass of experts in the fields upon which our economy is built.

As President and Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of firstly, the Foundation of Research Development (FRD) 1996-1999 and later, Founder President and CEO of the National Research Foundation (NRF) 1999-2006, this philosophy had a great impact on the strategic direction and success of the national research development.

He cites his role in the transformation of the FRD and his ability to drive adherence to stringent

quality criteria – linked to international benchmarking - to ensure that South African science can compete with the best in the world, as a personal career highlight. His vision has driven the quest to turn myopic, local research questions into research questions of international interest.

Dr Khotso was part of the task team that drafted the Green Paper for Science and Technology and was founder President of the Academy of Science of South Africa (ASSAf). He was appointed by the Minister of Science and Technology as a member of the National Advisory Council, on Innovation (NACI), by the Minister of Labour as Chairperson of the National Skills Authority and served as Chairperson of the Economic Advisory Council advising the Premier of the Free State Province. He was appointed a member of the first Council for Higher Education (CHE) and served on the councils of a number of universities, most recently the International Advisory Board of our university (2009-2013).

His strong leadership qualities and stature as a strategic thinker have also been recognised by the private sector and he currently serves as Chairperson of the Board of Impala Platinum Holdings (Implats) and on the boards of major listed companies Adcock Ingram Holdings, African Oxygen Ltd (Afrox), Zimbabwe Platinum Holdings and Tiger Brands Ltd.

He has received numerous awards for outstanding contributions to science, research and innovation that included a Lifetime Achievement Technology Top 100 award for his vision and major contribution in securing the Southern

African Large Telescope, constructed outside Sutherland in the Northern Cape; as well as Honorary Doctorates from the Universities of Stellenbosch, the Witwatersrand, the Free State, the Western Cape, and Fort Hare, and from these former Technikons: the Free State, Pretoria and Port Elizabeth; and Rutgers University in New Jersey, USA.

Dr Khotso was born and bred in Bloemfontein. After matriculating at Moroka High School, Thaba N'chu, in the Free State, he went on to study at the University of Fort Hare in Alice, Eastern Cape, where he graduated with a BSc (Agriculture), winning the Massey-Ferguson award for the best student in that field.

As a recipient of the prestigious Fulbright-Hays Scholarship, he entered the University of California, Davis, USA where he obtained an MSc (Food Science) and a PhD (Microbiology). Subsequently, he was awarded post-doctoral fellowships at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine in Baltimore, Maryland where he worked in the laboratory of Nobel Prize winner Dr Hamilton O Smith – and at the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine in Philadelphia, both in the USA. He also completed the Stanford Executive Programme at Stanford University, California, USA.

He returned to South Africa in 1987 and held teaching and research positions at the University of Fort Hare and the University of Cape Town. He has a number of publications to his credit.

UFS Postgraduate School a first for South Africa

stablishing the very first Postgraduate
School in South Africa could be a
daunting task and a big challenge.
However, Prof. Neil Roos, a respected
academic and scholar, will be responsible
for seeing to see to it that the Postgraduate
School in our Directorate Research
Development is successfully realised.

He is not afraid to take on a challenge, and besides his passion for the academe, he also loves to take on the cold waters of the Atlantic Ocean, participating in one of the

most challenging swim events in South Africa, between Robben Island and Blouberg Bay. And as if this 7,5 kms were not tough enough, next year he intends to undertake for a student charity, a double crossing, swimming from Blouberg to Robben Island and back. *Leonie Bolleurs* spoke to him to find out more about his vision for the Postgraduate School.

According to Prof. Neil, the establishment of the school, which is part of Rector Jonathan Jansen's Academic Turnaround Strategy, will bring strategic advancement to the South African higher

education arena.

Nationally a number of postgraduate centres are emerging, organised largely on an administrative level. "At this university we will not establish another centre; we will establish the first Postgraduate School. Our focus will not only be on the administrative function, but we will in the first instance concentrate on the academic function. Amongst others, this will differentiate us from other postgraduate centra," said Prof. Neil.

The school, which will cater specifically for the administration, development and advancement of postgraduate students and postgraduate studies at our university, was approved by management this year. In line with trends elsewhere, one of the goals of the school is to build a strong and coherent postgraduate student community with high and consistent standards and expectations of postgraduate teaching, research and administration across the seven faculties.

Another important strategic objective of the Postgraduate School is to improve the research outputs among postgraduate students. The school will also play a vital role in increasing the postgraduate student population by, for

instance, recruiting students from other countries on the continent. This will not only enhance our university's efforts to position itself continentally; it will also increase and enrich our intellectual diversity on campus.

"When the school is established, we must, however, ensure that it does not become a blunt instrument, imposing uniform structures across the whole university. Different faculties and even departments will have different needs with regard to the school. I am consulting with, amongst others, the deans and postgraduate students to get a sense of their diverse needs. We are not trying for a fit somewhere in the middle, but for a structure that will respond boldly and specifically to the needs of specific constituencies and students," Prof. Neil said.

It is envisaged that the school will be launched early next year. It could contribute to position our university among the leading universities on the continent and, in the course of time, in the competitive rankings among world universities.

Prof. Neil, the Director of the Postgraduate Support Office, will join our ranks on a full-time basis as from 1 December 2010.

Education leads the way in **diversity training**

Our Faculty of Education proved their seriousness about transformation at our university by becoming the first among our seven faculties to introduce diversity training as a compulsory part of their academic programme for first-year students. This is the initiative of Prof. Dennis Francis, our Dean of the Faculty of Education.

The faculty presented a Diversity and Learning programme, which consists of two phases. In the first phase a workshop based on anti-oppressive education was presented for a group of 493 first-year students as part of the broader transformation agenda of our university.

The training was presented by Shikaya, a non-profit organisation. Ten experienced teachers who have been participating in Shikaya's Facing the Past programme facilitated this workshop. The workshop afforded the students an opportunity to explore issues of identity, choices, human behaviour and integration in schools.

In the second phase of the programme, our students were transported to various schools in the Bloemfontein area that are representative of the broader South African school context.

Taylor, -made

hen you hear the word "patent", it is difficult not to imagine the gadget man Q in all the James Bond movies. Pens that can kill. Cars that can fly. Something that changes the world after you've plugged it in ... If that were your thoughts exactly, then you and I have a lot to learn!

At the beginning of 2009, our university appointed Dr Glen Taylor as the Director of the Office for Innovation and Business Development. Not that Dr Taylor was a stranger on campus. About a decade ago, he lectured Animal Science at Kovsies! Did the vast flat Free State call him back?

"No!" he laughs. "I never thought I'd ever cross the Orange River again. Not many people would leave George for Bloemfontein, would they? So, no, it wasn't the surrounds. It was the opportunity at Kovsies that made me come back."

Before he returned to the Free State, Dr Taylor was the former Head of our Department of Agricultural Management and Manager of research, technology and innovation activities at the George Campus of the Nelson Mandela Metropolitan University. While he was down there, he developed unique bio-diesel processing units for a couple of farmers in the Swellendam area.

However, now he is re-settled in Bloemfontein and the driving force behind many special projects at Kovsies. The purpose of the Office of Research Commercialisation and Business Development is to optimise the commercialisation of innovation and intellectual property at our university.

According to Dr Taylor, the core function of this office is to establish a sustainable third stream of income from intellectual property in order to diversify the funding base of the university. In essence, the office is responsible for the facilitation

of technology transfer, which also means adding value to the intellectual property of Kovsies that is generally not the Q-type of gadgets! It is mostly in the biotechnology field.

Over the past year and a half, they have

Over the past year and a half, they have dealt with about 16 patents generated by many different departments on campus, from the medical faculty through to the humanities. Some of the groundbreaking patents include a possible cancer treatment and there is something in the pipeline from sport science that will be music to all women's ears. Lecturers changing their blackboards for Blackboard

n June 2009 an executive decision was made to acquire Blackboard 9.0 as the official Learning Management System of our university. The system was first implemented in 2009 as a pilot project involving only 10 projects across five of the faculties on campus prior to going live in January 2010.

By October 2010 our university was running at full capacity with 1 586 modules being accessed by 22 640 students and 638 lecturers.

According to Tiana van der Merwe from the Centre for Higher Education Studies and Development, this

strategic decision to implement Blackboard is aligned with our university's commitment to excellence in teaching and learning and was supported by our Vice-rector: Teaching and Learning. Various resources and tactics were deployed in the implementation of the new LMS.

"Firstly, design teams, consisting of learning designers and developers were appointed to support academic staff in the design and development of learning materials and resources on the new learning platform. The designers' role was not restricted to the design and development of learning materials, but also to act as agents of change within faculties – promoting the effective use of the Blackboard in teaching and learning, while the developers did the behind the scenes work.

"Secondly, training of academic and support staff on the new LMS

is a crucial factor in the successful implementation of any LMS. Our university's workshops did not solely focus on the "how to?" in the use of tools, but emphasis was also placed on teaching and learning, and how tools could support classroom practices and problems.

An initiative was launched to award academics for innovative use of technology in the classroom. During an annual E-learning showcase day, academic staff was given the opportunity to show how they had used Blackboard in their teaching and learning while competing for the E-learning award. This recognition for the innovative use of technology had provided a platform for academics to learn from one another and share best practices, and thus built their own community of practice," she said.

Overcoming plagiarism was recognised as a global issue for academic institutions and our university was no exception. Subsequently, our university developed an official protocol and policy for the lecturers – how to detect plagiarism and what to do when you detect it in an assignment? This has proved to be an excellent selling point to lecturers to get them to embrace Blackboard by using Safe Assign in the detection of plagiarism.

"Although the first university to adopt Blackboard 9.0, the other four largest universities in South Africa are now following suit. The uptake of Blackboard as well as the system's stability have impressed academics and top management so much, that in October 2010 approval was obtained to expand Blackboard functionalities by upgrading to Blackboard 9.1 as well as acquiring both the Blackboard Community and Blackboard Content system, with implementation in 2011," Tiana said.

Sarietjie Musgrave van ons Suidkampus is betrokke by verskeie ICTISE (ICT Innovation in School Education)projekte in samewerking met die Provinsiale Departement van Onderwys en ons Fakulteit Opvoedkunde. Een van hierdie projekte is die Children who Care-projek.

Die projek fokus op skole in die Bloemfontein-omgewing, waar navorsing gedoen word oor die behoeftes van weerlose kinders wat die skole bywoon. "Dit is 'n projek waar kinders oor kinders

navorsing doen," sê Sarietjie.
'n Gemengde en uiteenlopende groep kinders, onder meer leerlinge van dr. Blok Sekondêr, Heatherdale Sekondêr, St. Bernards Hoërskool en Lereko Sekondêr is tans betrokke by die projek. Die betrokke kinders ontvang via Skype opleiding van 'n oud-Kovsie en medewerker van Sarietjie, dr. Hellmuth Weich afkomstig van die Demontfort Universiteit in die Verenigde Koninkryke.

Hierdie inisiatief was in meer as een opsig voordelig vir beide onderwysers, wat ook opleiding ontvang het om die projekte te bestuur, sowel as die groep kinders wat die navorsing gedoen het. Van die hoogtepunte van hierdie projek was dat interaksie oor grense plaasgevind het. "Van

Omdat baie van die kinders in die skole baie weerloos is, was dit makliker vir hulle om hulle gevoelens met ander kinders te kinders wat hierdie projek gelei het, was ook dan voortdurend in kontak met maatskaplike werkers oor die spesifieke behoeftes van die kinders wat hulle gesien het. Gevolglik is daar van hierdie geleentheid gebruik gemaak om ondersteuningsisteme in skole te vestig en volgens Sarietjie het die skole meer begin bewus raak van hul eie leerders se omstandighede en het hulle ook daarby

Die projek is ingeskryf vir die SA Innovative Teachers Forum waar die groep die eerste plek behaal het. Hierdie prestasie het die groep deelname aan die Africa Innovative Teachers Forum verleen wat in Kenia aangebied is

Tydens die kompetisie het hulle 'n algehele tweede plek behaal. Later vanjaar sal

aan die World Wide Innovative Teachers Forum deelneem wat in Kaapstad aangebied word, waar hulle onder die 450 onderwysers van reg oor die wêreld gaan wees wat deelneem.

ICT Services set precedent with implementation of ImageNow Software

he smoother and quicker running of administrative processes at our university these days can be attributed by and large to the diligent work of ICT Services over the last three years. The ImageNow software system has been successfully incorporated into existing systems at our university with overwhelmingly positive results. In addition to these positive factors already evident on campus, the speed and innovation of implementation has been locally and internationally acclaimed including praise from the developer of the software itself.

With student numbers continually rising at the university, administrative services had been placed under pressure due to the increased paper load involved in the old systems. This in turn lead to massive paper trails en build-up that slowed student services processes as well as decreased administration staff productivity. Recognising these warning signs a team from ICT services started with research in 2006 to select an Enterprise Management System (ECM) product. They decided on ImageNow from Perceptive Software that creates a central, searchable database of electronic documents.

Since implementing the system and integrating it with existing ones, many visible positive changes have become apparent as well as scope for broader applications in the future. A special unit tasked to work with ImageNow. A team is now scanning thousands of documents and organising it within the database. As a result a 35% increase in productivity of all-ready completed work has been established due to the quick access to documents that can be obtained now using the software. Other benefits include

increased security and confidentially due to different levels of access to documents that can be authorized for different entities depending on the data requested. Importantly the decreased reliance on paper as well as being cost effective is significantly more environmentally friendly. Above all, the minimal training involved in getting to grips with the program and the ease of operation has made it a big hit with staff already using in on a day to day basis.

The wider applications of the ImageNow software are limitless according to Michael van Rooyen and Jan-Hendrik Serfontein from ICT Services, who were both involved in getting the new system off the ground. An example of the positive impact that the quick and easy access to documents can hold, is one that is already up and running in the libraray where students can access all previous exam papers available for a subject by simply typing in the module name.

All the good work has not gone unnoticed, with both national and international companies knocking on the door of ICT Services for advice on implementing the software, which is a trend followed by most of the major universities in

South Africa. The developers of the software have come to see our university as a model and a benchmark for quick and efficient implementation and integration of the system, to such an extent that licensing fees involved have already been decreased significantly. - Christiaan van der Merwe.






