GENERAL INFORMATION

1. General Rules

The 2022 General Rules for Undergraduate Qualifications, Postgraduate Diplomas, Bachelor Honours Degrees, Master's Degrees, Doctoral Degrees, Higher Doctorates, Honorary Degrees, and the Convocation (General Rules) of the University of the Free State (UFS) apply to all students and faculties, and hence to the Degrees, Diplomas, and Higher Certificate programmes of the Faculty of Theology and Religion. These rules deal with issues such as the admission requirements of the UFS, registration as a student, recognition of prior learning (RPL), progression and articulation, requirements for passing, examinations, etc.

It is the responsibility of students to acquaint themselves with all the General Rules relevant to their studies.

2. Faculty Rules

The 2022 Faculty Rules supplement the 2022 General Rules. Should a faculty rule contradict a general rule, the general rule will apply.

The curriculum rules in the Rule Book of the Faculty of Theology and Religion applicable during a student's year of first registration will remain valid for the duration of their studies for that particular qualification.

It is the responsibility of students to acquaint themselves with all the Faculty Rules relevant to their studies.

3. Admission through Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL)

A person who does not qualify for admission to an academic qualification can, in accordance with the following guidelines, apply for admission in terms of a process of RPL:

- (i) A person in possession of an NSC (as from 2008) or a School-leaving Certificate (prior to 2008), with at least five (5) years' applicable work experience, including formal and non-formal learning.
- (ii) A person who is forty-five (45) years old or older, with more than fifteen (15) years' applicable work experience, including formal and non-formal learning, regardless of whether he/she has a Senior Certificate or not, can apply for RPL.

4. National Benchmark Test

Taking the NBT test is not required for admission to the Higher Certificate in Theology.

However, it is compulsory for students who are registering for a first-time Bachelor's Degree to write the National Benchmark Test (NBT) prior to the registration period in January each year, i.e. in the previous year. Students in the Faculty of Theology and Religion write only the Academic Literacy Test. Visit the NBT website at www.nbt.ac.za or contact the university's NBT office (051 401 2448/nbt@ufs.ac.za) for more information.

Students who have not obtained a proficiency score of 64% or did not write the NBT, must register for the Foundational Provisional module in either Afrikaans (AGAH1508) or English (EALH1508) in addition to

the minimum credit requirement to complete the degree. It is the responsibility of students to consider the module and venue timetable to avoid timetable clashes.

Students who have already completed a qualification at this or another institution of higher education are exempted from writing the NBT test and from registering for EALH1508/AGAH1508.

5. UFSS1504/UFSS1522

UFSS1504 is a compulsory 16-credit year module for all students registering for the Bachelor of Divinity at the UFS. Students registering for the second year of the Bachelor of Divinity Extended Curriculum Programme, who have passed SCLL1508 in their first year of registration, will receive recognition for the first semester of UFSS1504 (UFSS1512), and therefore register for UFSS1522, a compulsory eight-credit module. No qualification can be obtained from the UFS if this module has not been completed successfully. It is the responsibility of students to consider the module and venue timetable to avoid timetable clashes.

The following students are exempted from registering for UFSS1504/UFSS1522:

- Students who have already completed a degree or diploma at this or another accredited institution of higher education.
- Students who are 30 years or older in the year of registration.
- Students who are working full-time and studying part-time.
- Students studying for the Higher Certificate in Theology.
- However, should these students progress to the Bachelor of Divinity Degree, they will be expected to register for UFSS1504 in the first year of study.
- Should they progress to the Bachelor of Divinity Extended Curriculum Programme, they will be expected to register for UFSS1522 in the second year (second semester) of the Bachelor of Divinity Extended Curriculum Programme after they have completed SCLL1508 in the first year of study.

6. CSIL1511/CSIL1561

The CSIL1511 module (Computer Literacy) is compulsory for all students registering for a first qualification in the Faculty of Theology at the UFS.

The following students may apply for exemption from CSIL1511:

- Students who have already completed a higher education qualification.
- Students who have passed Computer Studies in the Senior Certificate examination with a D (Higher Grade) or C (Standard Grade).
- Students who have passed Computer Application Technology (CAT) at a performance Level 5 (60%) in the National Senior Certificate.

8. Student Academic Records

A student may access study records and other documents that are not required for official purposes and are therefore not issued on a UFS letterhead, are not signed or do not bear the UFS's stamp, via the student portal at <http://kovsielife.ufs.ac.za>.

A predetermined number of copies of the student's academic record are issued annually to the student free of charge. Any further academic record of the student will only be issued to the student upon payment of the required fees.

Official academic records, transcripts and/or certificates of conduct will only be issued to students when the overdue amounts on their accounts are less than two thousand rands (R2 000).

9. COVID19

To facilitate the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic and adhere to the lockdown regulations, curricula delivery and assessment methods for both undergraduate and postgraduate qualifications may be changed at short notice to online delivery and continuous assessments through Blackboard as the official online learning management system of the UFS.

10. Undergraduate Assessment Rules⁵

10.1 A student is not entitled to any exceptions or concessions if she/he has erred in respect of the examination timetable and/or the scheduled test timetable, or the submission of assignments or research essays.

10.2 Admission to the examination

To gain admission to the examination in a module, a student must

- (i) obtain a minimum module mark of 40%; and
- (ii) meet all the prescribed subminimum and assignment requirements and must have participated in all the scheduled assessments as set out in the relevant module guide.

10.3 Examinations

Two examinations are scheduled per semester:

FIRST SEMESTER	SECOND SEMESTER
Main mid-year examination	Main end-of-year examination
Additional mid-year examination	Additional end-of-year examination

Once admission to the examination has been granted, participation in the main examination is compulsory.

A student who gained admission to the main examination may apply (on the prescribed form⁶ and within the period allowed) for admission to the additional examination when:

- (i) he/she is unable to take part in the main examination due to justified extraordinary circumstances;
or
- (ii) he/she wishes to improve the final mark, provided that at least 60% has been obtained in the main examination.

10.4 Pass requirements

To pass a module, a final combined mark of at least 50% must be obtained, provided that:

- (i) a subminimum module mark of at least 40% be taken into account; and
- (ii) a subminimum of at least 40% is obtained in the examination.

10.5 Passing with distinction

To pass a module with distinction, a student must obtain a final combined mark of at least 75%.

11. Undergraduate Progression Rules

A student who has already registered twice for a particular module and who still fails to comply with the pass requirements will only be granted one (1) further opportunity to re-register for the module based on exceptional merit – with the approval of the dean of the faculty in which the module is offered, on the recommendation of the academic head of department and/or the programme director and with written notification to the Registrar.

In the case of a service module, both the deans of the faculties involved must approve.

Failing a module for the third time will lead to academic exclusion.

In addition to the regulation above, students must take note of the progression rules applicable to their specific qualification as set out in the General Rules of the UFS as well as the Rule Book of the Faculty of Theology and Religion.

11.1 Progression rules of the Higher Certificate in Theology

To be re-admitted to the Higher Certificate in Theology (one-year qualification), a student:

- (i) after one year of study, must have passed at least 66 (50%) credits of the total credits for the specific curriculum (132); and
- (ii) after two years of study, must have passed all the required credits for the qualification (132).

If a student received an exemption from registration for a specific module/s, the progression rule formula will be adapted by the faculty and the student will be informed of the progression requirements that she/he must meet.

10.2 Progression rules of the Advanced Diploma in Theology

Students are expected to complete the diploma in two years.

Based on exceptional merit, a student who has not yet completed the qualification after two years may be admitted for one additional year. Such admission is subject to the Dean's approval on recommendation of the Programme Director, with written notification to the Registrar.

11.3 Progression rules of the Bachelor of Divinity:

To be re-admitted to the Bachelor of Divinity (four-year qualification), a student:

- (i) after one year of study, must have passed at least 94 credits of the total minimum required credits for the specific curriculum (564);
- (ii) after two years of study, must have passed at least 188 credits of the total minimum required credits for the specific curriculum (564);
- (iii) after three years of study, must have passed at least 282 credits of the total minimum required credits for the specific curriculum (564);
- (iv) after four years of study, must have passed at least 376 credits of the total minimum required credits for the specific curriculum (564);
- (v) after five years of study, must have passed at least 470 credits of the total minimum required credits for the specific curriculum (564); and
- (vi) after six years of study, must have passed the minimum required credits for the qualification (564).

11.4 Progression rules of the Bachelor of Divinity Extended Curriculum Programme:

To be re-admitted to the Bachelor of Divinity Extended Curriculum Programme (five-year qualification), a student:

- (i) after one year of study, must have passed at least 94 credits of the total minimum required credits for the specific curriculum (660);
- (ii) after two years of study, must have passed at least 188 credits of the total minimum required credits for the specific curriculum (660);
- (iii) after three years of study, must have passed at least 282 credits of the total minimum required credits for the specific curriculum (660);
- (iv) after four years of study, must have passed at least 376 credits of the total minimum required credits for the specific curriculum (660);
- (v) after five years of study, must have passed at least 470 credits of the total minimum required credits for the specific curriculum (660);
- (vi) after six years of study, must have passed at least 566 credits of the total minimum required credits for the qualification (660); and
- (vii) after seven years of study, must have passed the minimum required credits for the qualification (660).

If a student received an exemption from registration for a specific module/s, the progression rule formula will be adapted by the faculty and the student will be informed of the progression requirements that she/he must meet.

11.5 A student who has failed a single module in her/his final academic semester and who – upon completion of the main mid-year or main end-of-year examination or the additional mid-year or additional end-of-year examination – must prolong her/his studies to obtain the qualification subsequent to failing a single module during one of the above-mentioned examinations, automatically qualifies for a special examination which normally takes place before the commencement of the next semester.

11.6 NQF Levels:

A student will not be allowed to register for a module in a subject field at NQF Level 7 if the student still has a module outstanding at NQF Level 5 for that same subject field.

12. Research reports, mini-dissertations, dissertations, and theses

12.1 General guidelines for the scope of research are:

Research report	10 000 words
Mini-dissertation or one publishable manuscript/published article	20 000-30 000 words
Dissertation or three interrelated publishable manuscripts/published articles	30 000-50 000 words
Thesis or five interrelated publishable manuscripts/published articles	70 000-100 000 words

12.2 Title registration⁷

It is compulsory for students who are doing a dissertation or a thesis to submit a research proposal (title registration) on the prescribed form (L5 research proposal: <https://www.ufs.ac.za/theology/faculty-of-theology-home/academic-information/postgraduate-studies-in-theology>) for approval by the faculty board within six months after first registration in the case of research Master's dissertations and one year in the case of Doctoral theses.

12.3 Notice of submission

About three months before the student submits the research for assessment, the 'Notice of Submission' form must be downloaded from the UFS website, completed, signed, and sent to the supervisor.

12.4 Submission

No modifications may normally be made to a registered title simultaneously with the submission of the research for assessment (a research dissertation, thesis or interrelated, publishable manuscripts/published articles) and before faculty board approval has been obtained.

Submission of a dissertation/thesis can take place throughout the year, but to receive the degree during a particular graduation ceremony, the research must be submitted at least four months before the specific ceremony.

To plan for graduation at a specific ceremony, the following guidelines can be followed regarding deadlines for the notice of submission:

- (i) before or on the last working day of September of the preceding year to graduate during the April graduation ceremony; or
- (ii) before or on the first working day of April to graduate during the December graduation ceremony.

⁷ Not applicable to mini-dissertations

On completion of the dissertation, the student should submit the final document:

- (i) on or before the last working day of November of the preceding year to graduate during the April graduation ceremony; or
- (ii) on or before the last working day of July to graduate during the December graduation ceremony.

However, due to problems/issues regarding the research, it is possible that the student will only receive the qualification during the next graduation ceremony and will be required to register for the following semester/academic year. Should a student be required to register, tuition fees will also be charged.

The dissertation/thesis can be submitted at the Student Service Centre in the George du Toit Administration Building.

13. Graduation

Information regarding your graduation will be communicated via SMS to the cellphone number registered on the UFS database. It is the student's responsibility to make sure that his/her data is correct.

CAREER GUIDANCE

The Bachelor of Divinity's primary focus is to provide in-depth training and skills development for a career in professional Christian ministry. However, the degree can be structured to open alternative postgraduate studies and career possibilities.

PROFESSIONAL MINISTRY

If you are training to become a minister (priest/pastor/reverend) in a professional ministry, the Faculty of Theology and Religion highly recommends choosing your electives to study Biblical Hebrew and Biblical Greek, the original languages of the Old Testament and New Testament. Knowing these ancient languages in which the Bible was written, will empower you with valuable and scarce skills that will dramatically enhance your ability to interpret Scriptures. These modules are indicated in the curriculum section of the Bachelor of Divinity.

We request that you contact the relevant representative of the training body of your denomination at the **beginning** of your studies to enquire about screening and/or selection procedures, as well as specific study requirements, e.g. Greek and Hebrew.

ALTERNATIVE POSTGRADUATE STUDIES AND CAREER PATHS

While completing the Bachelor of Divinity degree, you must choose electives for a total of 128 credits. If you do not have specific church requirements, you can consider choosing modules that can open alternative postgraduate studies and career possibilities.

COMMUNICATION

Consider modules in communication science. It can strengthen your communication skills as a church leader and open corporate career opportunities upon completing a postgraduate degree like the Bachelor of Arts Honours in Communication Science with specialisation in Leadership Communication.

To qualify for admission to this degree, you need a completed degree with a minimum average of 65% at the highest NQF Exit Level 7 and Communication Science modules at the first-, second- and third-year level. Admission to the programme is subject to selection and additional admission assessment may be required.

BUSINESS MANAGEMENT

If you have entrepreneurial and business skills, you can consider choosing modules in business management. Business management skills will enhance your congregational leadership skills and give you access to postgraduate qualifications like the Bachelor of Commerce Honours with specialisation in Business Management that can open alternative career opportunities.

To qualify for admission to this degree, you need to register for at least six undergraduate business management modules (64 credits at NQF Level 5 and/or NQF Level 6; and 32 credits at NQF Level 7) with an average mark of at least 60%, but not less than 55% in each module. Admission to the programme is subject to departmental selection.

The Higher Certificate in Theology provides general and basic introductory knowledge in the study of Christian ministry. It includes training in appropriate skills designed to empower Christian leaders to make a meaningful impact on communities and the development of churches.

The qualification also serves to provide students with the basic introductory knowledge, cognitive and conceptual tools, and practical techniques for further higher education studies in Theology.

The Higher Certificate in Theology is offered on the Bloemfontein Campus.

Admission

To be admitted to the Higher Certificate in Theology, a student must have:

The Bachelor of Divinity is a professional Bachelor's Degree designed in consultation with Christian churches. It offers a comprehensive and thorough theological-critical and disciplinary grounding in the knowledge, theory, principles, and skills required by and of the ministerial profession, as well as high independence and development in research capacity. The programme is therefore recognised by churches, associations, and societies. It develops graduates to demonstrate meaningful initiatives and responsibilities in a professional context.

Admission

To be admitted to the Bachelor of Divinity, a student must have:

Information

The Postgraduate Diploma in Theology is multi-disciplinary and serves to develop the student's knowledge in theology, with a high degree of focus on contextual interaction and ministerial skills. The qualification requires students to be actively involved in a faith community to compile a ministry portfolio as part of compulsory practical experience and engagement under the guidance of a ministerial mentor.

Admission

Students with previous theological training are welcome to apply for admission to sharpen ministry skills, as well as students from other disciplinary fields interested in entering ministry or strengthening ministerial leadership positions in the church.

To be admitted to the Postgraduate Diploma in Theology, a student must have:

- (i) a Bachelor's Degree (NQF Exit Level 7); or
- (ii) an Advanced Diploma in Theology (NQF Exit Level 7).

Progression.

Students who completed undergraduate studies in theology will be allowed access to a Master's Degree in Theology upon completion of the Postgraduate Diploma in Theology if the student complies with the admission requirements of the Master's Degree as set out in the Rule Book of the Faculty of Theology and Religion.

Students who are new to the field of theology may, upon completion of the Postgraduate Diploma of Theology, apply for access to a Bachelor of Theology Honours Degree or a structured Master of Theology. Evaluation of the application will consider previous research exposure as well as departmental selection criteria as set out in the Rule Book of the Faculty of Theology and Religion.

Curriculum

The Bachelor of Theology Honours is a postgraduate specialisation programme. It serves to consolidate and expand the student's expertise in a particular theological discipline and to develop her/his research capacity in the methodology, theory, and techniques of the particular discipline. This qualification demands a high level of theoretical engagement and intellectual independence and includes supervised research.

Admission

To be admitted to the Bachelor of Theology Honours, a student must have:

- (i) a professional Bachelor of Divinity Degree (NQF Exit Level 8); or
- (ii) a Postgraduate Diploma in Theology (NQF Exit Level 8); or
- (iii) a Bachelor of Theology or Bachelor of Administration (Theology) Degree (NQF Exit Level 7); or
- (iv) an Advanced Diploma in Theology (NQF Exit Level 7); or
- (v) an equivalent qualification (NQF Exit Level 7).

The Master of Divinity Degree is a Master's Degree by coursework and a mini-dissertation. This Master's Degree maintains a high level of proficiency, offering specialised training in theological disciplines to integrating theological insights in further preparation for professional ministry. It is structured as a coursework programme and a research project, culminating in the writing of a mini-dissertation. This programme will enable students to deal critically with complex issues both systematically and creatively within an academic and vocational context.

Admission

To be admitted to the Master of Divinity, a student must have:

- (i) a professional Bachelor of Divinity or Bachelor of Theology Degree at NQF Level 8; or a Postgraduate Diploma in Theology at NQF Exit Level 8; or a Bachelor of Theology Honours Degree at NQF Exit Level 8; or a cognate equivalent qualification exiting at NQF Level 8; **and**
- (ii) have obtained an average of at least 60% in the field(s) in which he/she wishes to specialise; or have obtained a weighted average of at least 60%; **and**
- (iii) have completed or will enrol for a module in Theological Research Methodology (or equivalent) at NQF Level 8 or higher.

Progression

The degree exposes the student to self-direction and originality in tackling and solving problems in the chosen field of speciality in terms of in-depth theoretical engagement and intellectual independence. This will enable students to deal critically with complex issues, both systematically and creatively, within professional and academic contexts. The degree prepares graduates for specialised professional employment and continued study.

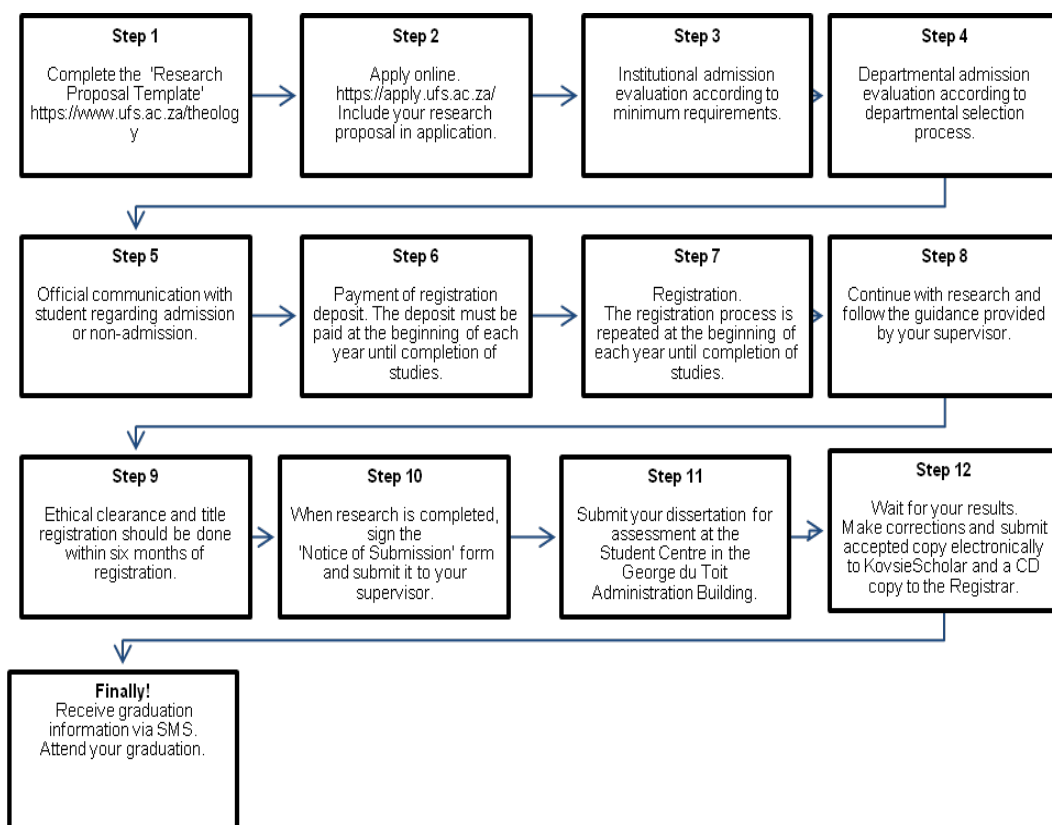

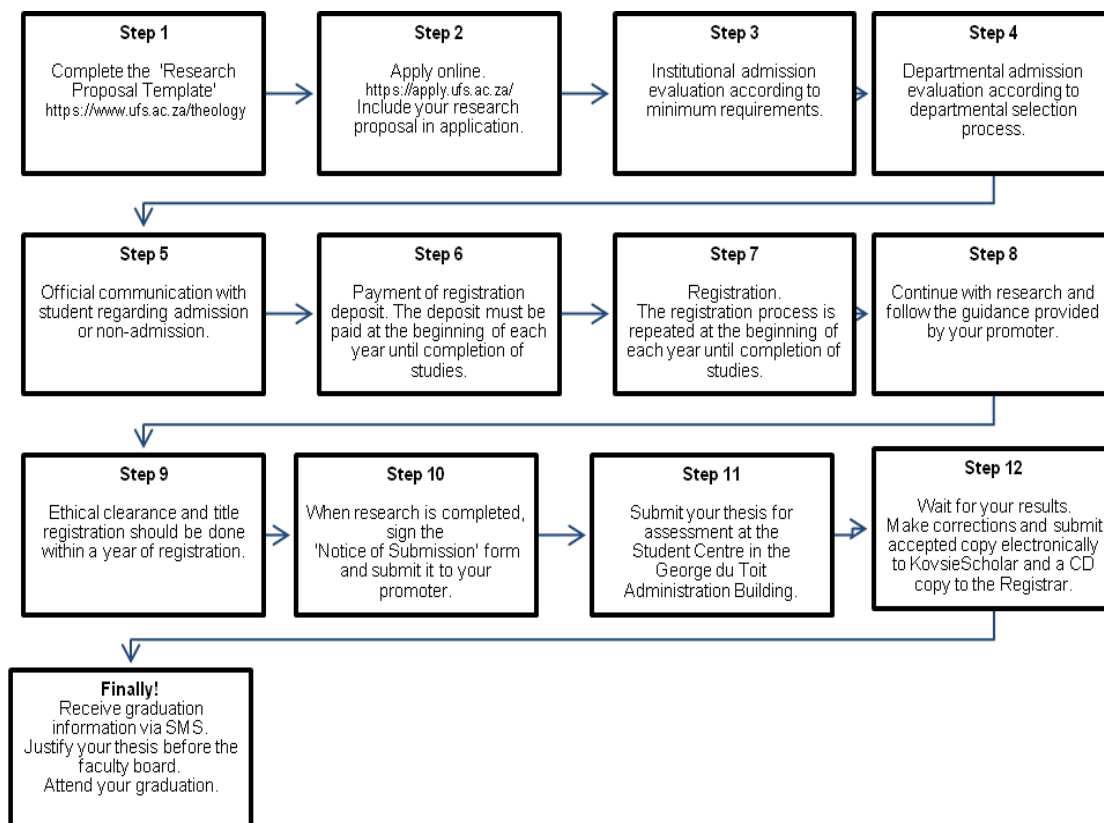

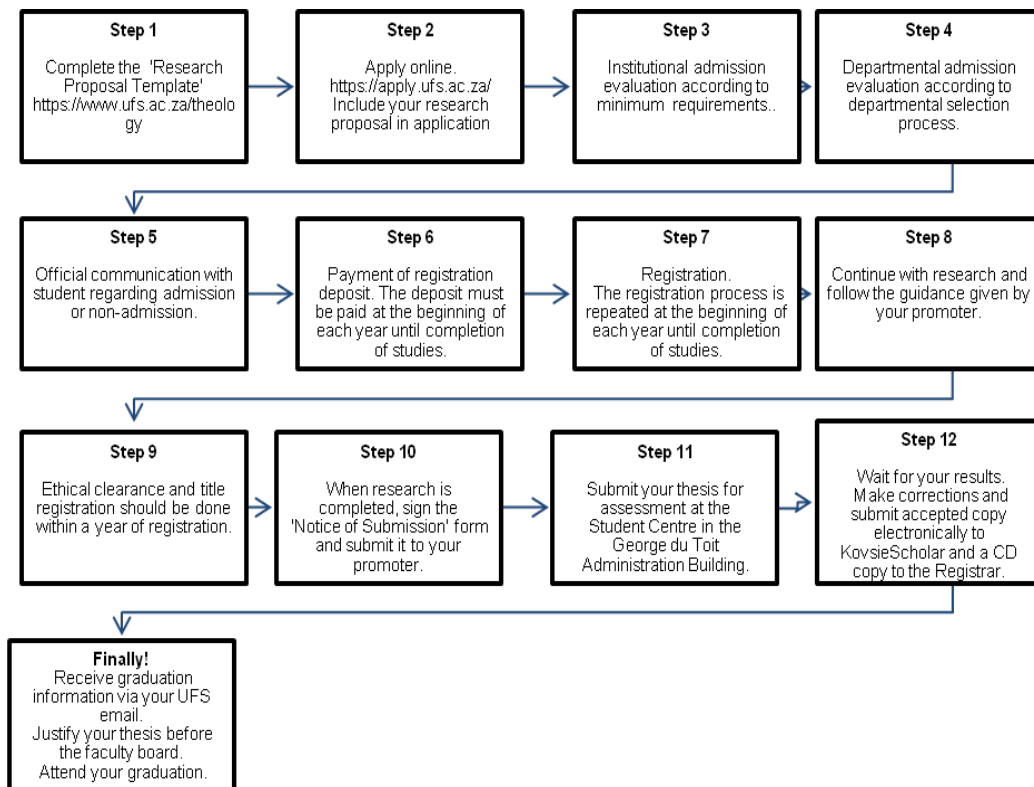
