GENERAL INFORMATION

1. General Rules

The 2023 General Rules for Undergraduate Qualifications, Postgraduate Diplomas, Bachelor Honours Degrees, Master's Degrees, Doctoral Degrees, Higher Doctorates, Honorary Degrees, and the Convocation (General Rules) of the University of the Free State (UFS) apply to all students and faculties, and hence to the Degrees, Diplomas, and Higher Certificate programmes of the Faculty of Theology and Religion. These rules deal with issues such as the admission requirements of the UFS, registration as a student, Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL), progression and articulation, requirements for passing, examinations, etc.

It is the responsibility of students to acquaint themselves with all the general rules relevant to their studies.

2. Faculty Rules

The 2023 Faculty Rules supplement the 2023 General Rules. Should a faculty rule contradict a general rule, the general rule will apply.

The curriculum rules in the Rule Book of the Faculty of Theology and Religion applicable during a student's year of first registration will remain valid for the duration of their studies for that particular qualification. It is the responsibility of students to acquaint themselves with all the Faculty Rules relevant to their studies.

3. Admission through Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL)

A person who does not qualify for admission to an academic qualification can, under the following guidelines, apply for admission in terms of a process of RPL:

- (a) A person in possession of an NSC (as from 2008) or a School-leaving Certificate (before 2008), with at least five (5) years' applicable work experience, including formal and non-formal learning.
- (b) A person who is forty-five (45) years old or older, with more than fifteen (15) years' applicable work experience, including formal and non-formal learning, regardless of whether he/she has a Senior Certificate or not, may apply for RPL.

4. National Benchmark Test

Taking the NBT test is not required for admission to the Higher Certificate in Theology. However, it is compulsory for students who are registering for a first-time Bachelor's Degree to write the National Benchmark Test (NBT) before the registration period in January each year, i.e. in the previous year. Students in the Faculty of Theology and Religion write only the Academic Literacy Test. Visit the NBT website at www.nbt.ac.za or contact the university's NBT office (051 401 2448/nbt@ufs.ac.za) for more information.

Students who have not obtained a proficiency score of 64% or did not write the NBT, must register for the foundational language module in English (EALH1508) in addition to the minimum credit requirement to complete the degree. It is the responsibility of students to consider the module and venue timetable to avoid timetable clashes.

Students who have already completed a qualification at this or another institution of higher education are exempted from writing the NBT test and from registering for EALH1508.

5. UFSS1504/UFSS1522

UFSS1504 is a compulsory 16-credit year module for all students registering for the Bachelor of Divinity at the UFS. Students registering for the second year of the Bachelor of Divinity Extended Curriculum Programme, and who have passed SCLL1508 in their first year of registration, will receive recognition for the first semester of UFSS1504 (UFSS1512), and therefore register for UFSS1522, a compulsory eight-credit module. No qualification can be obtained from the UFS if this module has not been completed

successfully. It is the responsibility of students to consider the module and venue timetable to avoid timetable clashes.

The following students are exempt from registering for UFSS1504/UFSS1522:

- Students who have already completed a degree or diploma at this or another accredited institution of higher education.
- Students who are 30 years or older in the year of registration.
- Students who are working full-time and studying part-time.
- Students studying for the Higher Certificate in Theology. However, should these students
 progress to the Bachelor of Divinity Degree, they are expected to register for UFSS1504 in the
 first year of study.
- Should they progress to the Bachelor of Divinity Extended Curriculum Programme, they are
 expected to register for UFSS1522 in the second year (second semester) of the Bachelor of
 Divinity Extended Curriculum Programme after they have completed SCLL1508 in the first year
 of study.

6. CSIL1511/CSIL1561

The CSIL1511 module (Computer Literacy) is compulsory for all students registering for a first qualification in the Faculty of Theology and Religion at the UFS.

- The following students may apply for exemption from CSIL1511:
- Students who have already completed a higher education qualification.
- Students who have passed Computer Studies in the Senior Certificate examination with a D (Higher Grade) or C (Standard Grade).
- Students who have passed Computer Application Technology (CAT) at a Performance Level 5 (60%) in the National Senior Certificate.

8. Student Academic Records

A student may access study records and other documents that are not required for official purposes and are therefore not issued on a UFS letterhead, are not signed or do not bear the UFS's stamp, via the student portal at https://www.ufs.ac.za/kovsielife/student-self-service

A predetermined number of copies of the student's academic record are issued to the student free of charge annually. Any further academic record of the student will only be issued to the student upon payment of the required fees.

Official academic records, transcripts and/or certificates of conduct will only be issued to students if the overdue amounts on their accounts are less than two thousand rands (R2 000).

9. COVID-19

To facilitate the impact of disruption like protests or the COVID-19 pandemic, curricula delivery and assessment methods for both undergraduate and postgraduate qualifications may be changed at short notice to online delivery only, through Blackboard as the official online learning management system of the UFS.

10. Undergraduate Assessment Rules⁸

- 10.1 All assessment in the Faculty of Theology and Religion take place according to a continuous assessment strategy. In a continuous assessment strategy, all the assessment count towards the final module mark.
- 10.2 A student is not entitled to any exceptions or concessions if she/he has erred in respect of the scheduled assessment timetable, or the submission of assignments or research essays.

10.3 Special assessment

Students in their final academic semester who have to prolong their studies to obtain the qualification subsequent to failing a single continuous assessment module, who participated in all the assessments and obtained a final module mark of 45%, can be awarded a special assessment of which the final format will be determined by the faculty.

10.4 Pass requirements

Where a system of continuous assessment applies, a student passes when a final mark of at least 50% has been obtained and she/he has participated in all the assessments.

10.5 Passing with distinction

To pass a module with distinction, a student must obtain a final mark of at least 75% and must have participated in all the scheduled assessments.

11. Undergraduate Progression Rules

Students must take note of the progression rules applicable to their specific qualifications as set out in the General Rules of the UFS as well as the Rule Book of the Faculty of Theology and Religion.

11.1 Progression rules of the Higher Certificate in Theology

To be re-admitted to the Higher Certificate in Theology (one-year qualification), a student:

- (a) after one year of study, must have passed at least 66 (50%) credits of the total credits for the specific curriculum (132); and
- (b) after two years of study, must have passed all the required credits for the qualification (132).

If a student received an exemption from registration for a specific module/s, the progression rule formula will be adapted by the faculty and the student will be informed of the progression requirements that she/he must meet.

11.2 Progression rules of the Advanced Diploma in Theology

Students are expected to complete the diploma in two years.

Based on exceptional merit, a student who has not yet completed the qualification after two years may be admitted for one additional year. Such admission is subject to the Dean's approval on recommendation of the Programme Director, with written notification to the Registrar.

11.3 Progression rules of the Bachelor of Divinity:

To be re-admitted to the Bachelor of Divinity (four-year qualification), a student:

- (a) after one year of study, must have passed at least 94 credits of the total minimum required credits for the specific curriculum (564);
- (b) after two years of study, must have passed at least 188 credits of the total minimum required credits for the specific curriculum (564);
- (c) after three years of study, must have passed at least 282 credits of the total minimum required credits for the specific curriculum (564);
- (d) after four years of study, must have passed at least 376 credits of the total minimum required credits for the specific curriculum (564);
- (e) after five years of study, must have passed at least 470 credits of the total minimum required credits for the specific curriculum (564); and
- (f) after six years of study, must have passed the minimum required credits for the qualification (564).

11.4 Progression rules of the Bachelor of Divinity Extended Curriculum Programme:

To be re-admitted to the Bachelor of Divinity Extended Curriculum Programme (five-year qualification), a student:

- (a) after one year of study, must have passed at least 94 credits of the total minimum required credits for the specific curriculum (660);
- (b) after two years of study, must have passed at least 188 credits of the total minimum required credits for the specific curriculum (660);
- (c) after three years of study, must have passed at least 282 credits of the total minimum required credits for the specific curriculum (660);
- (d) after four years of study, must have passed at least 376 credits of the total minimum required credits for the specific curriculum (660);
- (e) after five years of study, must have passed at least 470 credits of the total minimum required credits for the specific curriculum (660);
- (f) after six years of study, must have passed at least 566 credits of the total minimum required credits for the qualification (660); and
- (g) after seven years of study, must have passed the minimum required credits for the qualification (660).

11.5 If a student received an exemption from registration for a specific module/s, the progression rule formula will be adapted by the faculty and the student will be informed of the progression requirements that she/he must meet.

11.6 NQF Levels:

A student will not be allowed to register for a module in a subject field at NQF Level 7 if the student still has a module outstanding at NQF Level 5 for that same subject field.

12. Graduation

CAREER GUIDANCE

The Bachelor of Divinity's primary focus is to provide in-depth training and skills development for a career in professional Christian ministry. However, by carefully choosing electives the degree can be structured to open additional postgraduate studies and career possibilities.

GUIDE TO CHOOSING ELECTIVES

For the BDiv/BDivECP degree, students must complete 128 credits of compulsory electives. Of these 128 credits, at least 32 credits **MUST** be on NQF 6 or higher.

The elective modules will be spread over two years.

BDiv: Year One (64 credits); Year Two (64 credits)
BDivECP Year Two (64 credits); Year Three (64 credits)

Please take note of the following:

- Students are advised to choose the elective modules following the requirements of their faith communities. If your church does not require Hebrew and Greek, you can consider choosing modules that can open additional postgraduate studies and career possibilities.
- When you take Hebrew and Greek, you will not experience timetable clashes. However, most
 electives are offered by other faculties, and you need to check your timetable for clashes before
 choosing the electives.
- In some of the elective module packages, you have the option to register for a conversational language module in an indigenous language to which you have no previous exposure. This multilingual drive of the UFS is focused on building social cohesion, enhancing your employability, and preparing you for a multilingual work environment.
- It is recommended that the workload from elective modules be spread evenly through an academic year, e.g. 32 credits in each semester.

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

PROFESSIONAL MINISTRY

If you are training to become a minister (priest/pastor/reverend) in a professional ministry, the Faculty of Theology and Religion highly recommends choosing your electives to study Biblical Hebrew and Biblical Greek, the original languages of the Old Testament and New Testament. Knowing these ancient languages in which the Bible was written, will empower you with valuable and scarce skills that will dramatically enhance your ability to interpret the Scriptures.

We request that you contact the relevant representative of the training body of your denomination at the **beginning** of your studies to enquire about screening and/or selection procedures, as well as specific study requirements, e.g. Hebrew and Greek.

Upon completion of the Bachelor of Divinity, a student can articulate to a variety of postgraduate theological qualifications.

Postgraduate qualifications with a focus on professional ministry

To specialise in ministry development, students can articulate from the Bachelor of Divinity to the Postgraduate Diploma in Theology, which offers practical training and is recommended to be completed in the service of a church and under ministerial mentorship.

Students interested in specialising in ministry can also articulate from the Bachelor of Divinity to the Master of Divinity, which is highly focused on the integration of theological insights and culminates in the completion of a mini-dissertation.

Postgraduate qualifications with a focus on academic career development

Upon completion of the Bachelor of Divinity, students can also choose to follow an academic career path by completing a Master's Degree and Doctoral Degree in any one of the theological disciplines, e.g.

- Old Testament Studies
- New Testament Studies
- Systematic Theology and Church History
- Missiology
- Practical Theology
- Religion Studies
- Spirituality
- Bible Translation

BIBLE TRANSLATION

If you are interested in becoming a Bible translator, it is recommended that you take both Hebrew and Greek at the second-year level, and if you apply for 32 extra credits⁹, you can continue with one of these languages at the third-year level.

While it is recommended that you take both languages, you do have the option to specialise in only one. The undergraduate modules on Bible Translation, namely "Ancient Translations of the Hebrew Bible" (HEBR3754) and "Modern Translations of the Hebrew Bible" (HEBR3764) are highly recommended and can be combined with modules in Ancient Near Eastern Culture and Classical Culture.

Completing the Bachelor of Divinity with a weighted average of 60% may give you access to:

- the Master of Arts in Bible Translation (BC970535), provided that you have taken 48 credits in Biblical Hebrew or New Testament Greek; or
- the Master of Arts in Bible Translation Management (BC970536).

Information

The Higher Certificate in Theology provides general and basic introductory knowledge of the study of Christian ministry. It includes training in appropriate skills designed to empower Christian leaders to make a meaningful impact on communities and the development of churches.

The qualification also serves to provide students with the basic introductory knowledge, cognitive and conceptual tools, and practical techniques for further higher education studies in Theology.

The Higher Certificate in Theology is offered on the Bloemfontein Campus.

Admission¹⁰

To be admitted to the Higher Certificate in Theology, a student must have:

- (a) a Senior Certificate (before 2008) with an M score of at least 20 points; or
- (b) a National Senior Certificate (obtained since 2008) with an Admission Point (AP) of at least 20;or
- (c) a National Certificate (Vocational) with an Admission Point (AP) of at least 20; and
- (d) achieved a minimum Performance Symbol of D (Performance Level 4) in English Home Language or English First Additional Language.

All foreign school qualifications offered for admission must be accompanied by a letter from the Universities South Africa (USAf) Matriculation Board certifying that the requirements for conditional or complete exemption have been met. A person who does not qualify for admission to the Higher Certificate in Theology but has applicable work experience, including formal and non-formal learning, can apply for admission in terms of the RPL process (Recognition of Prior Learning). Progression

Completion of the Higher Certificate in Theology will allow access to a cognate Bachelor's Degree if the student complies with the admission requirements of the Bachelor's Degree as set out in the Rule Book of the Faculty of Theology and Religion.

If a student plans to progress to a qualification in another faculty after completing the Higher Certificate in Theology, the student should obtain confirmation from that specific faculty that the Higher Certificate in Theology will indeed assist with gaining admission to that degree **before** registering for the Higher Certificate in Theology.

Curriculum

The Higher Certificate in Theology requires 132 credits at NQF Level 5 and takes a minimum period of one academic year to complete. It consists of eight compulsory Theology modules (128 credits) and one university module, CSIL1511 (4 credits).

Information

The Master of Theology is a Master's Degree by coursework and a mini-dissertation. This Master of Theology Degree maintains a high level of proficiency, offering specialised training in one theological discipline. A third of the degree consists of a research project of 60 credits (20 000-30 000 words), culminating in the acceptance of a mini-dissertation or one publishable manuscript/published article with an introduction and a conclusion. The degree exposes the student to a broader spectrum of insights in the chosen field of speciality in terms of in-depth theoretical engagement and intellectual independence. This will enable students to deal critically with complex issues, both systematically and creatively, within professional and academic contexts. The degree prepares graduates for specialised professional employment.

Admission

To be admitted to the Master of Theology, a student must have:

- (a) a professional Bachelor of Divinity (NQF Exit Level 8); or
- (b) a Bachelor of Theology Degree (NQF Exit Level 8); or
- (c) a Postgraduate Diploma in Theology (NQF Exit Level 8); or
- (d) an appropriate honours degree (NQF Exit Level 8); or
- (e) an appropriate and equivalent (NQF Exit Level 8) qualification; and
- (f) have obtained a weighted average of at least 60%, or have obtained a mark of at least 60% in the modules (at the highest NQF level) presented in the discipline in which she/he is to proceed ⁵⁹; **and**
- (g) have completed or will register for a module (or equivalent) in Theological Research Methodology at NQF Level 8 or higher.

Additional departmental requirements and/or selection procedures will be indicated with every specialisation.

Progression

Completion of the Master of Theology will allow access to a cognate Doctoral Degree if the student complies with the admission requirements of the Doctoral Degree as set out in the Rule Book of the Faculty of Theology and Religion.


Ethical clearance and title registration

An acceptable research proposal and provisional title must usually be approved by the Faculty Research Committee and Faculty Board, including compliance with the requirements of the ethics committees.

The ethical clearance and title registration must take place within the first six (6) months after first registration in the case of a dissertation, and within the first twelve (12) months after first registration in the case of a thesis.

ANNUAL REGISTRATION PROCESS

You must register every year until you have submitted your dissertation/thesis. Here are the recurring steps that you must follow:



SUBMISSION OF YOUR DISSERTATION/THESIS

Make sure your dissertation/thesis or interrelated, publishable manuscripts/ published articles meet the following requirements:

- Reasonable-width margins (2–2.5 cm) and 1.5 spacing are desirable to ensure comfortable reading
 of the text.
- Consistent referencing, for example the Harvard referencing system (Acta Theologica)
- The title page must include the following:
 - the registered research title;
 - o the student's full names;
 - a declaration reading:
 "Submitted in fulfilment of the requirements in respect of the Master's/Doctoral Degree in the Department of

- the submission date; and
- o the name of the supervisor/promotor and co-supervisor/co-promotor if applicable.
- The following declaration page should be included:
 - "I,, declare that the thesis (or interrelated, publishable manuscripts/published articles or dissertation) that I herewith submit for the (name of the master's/doctoral degree) at the University of the Free State, is my independent work and that I have not previously submitted it for a qualification at another institution of higher education."
- An abstract of no more than six hundred (600) words must be included at the beginning together with approximately ten (10) key terms that describe the topic.
- The following documents should be submitted along with the thesis:
 - o a Turnitin similarity report approved by the supervisor/promotor; and
 - a letter from the supervisor/promotor declaring that the research has not previously, either in part or in its entirety, been submitted to the examiners and including the proof of title registration and proof of appointment of the examiners.

Notify your supervisor/promotor that you intend to submit your research⁷²

You must notify the supervisor/promotor of your intention to submit at least three months before submission for examiners to be appointed.

Annual deadlines for the notification of submission:

- on or before the last work day of September of the preceding year to graduate during the April graduation ceremonies; or
- on or before the first work day of April for graduating during the December graduation ceremonies

Submit your dissertation/thesis

Submission of a dissertation/thesis can take place throughout the year, but to receive the degree during a particular graduation ceremony the research must be submitted at least four months before the specific ceremony:

- on or before the last work day of November of the preceding year to graduate during the April graduation ceremonies; or
- on or before the last work day in July to graduate during the December graduation ceremonies.

It is possible, however, that due to problems/issues regarding the research, the student will only receive the qualification during the next graduation ceremony and will be required to register for the following semester/academic year. Should a student be required to register again, tuition fees will also be charged.
