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

We bring you a publication jam-packed with news on our university here in the heart of the Free State.

The Year 2011 was in all aspects a very, very busy year at all levels. On the academic side we could show better results with top researchers reaching the 100 mark. The academic ranks were boosted by the employment senior researchers and academics from other parts of South Africa and abroad.

The Vice-Chancellor's Prestige Scholars project – in which highly talented academic staff was identified – is underway. These are academics we can keep our eye on. They will be instrumental in changes in the academic and research field in South Africa.

Graduations became a celebration. Gone are the days where graduandi walked up to a stage, got capped and received a certificate for their long years of dedication. Graduations are now marked by long, colourful processions, music, motivation speeches – moments to cherish.

In an effort to groom future leaders on our campuses and in our communities, all stops were pulled out to send 150 young first-year "ambassadors" to universities in America, Europe and the East. That was a doubling of the figure of 2010.

The year 2011 will be remembered for a long time as one of the most memorable in the history of the University of the Free State. One highlight after the other, one achievement after the other, were recorded.

Many public-participating and public-facing occasions – such as the honorary doctorate for Desmond Tutu and Oprah Winfrey aside – 2011 was a year to celebrate.

The institution continues to make its mark on the national and international academic landscape. The UFS has reached the mark of 100 rated scientists and scholars at the National Research Foundation (NRF) and the plan is to double the figure in the coming three years. Senior professors appointed at the UFS added to the pool. The UFS now has a team of outstanding academics who complement and enrich the senior academic team of the institution.

The UFS grooms talent in its own ranks with the Vice-Chancellor's Prestige Scholars programme. Yale University has been among the first overseas institutions to offer to place some of our new Ph.D. scholars and staff for their 2012 placements as part of the programme. This innovation will boost the standing and status of the next generation of UFS scholars.

Many measures were put in place to improve the throughput of the UFS. The decision to create opportunities for final-year students owing only one or two modules for the degree to study for free has been well-received by the Department of Higher Education and Training (DHET) with requests from the government for more information on this innovation and an appeal to other universities to follow suit.

Critical decisions on enhancing the quality of undergraduate education across the university has already started to show results. The compulsory class attendance project has borne fruit, with results up to 40% higher in difficult subjects where it was introduced. Those modules or courses were selected because of low success rates and high failure rates. Coordinated efforts



to improve teaching and learning will be continued through a new Centre for Teaching and Learning. Going hand-in-hand with the improvements, is the introduction of an Undergraduate Core Curriculum (UFS 101) among all new first-years from the beginning of 2012. This is a life-skills project trying to get all new students to become full-rounded individuals for their careers and adult life one day, but also to handle situations and explore the world while at university. Our university is the first to introduce such a course and senior professors, and even the rector, will be seen lecturing.

The University of the Free State has become a university of choice for thousands of students countrywide. For 2012 the application of new first-year students rose by almost 30%.

Building and upgrading projects to the value of hundreds of millions of rand were undertaken or completed and opened. With that the UFS has added 5 000 more seats in total over the campuses. It will go a long way to alleviate the pressures the UFS experience as a result of the rapid growth in student numbers over the past five years.

The new building projects were made possible through external and budgeted internal funding. It communicates a spirit of liveliness, vibrancy, and transformation among insiders and visitors to the campuses.

A Strategic Plan for the period 2012 to 2016 received dedicated attention of senior members of staff and the UFS Council. This document is the road map for the institution to achieve its targets on its way to be an institution the academic world must take note of.

Student affairs matured to the extent that the election of members of the Student Council was also a celebration of freedom of choice, freedom of expression, and it was free from racial and political prejudices.

Prof. Jonathan Jansen, Rector and Vice-Chancellor, said: "The general euphoria among students was moving, and the diversity achieved in the student body suggests that the UFS has truly entered a new dawn in student politics." **B**

Senior professors strengthen

The drive to appoint top professors in various fields was completed in 2011 and 25 new senior professors joined our staff. Our university now has a team of outstanding younger and older academics who complement and enrich the academic core at our university.

Many of the appointees are highly rated for their research and other work in their various fields.

The drive to “head hunt” top senior academics and researchers was one of the first initiatives announced by the Rector and Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Jonathan Jansen, following his appointment at the UFS.

The purpose of the drive was for the university to get ahead of the pack with respect to research performance in South Africa. Prof. Jansen says the senior professors will strengthen the professorial core of the university in ways that lead to a sharp increase in scholarly outputs, attracts top postgraduate students, and builds the intellectual climate on campus.

Students now have the privileged to be taught by top scholars from around the world who join the already impressive cast of university teachers on campus.

The drive was strengthened with actions that included the revision of

- tenure practices for academic staff;
- increased entry requirements for master’s and doctoral studies;
- the submission of six well-prepared applications for the competitive SARChI Chairs;
- the strengthening of the established research clusters to strengthen them; and
- the reorganisation of postgraduate education within the Postgraduate School.

Prof. Jansen says the UFS continues to receive applications from South Africa and abroad from senior academics wishing to be considered as professors of outstanding quality that could be added to the core of A- and B-rated (or equivalent) scientists and scholars of the university. **B**

UFS ranks strengthened with top senior appointments

The drive to strengthen the academic and administrative staff of the UFS, has gained momentum in the past year.

Senior top academics with high research ratings were recruited from South Africa and abroad to strengthen the scholarly skills and depth of the university. The university management extends a sincere and warm welcome to these staff members, some of whom are:



Prof. Greg Barz (Senior Professor, Music):
Prof. Barz is an associate professor in Ethnomusicology and Anthropology at Vanderbilt University, USA, and has been appointed as a senior professor in our Department of Music since June 2010. He specialises in music and medicine in Sub-Saharan Africa – something which his book *Singing for life: HIV/Aids and music in Uganda* explores.



Prof. Jan Coetzee (Senior Professor, Department of Sociology):
After being employed as a professor in Sociology at Rhodes University, Prof. Coetzee returned to the UFS, where he works in Sociological Theory and Methodology (especially qualitative methodology and the use of narrative and personal histories). Before his sojourn in the Eastern Cape, he worked as a professor in Sociology at the then UOFS from 1979 until 1986.



Prof. Kwandiwe Kondlo (Senior Professor and Chair of the Centre for Africa Studies):
Prof. Kondlo joined our university in May 2010 after having acted as Executive Director and Chair of the Democracy and Governance Programme of the Human Sciences Research Council (HSRC). In 2007 he was awarded the Harry Oppenheimer Oxford University Research Fellowship to assist towards the completion of his book, titled *In the Twilight of the Revolution*. Prof. Kondlo is a well-known political analyst in, among others, governance, the state of the state in Africa and South African politics.



Dr Lis Lange (Senior Director: Directorate for Institutional Research and Academic Planning):
Dr Lange has for the past eleven years been involved in quality assurance for higher-education institutions at the national Council on Higher Education, where she has been the Executive Director. She assists the UFS in areas of quality assurance and academic planning. She will also contribute to the development of intellectual debate and improve multi-disciplinary research.

Prof. Sechaba Mahlomahalo (Professor in the Faculty of Education):

Prof. Mahlomahalo boasts a resumé which includes degrees from the University of the Western Cape, Harvard and the University of the North. This well-publicised academic has contributed to journals such as the *Southern African Educational Review* and *Education with Production Journal*, among others. He also belongs to a host of research bodies, such as the UMALUSI Research Forum, Education Association of South Africa.



Prof. Cynthia L Miller-Naudé (Senior Professor, Classical and Near Eastern Studies):

This academic, hailing from the University of Wisconsin in the USA, has been employed at the UFS since June 2010. She works as a specialist in ancient Hebrew and related Northwest Semitic languages and also in linguistic theory, especially focused on the Old Testament.



Prof. Maresi Nerad (Extraordinary Professor, Postgraduate School):

Prof. Nerad, founder and director of the Center for Innovation and Research in Graduate Education (CIRGE), produced various books, numerous chapters in books and articles on a variety of subjects pertaining to doctoral degrees and education. Some of the latest projects she is involved in include Germany's reform of higher education and the creation of a few outstanding world-class universities. Prof. Nerad is an Associate Professor for Higher Education in the Educational Leadership and Policy Studies Program College of Education, at the University of Washington, USA.



Prof. Helene Strauss (Professor, English):

Prof. Strauss completed her undergraduate work up to an MA at the UFS in 2000. She followed this up with a Ph.D. at the University of Western Ontario, for which she was awarded the Canadian Governor General's Gold Medal. She subsequently took up a position at McMaster University in Hamilton, Canada. Her interests are to probe how, in a post-TRC South Africa, South Africans experience and achieve social cohesion. She will join the UFS on 1 September 2011.

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
'n Groot seun van Afrika vereer

Een van die groot seuns van Afrika, emeritus-aartsbiskop Desmond Tutu, het 'n eredoktorsgraad in Teologie aan die begin van 2011 aan ons universiteit ontvang. Hy het ook die Internasionale Instituut vir Studies oor Ras, Versoening en Sosiale Geregtigheid geopen.

Die instituut het sy oorsprong by die Reitz-incident van 2008 gehad en vergestalt die UV se vasbeslotenheid om 'n plek te wees waar versoening, vergifnis en sosiale geregtigheid nie net bestudeer sal word nie, maar ook toegepas word. Studente en akademici van regoor die wêreld kan die teorie en praktyk oor die bou van gemeenskappe oor die grense van ras asook, geloof, geslag, gestremdhede en nasionale oorsprong bestudeer.

Deur dr. Tutu te vereer, het ons erkenning verleen aan sy bydrae op die gebied van die Teologie, asook as morele en geestelike leier wat deurgaans sy integriteit as 'n Christen gehandhaaf het nie, maar ook "as 'n groot seun van Suid-Afrika wat 'n enorme bydrae tot vrede, versoening en geregtigheid in Suid-Afrika en in die wêreld gemaak het".

Onder die gaste was die voormalige ambassadeur van die VSA in Suid-Afrika, mnr. Donald Gips; die Britse Hoë Kommissaris van Suid-Afrika, dr. Nicola Brewer; lede van die plaaslike regering; die dogters van Bram Fischer, Ruth Fischer-Rice en Ilse Fischer-Wilson; en visekanseliers van verskeie tersiêre instansies soos prof. Cheryl de la Rey van die Universiteit van Pretoria en prof. Russel Botman van die Universiteit Stellenbosch. Vriende van dr. Tutu, dr. Ahmed Kathrada, me. Barbara Hogan en dr. Allan en mev. Elna Boesak, het ook die geleentheid bygewoon. Adjunkpresident Kgalema Motlanthe het ook 'n boodskap van gelukwensings gestuur.





Prof. Jonathan Jansen, Visekanselier en Rektor, het gesê: "Ons vereer 'n groot seun van Suid-Afrika wat 'n enorme bydrae tot vrede, versoeniging en geregtigheid in Suid-Afrika en in die wêreld gelewer het. Daar was tye dat min van ons gedink het dat apartheid in ons leeftyd gaan eindig, maar u het soos 'n rots gestaan, ons verseker – nie van 'n swart toekoms nie, maar van 'n gedeelde toekoms. Vir hierdie rede, Arch, sal ons om geen rede hierdie geleentheid om u te vereer, mis nie."

"U, Meneer, is 'n Jood tussen Moslems, 'n Christen tussen Hindoes, 'n Katolieke tussen Anglikane, 'n brugbouer tussen ons almal. Dit is hoekom ons u liefhet; omdat u

dieper kyk en verder sien as enige van ons."

Prof. Francois Tolmie, Dekaan van die Fakulteit Teologie, het oor dr. Tutu se ryke bydraes tot talle terreine, nasionaal en internasional, gesê: "Daar word dikwels gevra hoe dr. Tutu al hierdie dinge in een leeftyd kon bereik het. Sommige mense skryf dit toe aan sy warm persoonlikheid of sy menslikheid, sy diep gevoel van nederigheid of sy wonderlike sin vir humor. Wanneer 'n mens egter dieper self, word jy getref deur dr. Tutu se diep verhouding met God. Hy is bekend as 'n man van geloof, 'n man van gebed. Hy lewe sy lewe coram Deo, in die teenwoordigheid van God. **B**

Reconciliation closes book on the Reitz incident

The book on the Reitz incident, that has taken the UFS to front pages and news headlines, could be closed this year. The parties involved could meet in private and they took part in a public ceremony with many dignitaries witnessing the closure of the incident and repercussions it had.

Messages of apology were read by Prof. Teuns Verschoor, Vice-Rector, on behalf of the UFS, and Mr Danie Grobler on behalf of the former students. A message of acceptance of the apologies was read by Ms Emmah Koko on behalf of the workers.

Deputy Chairperson of the South Africa Human Rights Commission, Commissioner Pregs Govender, said of this historic event: "The courage and compassion shown by the workers together with the students' willingness to embrace the spirit of change have enabled a process of justice, transformation and reconciliation that is an inspiring example for South Africa. The process, led by Prof. Jonathan Jansen, Vice-Chancellor and Rector, whose term began just after this incident, has laid a significant foundation for the future. It is significant, not just for this university, but for all educational institutions, including schools."

Graduations now



By changing its format, graduations are now a festival to celebrate years of hard work and dedication of students and lecturers at our university. Some of the changes include the gathering of the procession on the Red Square in front of the Main Building, from where it moves to the Callie Human Centre.

The graduation programme is also filled with music and song items with various young speakers addressing and inspiring the audience.

A total of 83 doctorates were conferred in 2011, making it the highest number in the history of the university.

- Archbishop Desmond Tutu.
- Ms Oprah Winfrey.
- Mr Pieter Fourie, one of South Africa's most renowned Afrikaans playwrights.
- Prof. Robert William Mayo Frater, Emeritus Professor of Thoracic and Cardiovascular Surgery, and Emeritus Professor of Paediatrics, Albert Einstein College of Medicine and Montefiore Medical Centre, New York, and
- Prof. Akilagpa Sawyerr, former Secretary-General of the Association of African Universities and former Vice-Chancellor of the University of Ghana. **B**

Die Universiteit van die Vrystaat (UV) het in Mei 2011 sy doelwit onderskryf om 'n toonaangewende internasionale akademiese instelling te word toe hy die nuutste groep doctorandi tydens die jaarlike Herfsgradeplegtigheid voorgestel het.

Algesien daarvan dat die herfsgradeplegtigheidsceremonie die grootste in die geskiedenis van die UV was, met 'n totaal van 4 022 kwalifikasies wat toegeken is, het dit ook 'n verbluffende 60 doktorsgrade ingesluit. Die graduallist is versprei oor die hele spektrum van die akademie en het ook 'n rekordgetal van agt LL.D.-graadandi ingesluit, waarvan vier personeleledige verbange aan ons Fakulteit. Reggegeleerdheid is, Dr Pieter Fourie, 'n vername Afrikaanse dramaturg, het 'n eredoctoraatgraad in Drama (D.Litt.) ontvang.



Die wêreld se oë was op die Universiteit van die Vrystaat gerig met die toekenning van 'n eredoktorsgraad in Opvoedkunde aan Oprah Winfrey. Deel die ervaring soos verwoord deur prof. Jonathan Jansen, Visekanselier en Rektor, in koerante.

Dr. Oprah Winfrey bestudeer hierdie program vir die gradeplegtigheid. By haar is, van links: dr. Choice Makhetha, Viserekotor: Eksterne Betrekkinge (waarnemend), regter Ian van der Merwe, Voorsitter van die UV-Raad, en prof. Jonathan Jansen, Visekanselier en Rektor van die UV.

Vandat bevestig is dat Oprah Winfrey die Universiteit van die Vrystaat sou besoek, het 'n kernbeplanningspan van sowat dertig lede op dreef gekom en omgesien na die reëlings: vir veiligheid, vervoer, uitnodigings, etes, kaartjies, dekor, die nuusmedia, kommunikasie, verhoogbestuur en die gradeplegtigheid, asook vir openbare redevoering, ensomeer.

Nog nooit was soveel mense betrokke by die beplanning van só 'n gebeurtenis op 'n universiteitskampus in

ons land nie. Daar was, byvoorbeeld, minstens vier sekuriteitsaakspanne betrokke, met inbegrip die van Oprah Winfrey. Honderde personeellede het deurnag gewerk. Ek het met bewondering toegekyk hoe studente en personeel geswoeg het om dié Kovskye-gebeurtenis van die eeu 'n oomblik van trots vir die universiteit, die stad en die land te maak.

Ons kon dit nie alleen vermag nie. Oprah se beplanningspan in Chicago was daagliks met ons in

verbinding oor die aksieplan van meer as twintig bladsye. Vir die Amerikaners was dit riskant; iets anders as om die stel en die gehoor in die beheerde omgewing van die Oprah Winfrey Show te bestuur. 'n Afgevaardigde is na Bloemfontein gestuur om seker te maak dat alles seepglad sou verloop. Uiteindelik kon ons verantwoording doen oor elke tree, en elke asemteug.

En ons moes voorsiening maak vir Mandela-oomblikke: hoe gemaak as sy van protokol awyk en uitstap om ondersteuners te groet? Sy het, en die span was gereed daarvoor. Dan die bysake: Die plaaslike nuusmedia wou die geleentheid tot elke prys as 'n geldmaaktruuk voorstel. Maar geen geld is gevra nie: Dit is so eenvoudig soos dit.

Tog was dit irriterend om onakkurate en misleidende inligting oor aanvang- en afsluitingstye, reisroetes en landingstye te lees.

Die ergste het nog voorgelê: Honderde mense landwyd wou iets gee vir die internasionale media-ikoon en filantrop. Briefe is van oral ontvang, plaaslike haarsalonne het aangebied om haar hare te doen, en selfs 'n gratis massering is aangebied. Uiteenlopende organisasies, van Johannesburg tot Kaapstad, wou hê haar reisplan moet aangepas word sodat sy by hulle kan aandoen. Dit was moeilik om vir vrygewege en welmenende mense te verduidelik dat ons haar nie sommer met vliegtuigvragte geskenke kon oorlaai nie, en dat sy nie almal tydens haar kort besoek kon ontmoet nie.

Nie net welwillende mense het na Bloemfontein gestroom nie; misdadigers en ander opportuniste het dit ook gedoen. 'n Groep Nigeriërs is vasgetrek waar hulle vervalste kaartjies verkoop het. Daar kon groepe gewees het wat die teenwoordigheid van beroemdes sou wou uitbuit vir optogte en protesaksies. Ons was slaggereed. Veronderstel iets gebeur op ons kampus met een van die

wêreld se invloedrykste leiers?

Toe breek die oomblik aan. Die optog het aangekom. Sy het, danksy baie hoë hoëhakskoene, aansienlik langer voorgekom as wat ek verwag het. "Professor Jansen," het sy gesê, en ek het besef sy het die gedetailleerde program vir die geleentheid haarfyn bestudeer.

Ek het die opregte menslikheid van hierdie besonderse vrou eerstehands ervaar terwyl sy die spesiale gaste gegroet het.


Toe die gradeplegtigheid. Met me. Winfrey se aankoms in die saal het dit gevoel of die dak van die Callie Human-sentrum afgeruk gaan word. "Hierdie mens beteken so baie vir so baie mense reg oor die wêreld," het ek gedink.

Me. Winfrey se vriend John Samuel het een van die ingrypendste gradueringsitate voorgelees wat ek nog gehoor het. Hy het die oomblik verewig toe hy na haar gedraai het en sê: "Me. Winfrey, u is nou 'n Kovsky." Die gehoor was oorstelp, en Oprah het haar arms omhoog gehou in vreugde.

Sy het die verhoog verlaat om haar toga uit te trek, en teruggekeer om die sowat 5 000 aanwesiges toe te spreek. Die gehoor was stil terwyl die nuwe Kovsky haar woord gedoen het. Sy het die aangrypende verhaal vertel van haar geboorte as kind van 'n per-ongeluk-paartjie wat nie beplan het om haar te hê nie. Almal is geraak.

Ons sluit af met die kenlied van die burgerregstryd in Amerika, die "Battle Hymn of the Republic". Corneil en die kinderkore se stemme styg uit met "Glory, Glory Halleluja, his truth is marching on".

Terwyl hulle sing, kyk Oprah in my rigting, en óns weet, állés wat met ons lande en dié kampus gebeur het, was die moeite werd. **B**

In our endeavour to increase capacity and stay ahead of the demand for facilities, we saw the opening of many new, upgraded and renovated buildings on our campuses. Projects of hundreds of millions of rand were completed and/or opened.

Among them were the new buildings for the Faculty of Economic and Management Sciences, the Faculty of Health Sciences, skills laboratory at Applied Sciences, Chemistry, Education at Qwaqwa, residences at Qwaqwa, upgrading of the laboratories there, a taxi terminus and a new building for Biotechnology on the Bloemfontein

Campus, renovation of the Odeion and the Idalia Loots foyers, and too many others to mention.

A new Olympic-standard swimming pool was opened; the Architecture Building was renovated; a restaurant for staff opened; the Main Entrance at the Bloemfontein Campus was completely renewed in line with the new UFS brand; and parking for cars was extended all over campus.

Our university added 5 000 more seats in total in the new buildings and the extended capacity will go a long way to eliminating backlogs that resulted from the rapid growth in student numbers over the past five years.

In 2012 the UFS will offer regular tours to the broader community to enable parents and prospective students, including the general public, to obtain a first-hand sense of the impressive campuses of our university. ■



Prof. Derek Litthauer is aangestel as Direkteur van die Suid-Afrikaanse Nasionale Beheerlaboratorium vir Biologiese Produkte (NCL), 'n toetslaboratorium vir die Medisynebeheerraad wat die gehalte van alle entstowwe vir menslike gebruik in Suid-Afrika toets. Die laboratorium is op ons Bloemfontein-kampus geleë.

Die laboratorium ontvang monsters van die entstowwe van vervaardigers en invoerders en na deeglike evaluasie van die gehaltebeheerde data van die produk, asook onafhanklike toetsing van die entstowwe, word die entstowwe vir gebruik in die private of openbare sektor beskikbaar gestel. Geen entstowwe kan in Suid-Afrika gebruik word sonder dat 'n vrystellingsertifikaat deur die NCL uitgereik is wat sertificeer dat die entstof geskik is vir menslike gebruik nie.

Hy en van sy personeel het entstofvervaardigingsaanlegte in Europa besoek, asook beheerlaboratoriums in die Verenigde Koninkryk, Frankryk en België.

Hulle is ook uitgenooi om die Wêreldgesondheidsorganisasie in Genève, Switserland, te besoek om toekomstige samewerking met die WGO te bespreek. Die NCL sal weer eens polio-entstowwe van vervaardigers toets wat wêreldwyd deur die WGO versprei sal word. Die NCL sal dan aanbevelings aan die WGO maak met betrekking tot die geskiktheid van die entstof. ■

Scientists involved in research to trace rhino horns

Scientists at our university are involved in a research study that will help to trace the source of any southern white rhino product to a specific geographic location. The research is an initiative of the National Zoological Gardens of South Africa.

Prof. Paul Grobler, who is heading the project in the Department of Genetics at the UFS, said that the research might even allow the identification of the individual animal from which a product was derived. This would allow law enforcement agencies not only to determine with certainty whether rhino horn, traded illegally on the international black market, had its origin in South Africa, but also from which region of South Africa it came.

This additional knowledge is expected to have a major impact on the illegal trade in rhino horn and will provide a potent legal club to get at rhino horn smugglers and traders.

The research team consists of Prof. Grobler; Christiaan Labuschagne, a Ph.D. student at the UFS; Prof. Antoinette Kotze from the NZG, who is also an affiliated professor at the UFS; and Dr Desire Dalton, also from the NZG.



Financial support for the project is provided by the Advanced Biomolecular Research cluster at the UFS.

The team's research involves the identification of small differences in the genetic code among white rhino populations in different regions of South Africa. The genetic code of every species is unique, and is composed of a sequence of the four nucleotide bases G, A, T and C that are inherited from one generation to the next. When one nucleotide base is changed or mutated in an individual, this mutated base is also inherited by the individual's progeny.

If, after many generations, this changed base is present in at least 1% of the individuals of a group, it is described as a single nucleotide polymorphism (SNP), pronounced "snip". Breeding populations that are geographically and reproductively isolated often contain different patterns of such SNPs, which act as a unique genetic signature for each population.

The team is assembling a detailed list of all SNPs found in white rhinos from different regions in South Africa. The work is done in collaboration with the Pretoria-based company Inqaba Biotech, which is performing the nucleotide sequencing that is required for the identification of the SNPs.

The southern white rhino was once thought to be extinct, but in a conservation success story the species was boosted from an initial population of about 100 individuals located in KwaZulu-Natal at the end of the 19th century, to the present population of about 15 000 individuals. The southern white rhino is still, however, listed as "near threatened" by the World Wildlife Fund (WWF). **B**

Gewapen met nuwe

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Min sake het soveel emosie ontketen as die aanpassing van die UV se wapen en leuse met die inwerkingstelling van ons nuwe handelsmerk. **Prof. Dolf Britz**, Hoof: Programbeplanning in die Direktoraat vir Institusionele Navorsing en Akademiese Beplanning, het die geskiedenis van die wapen en die leuse gedokumenteer.

Verskeidenheid leuses en wapens | Die UV het in sy bestaan van 108 jaar vyf keer sy leuse verander. Dit het telkens gepaardgegaan met die ontwerp van nuwe en/of aanpassings by die amptelike wapen:

- 1904-1935: Stabilis (Vastaande, of standvastig)
- 1935-1947: Vorentoe en Boontoe
- 1947-1950: Per Fidem ad Sapientiam (Deur geloof na wysheid)
- 1950-2010: In Deo Sapientiae Lux (In God is die lig van die wysheid)
- 2010-: In Veritate Sapientiae Lux (In waarheid is die lig van wysheid).

In bogenoemde kan 'n ontwikkeling gesien word asook hoe die tradisie doelbewus bewaar is, ook met die verandering wat in 2011 plaasgevind het. Voordat ons 'n nuwe leuse en wapen aanvaar het, het ons ons eers baie deeglik rekenskap gegee van die situasie waarin (en ook waarom) die 1950-leuse beslag gekry het. Daarna het ons dit opgeweeg teenoor die nuwe konteks waarin die UV hom al sedert die 1980's bevind het, en vandag voluit daarin moet leef as 'n universiteit met akademiese integriteit. Om hierdie rede is die 'In Deo' van 1950 nie herhaal is nie.

Verandering van 1947 en 1950 | Telkens het die veranderinge van die UV-leuse en wapen-gedaagd met verkeie faktore. Aan die een kant was daar kulturele en selfs godsdiens-tige aandrang en oriëntering, en aan die ander kant ook akademiese verantwoording en onvermydelike herposisionering.

Bronne dui aan dat studente in 1947 daarop aangedring het dat die eietydse Afrikanervertolking van die nasionale geskiedenis voorrang in die ontwerp van die wapen moet kry bô dié van die UV. Hulle het gemeen dat die drie kruithorings van die Nederlandse Koningshuis van Oranje hierdie ideaal sou uitbeeld. Dit is ook duidelik dat die

1947-leuse 'n godsdiens-tige uitgangspunt tot uitdrukking wou bring, waarin geloof 'n belangrike rol speel. Kenmerkend van die 1950-leuse is 'n verskuiwing van die geloof na God toe. Die leuse word nou 'n objektiewe uitspraak oor God: In Hom is die lig van die wysheid. Juis in hierdie tyd het die NG Kerk van die OVS by die UV aangedring dat hy hom moes verbind aan 'n Christelike karakter en die (Afrikaner) "volksaard" van die provinsie.

Die destydse Afrikanernasionalisme, ideale en verstaan van die Suid-Afrikaanse werklikheid het dus ná die Tweede Wêreldoorlog 'n beduidende rigting aan die UV geword. Die ou gevestigde tradisie van die UV waarin beide Afrikaans en Engels as onderrigtaal gebruik is en waarin akademiese diversiteit (in die Grey Kollege Stabilis-sin van die woord) tot op daardie stadium 'n tuiste gevind het, moes nou swig voor hierdie kulturele en (politieke) keuse. Gedurende die ongeveer 30 jaar wat hierdie rigting die botoon gevoer het, is dit vanuit die UV steeds bevraagteken. Die kritiese stem wou nie gaan lê nie. Dit het akademici en studente van die UV vervreem en talle inwoners van die Vrystaat die reg om aan die UV te studeer en te deel in sy akademiese uitmuntendheid ontneem.

Groot wending in die jare 80 en 90 | Met kritiese refleksie en (Christelike) verantwoording het die UV hom reeds in die 1980's oopgestel vir alle studente, ongeag hulle taal, ras, kulturele voorkeure en godsdiens-tige oortuigings. Daar is ook teruggekeer na die uitgangspunt van, soos u hulle noem, "die oorspronklike stigters" om in beide Afrikaans en Engels te doseer. Die verbintenis aan die Afrikaner- "volksaard" van die Vrystaat het sy oorspronklike betekenis verloor. Selfs die NG Kerk het in die nuwe konteks nie aangedring op 'n handhawing van sy 1950-standpunte nie. Die konteks het verander en ons het die uitdagings met albei hande aangegryp.

Verandering in 2011 | Dit was vir ons almal duidelik dat die UV aan die begin van die 21ste eeu hard moes werk om homself met akademiese integriteit te handhaaf. Standaarde en uitstekende onderrig is vir ons ononderhandelbaar. Ons wil net die beste vir ons studente gee. Hieraan werk ons met oorgawe en toewyding.

As deel van ons strategie om die UV een van die bestes in Afrika te maak, is in 2010 besluit om die wapen en leuse aan te pas om in die nuwe omstandighede die universiteit tot sy reg te laat kom. Hierdie keer het ons simbole eie aan die Vrystaat gebruik, soos die Oranjerivierelie. Hierby het ons gekies om in die leuse iets oor onself te sê, eerder as om oor God of oor die geloof aan die woord te kom. Ons leuse sê dus watter waardes (waarheid, wysheid, lig) vir ons belangrik is in ons selfverstaan as universiteit, en die rol wat ons vervul in ons land. Hier is dus weer 'n skuif: van God na die praktiese uitleef van dit wat ons is.

wapen en leuse



Ons het dit baie goed oorweeg voordat ons besluit het om in die 2011-leuse nie iets oor God te sê nie. Teologiese advies in hierdie verband het die volgende uitgewys:

- Geen enkele sin kan die Here God na sy eie reg onder woorde bring nie. Die leuse In Deo Sapientiae Lux skiet ver te kort aan dit wat die Bybel oor die Here sê: dit sê byvoorbeeld nikks oor geregtigheid, sonde of oor Christus nie.
- Die teenwoordigheid en eer van God word ook nie gewaarborg deur sy Naam in 'n leuse op te neem nie. Dit kan maklik 'n menslike uitsprake oor God word waarmee (onbedoeld) die 2de en/of 3de gebod oortree word.
- Die leuse In Veritate Sapientiae Lux bevat in sigself nikks waarmee Christene en die Christelike geloof nie volle vrede kan hê nie. Die formulering skep juis vir Christene die ruimte om met hierdie leuse op weg te gaan in hulle diens aan die Here God by studie, onderrig en navorsing.
- Deur die Naam van God nie in 'n leuse te noem nie, beteken nie dat God daarvan aan die UV afwesig verklaar of verwijder word nie. So 'n redenasiestry teen die almag en alomteenwoordigheid van God. Hy laat sy teenwoordigheid nie inskryf of uitskryf nie.
- In die waardegedrewe leuse is daar 'n reikwydte gegee wat verseker dat die universiteit as instelling teen niemand diskrimineer, geen godsdiensstige tradisie of geloofsoortuiging uitsluit of aan die UV laat onwelkom voel nie. Dit is in lyn met die wese en praktyk van die Christelike geloof. Hiermee het ons iets van die werklike bedoeling van die "Christelike karakter" laat voortleef.

Die verandering van ons leuse kan nie gesien word as 'n verandering van die wese van die universiteit nie.

Hart van die universiteit | Die UV het tot stand gekom in 'n arm, verpletterde provinsie. 'n Universiteit was die grootste geskenk wat aan hierdie provinsie gegee kon word om met akademiese integriteit jongmense toe te rus, te onderrig, te vorm en aan geleerdheid te help om in die samelewings 'n saakmakende impak te gaan vergestalt. Dit wil die UV wees in ons land. Die beste vir almal. 'n Tuiste van akademiese uitmuntendheid. **B**



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Tiny, yet they can change the world

For the first time in ages, I was privileged to step into the Microbial Biochemical and Food Biotechnology laboratories. What many people would normally call “goggas” were the drawing factor. The terrestrial nematodes are invertebrates that could survive extreme conditions like heat, radioactivity and pressure, just like bacteria.

In June 2011 these little worms made it into the acclaimed science journal *Nature*. The fact that there is living proof of their existence is not only changing our knowledge of life in the hot, unbearable depths of earth, but opens the possibilities of life in outer space.

Prof. Esta van Heerden manages and leads the Extreme Biochemistry group at the UFS. The research was funded by her research grants. She was the 2009 Young Scientist Prize winner and is a member of the South African Society of Biochemistry and Molecular Biology since 1992. She has supervised and co-supervised 24 honours, 19 M.Sc.s. and ten Ph.D.s. and is supervising three honours, three M.Sc and seven Ph.D. students. She has also contributed to the making of *Naked Science: Journey through the Crust*, filmed at TauTona Mine in 2008 and the Discovery Documentary BBC series *The Seven Wonders of the Solar System*.

The search for the nematodes began in earnest in 2007. A massive sampling campaign in 2008-2009 in several mines led to the discovery of several nematodes and the new nematode species *Halicephalobus mephisto* (named after the work of Faust where the devil, also known as the lord of the underworld, is called Mephisto). It was not easy to capture the little creature.

Crucial in the research was the elimination of the possibility that the nematodes recovered were recent

contaminations. Several thousand litres of mine water (used for cooling equipment and drinking) were filtered and turned out to be negative, thereby excluding the possibility of man-induced contamination. Based on Carbon-14 dating and Tritium content the nematodes could have resided in the deep up to 12 000 years.

Prof. Van Heerden says the importance of multicellular animals living in the ultradeep subsurface is two-fold. Firstly the nematodes found, eat bacteria, and as such they graze on the existing bacterial population and influence their turnover. Secondly, if more complex multicellular organisms can survive in the deep subsurface on earth this may be good news when looking for life on other planets where the surface is considered too inhospitable (e.g. Mars).

The discovery also means that complex life forms can be found in ecosystems previously thought to be uninhabitable; this expands the possibilities into new areas where new organisms will be found.

Prof. Van Heerden says: “People thought that there is no life at such temperatures or depths of the deep mines in South Africa.”

Prof. Gaetan Borgonie, Ghent University, Belgium, initiated the study in 2006. The project was a success through the involvement of Ms Christelle van Rooyen, Mr Armand Bester and Dr Antonia Garcia in collaboration with Prof. T.C. Onstott, Princeton University, USA.

The research carries on. Prof. Van Heerden says: “We will examine the physiological make-up that helps keep these creatures alive. It also takes 10 000 litres of water to find one adult worm, and yes we do have a lot of them in our laboratory,” said Prof. van Heerden. They are working at keeping the worms alive for the next phase of discoveries.

Apart from the work on the nematode, the deep-mine projects might hold the key to other issues and other micro-organisms that could be used for environmental cleanup. This will help continents where water contamination is a serious issue.

“The new systems are self-sustaining and require little supervision, thus it is to the bugs saving our planet,” said Prof. van Heerden. ■

Die opening het op Vrouedag, 9 Augustus, plaasgevind en sowat vyftig mense het die geleentheid bygewoon. Onder hulle was personeel, studente, asook lede van die UV-Raad.

Die Vrouegedenktuin bestaan uit 'n botaniese tuin met meer as tachtig plantspesies. Die fokuspunt is 'n suil waarin 'n wildevyeboom geplant is. Die gedenktuin is deur Habitat Landskapargitekte ontwerp.

Prof. Driekie Hay, Viserektor: Akademies, het gesê die gedenktuin is 'n teken van hoe ver die Universiteit van die Vrystaat gekom het. Vroue moet trots wees op hulle prestasies. Die doel van Vrouedag is om die historiese stryd en opofferinge van alle Suid-Afrikaanse vroue te vier, veral diegene wat teen rassisme en seksisme geveg het.

"Die veelvuldige sade van die boom verteenwoordig eenheid en duï op ware begrip, kennis en geloof, kenmerke wat vroue by die UV moet nastreef om 'n volhoubare en welvarende toekoms vir die UV te verseker," het sy gesê.

Die gedenktuin is 'n lewende monument. Die UV-leierskap gaan begin met 'n proses om vroue, wat aansienlike bydraes gelewer het in die universiteit se bestaan van 108 jaar, te identifiseer en erkenning aan hulle te verleen.

Mnr. Siegwart Küsel, die argitek wat verantwoordelik was vir die ontwerp, het gesê dit is so ontwikkel dat dit 'n lewende monument vir vroue bly. Daar word gehoop dat die tuin 'n aktiewe leerarea vir besoekers sal word. **B**

Chemistry research gets fresh momentum

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Chemistry research at our university extends over a whole field that are not only of benefit for human beings but are also for the betterment of the world we live in. This research got new emphasis with the opening the newly, upgraded world-class research centre on the Bloemfontein Campus.

The upgrading of the building, which has taken place over a period of five years, is the UFS's largest single financial investment in a long time. The building itself has been renovated at a cost of R60 million and, together with the new equipment acquired, the total investment exceeds R110 million. The university has provided the major part of this, with valuable contributions from Sasol and the South African Research Foundation (NRF), which each contributed more than R20 million for different facets and projects.

Prof. Andreas Roodt, Head of the Department of Chemistry, says the department's specialist research areas includes

X-ray crystallography, electrochemistry, synthesis of new molecules, the development of new methods to determine rare elements, water purification, as well as the measurement of energy and temperatures responsible for phase changes in molecules, the development of agents to detect cancer and other defects in the body, and many more.

"We have top expertise in various fields, with some of the best equipment and currently competing with the best laboratories in the world. We have collaborative agreements with more than twenty national and international chemistry research groups of note.

"Currently we are providing inputs about technical aspects of the acid mine water in Johannesburg and vicinity, as well as the fracking in the Karoo in order to release shale gas."

New equipment installed during the upgrading action comprises:

- X-ray diffractometers (R5 million) for crystal research.
- Differential scanning calorimeter (DSC) for thermographic analyses (R4 million).
- Nuclear-magnetic resonance (NMR: Bruker 600 MHz; R12 million, one of the most advanced systems in Africa).
- High-performance Computing Centre (HPC, R5 million).
- Catalytic and high-pressure equipment (R6 million; some of the most advanced equipment in the world).
- Reaction speed equipment (Kinetics: R5 million; some of the most advanced equipment in the world). **B**

Odeion Skool vir Musiek vestig homself

Die Odeion Skool vir Musiek het in 2011 prestasies op een nasionale en internasionale verhoog na die ander opgelewer. Een van hulle was Teresa de Wit, wat haar by van die wêreld se mees talentvolle sangers by die International Summer Academy in Salzburg aangesluit het. Sy het meestersklasse deur die hoogaangeskrewe sopraan Barbara Bonney in Salzburg, Oostenryk bygewoon.

Die bekende Odeion-handelsmerk, wat sinoniem met musiek van hoë gehalte in die Vrystaat en ook in Suid-Afrika en internasionaal geword het, is in 2011 verder verstewig met die totstandkoming van die Odeion Skool vir Musiek.

Die voormalige Departement Musiek is omvorm tot die Odeion Skool vir Musiek (OSM). Die stap is in lyn met die korporatiewe oorgang wat by die UV plaasvind om die progressiewe en dinamiese strewe na uitnemendheid te weerspieël wat deur die UV se Visekanselier en Rektor, prof. Jonathan Jansen, en sy bestuursgroep, onderskryf word.

'n Aantal suksesvolle en gerespekteerde ensembles funksioneer onder die Odeion-handelsmerk. Dit sluit in die residensiële Odeion-strykkwartet, studente-ensembles, die Junior Odeion-strykkwartet, die Odeion-sinfonia en die Odeionkoor.

Volgens prof. Nicol Viljoen, voorsitter van die OSM, is die naamsverandering geïnspireer deur die volgende doelwitte: Die idee van 'n skool binne die Fakulteit Geesteswetenskappe reflekter nie net 'n akademiese profiel wat reg laat geskied aan die departement se doelwit om homself te herposioneer nie, maar



simuleer ook die identiteit van die eenheid wat diverse tematiese entiteite insluit – nie net vanuit 'n akademiese perspektief nie, maar ook vanuit 'n gemeenskaps- en kulturele perspektief. Die eenheid doen dit deur dienste te verskaf wat kuns-in-uitvoering, die verskaffing van fasiliteite, asook 'n sterk klem op gemeenskapsontwikkeling insluit.

Vanuit 'n internasionale perspektief bied dit aanloklike moontlikhede met betrekking tot bemarking en publisiteit, en om die identiteit van die eenheid te weerspieël.

Die nuwe naam maak voorsiening vir meer buigsaamheid om die profiel te komplementeer met nuwe ontwikkelings. Dit sluit in onder meer in die benutting van voortreflike internasionale kundiges asook artistieke genote, lidmaatskap tot progressiewe Europese, gesamentlik-ontwikkelde graadprogramme en kurrikuluminitiatiewe, die vestiging van 'n leerstoel in orkesdirigering, 'n meestersgraad in Kunstabstuur asook die insluiting van biokinetika in die onderrigmetodologie van uitvoerpraktyk.

Vanuit 'n bestuursperspektief kan dit ook die benadering tot spesialisering in skaars vaardighede konsolideer.

Om momentum aan te OSM se beelduitbouing te gee, is mnr. Marius Coetzee as Innovasiebestuurder aangestel. Hy is die voormalige projekbestuurder van die Europese Graad in Internasionale Musiekbestuur – 'n gesamentlike graadinisiatief tussen drie universiteite van Noorweë, Nederland en Finland, wat deur die EU in Brussel befonds word. Mnr. Coetzee sal aspekte soos internasionalisering, bemarking, proaktiewe werwingstrategieë, kurrikulumontwikkeling en innoverende onderrigmetodologie ontwikkel en ondersoek. ■

Twee prosedures het ons universiteit in 2011 op die voorfront van die mediese wêreld geplaas.

In een operasie is 'n groot gewas uit 'n man se hart verwyder en 'n hartkamer oorgebou en in die ander is 'n spesiale nuwe aortiese klep vir die eerste keer in Suid-Afrika oorgeplant.

Carl Botes (51) van Hoopstad in die Vrystaat sou dit beslis nie geglo het as hy moes hoor dat hy saam met 'n span van die UV se Departement Kardiotorakschirurgie met 'n baanbreker-operasie geskiedenis sou maak nie. Enkele maande voor die operasie het hy nog die trappe van die Universitas-hospitaal uitgehardloop.

Dit was ook net genade dat die gewas in sy hart ontdek is. 'n Span chirurge onder leiding van prof. Francis Smit, Hoof van die departement, het in 2011 opehartchirurgie op mnr. Botes uitgevoer om 'n kwaadaardige gewas in sy hart te verwyder. Wat hierdie operasie uniek maak, is dat die verdagte massa wat in die hart geïdentifiseer is,

vinnig gegroeи het en 'n hoogs indringende hartgewas was, wat nog slegs by 'n klein hoeveelheid pasiënte wêreldwyd gesien is.

Prof. Smit sê sonder die nodige chirurgie of 'n hartoorplanting sou die prognose vir die pasiënt nul wees. Die gewas is uiters skaars en feitlik geen literatur bestaan daaroor nie. Die soort operasie, wat gegrond is op prosedures wat gewoonlik op kinders uitgevoer word, word hoogstens elke vyf jaar in Suid-Afrika gedoen. Tydens die hoogs-ingewikkelde operasie van 10 uur, uitgevoer by die Universitas Akademiese Hospitaal in Bloemfontein, moes die hele regterhartkamer verwijder word en die hart geherkonstrueer word.

Mnr. Botes het die operasie bo 'n oorplanting verkies. Alhoewel beide opsies groot risiko's en uitdagings sou inhou, was die hartoorplanting die minste haalbaar weens logistieke redes, die waglys vir ontvangers en die tekort aan skenkers.

- Die voordeel van hierdie nuwe aortiese klep is dat dit deur die vel, deur middel van 'n kateter in die lies, ingeplant kan word. Dit skakel dus ingrypende chirurgie uit. **R**

UFS hosts ANC dialogues as part of 100 year celebrations



During the seminars well-known political commentators and intellectuals such as Prof. William Gumede, Colin Bundy and Ben Turok delivered speeches

on a range of topics on the history of the ANC.

Prof. Ben Turok, head of Political Education for the ANC in Parliament, told a packed Odeion Theatre that the ANC Centenary provided a moment of reflection. Speaking about the "Evolution of Economic Policy Thinking" he advised the ruling party not to neglect the poor and uneducated.

Prof. Colin Bundy, a former professor at the University of Oxford and former Vice-Chancellor and Principal of the University of Witwatersrand, led a discussion on the ANC and the SACP in exile. He told the audience that exile has left a deep imprint on today's ANC and Communist Party, profoundly shaping their leadership, practices and political cultures. Other speakers tackled topics on the ANC and the international community, the history of breakaways from the ANC and some of its former leaders.

The dialogue series continues this year and ends with a debate on 13 June 2012. Before then two seminars focusing on the ANC Women's and Youth League will be held. According to Prof. Kwandiwe Kondlo, head of our Centre for Africa Studies, all papers presented at the seminar will be updated for publication in a book or journal. ■

Study abroad is a life-

“ **W**e are more similar than different” – First-year students on a journey to embrace similarities and learn from their differences

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The student standing beside me at a traffic light waiting to cross one of the busiest streets in Times Square, New York City, looked completely overwhelmed. I took her hand and said: “Stay with me. I’ll show you around.” She was one of the many students on the Leadership for Change Programme who had travelled abroad for the first time. Three weeks later we met again at the debriefing session on our Bloemfontein Campus, and she blew me away: “I have grown, I’ve learnt about myself and about life. I want to change the world!”

In 2010 our university became the first tertiary institution in South Africa to invest hugely in its first-year class by sending 71 students to visit seven universities in the USA. The aim: to learn about diversity, leadership and citizenship in order to change and enrich the minds of these young leaders, who have committed to building a truly non-racial community during and beyond their university years.

Due to the success of the programme, the number of students and partner universities more than doubled in 2011 with 150 first-year students being given the opportunity to travel to universities in the USA, Europe and Asia.

The stringent selection process included a panel interview during which students had to present their views on diversity, leadership and citizenship.



The 2011 programme kicked off with 99 students visiting universities in the USA such as Cornell University, New York University, Binghamton State University, Appalachian State University, Cleveland State University, the University of Massachusetts, the University of Minnesota and College of the Holy Cross from 22 September–7 October 2011. Another three groups consisting of 18 students visited Ghent and Antwerp Universities in Belgium and the University for the Humanistics in the Netherlands. Groups consisted of between eight and ten students and were accompanied by mentors and tour leaders.

The rest of the students visited universities in Japan, France, the USA and Europe from 8–20 January 2012.

At the farewell in Bloemfontein Prof. Jonathan Jansen, Vice-Chancellor and Rector, said to the students: “Do not come back the same; do not come back alone. Make friends, share experiences and explore.”

Travelling with three of the groups were journalists from Sunday Times, Mail & Guardian and Media24, who reported about the programme on our invitation. I accompanied the journalist who spent time with the group visiting the New York University (NYU).

At the orientation session in New York before the groups departed for their various universities, Mr Rudi Buys, Dean of Student Affairs, said “Give yourself time to differently look at those in your group – identify your shared humanity and learn to discover and celebrate one another’s uniqueness. Discover how difference, instead of sameness, can be the reason for meeting wonderful people and building meaningful friendships. Choose to get to know someone you normally would not, that person in your group you consider most different to you. Celebrate what you share and explore together the gift of how you differ.”


While listening to and looking at the students at the session, I wondered how they would experience their time in the USA. Some participated with great excitement. Some listened attentively without saying a word. “This is a lot to comprehend,” my student friend whispered to me walking back to the hotel.

The programmes of partner institutions included the attendance of classes with other students, lectures and presentations by students and staff, sport, social and

community events. Our students stayed in residence on the campuses, youth hostels and in private homes.

The NYU group – who stayed in a youth hostel in Chelsea – visited among others the Business for Sports School, one of 400 high schools in the city; as well as a nursery school in Chinatown. They attended classes, went to a church service and attended class with the university's Martin Luther King Scholars.

I also met up with the groups visiting Cornell and Binghamton Universities and attended their farewell functions at these universities. Some of the feedback from the Cornell group included: "I enjoyed the interaction between lecturers and students in lecture halls; the students see me first as a person and not my colour; the students have a passion for education and really want to be educated". A student to the Binghamton University said: "I have realised once again how proud I am of my country; the students here are more accommodating of each other in terms of language and we can learn from them; I had to find myself and where I stand with my view on transformation."

More responses were aired at the debriefing session in Bloemfontein. Rudi reminded the group the students they might feel isolated from friends who did not share the experience. "You now feel sameness as a group. Your sameness has to do with what we have shared. If you want to be a pioneer of change, you must be prepared to also walk a lonely road. It's okay to regress, but don't

stay there. Monitor yourself and have a considered response. Be aware of slipping back to the sameness you had before joining the programme."

I met my student friend at the debriefing. She was smiling: "This is an experience of a lifetime. I know I can make a difference, even how small. I know I can become the leader I want to be."

Rudi says the study-abroad experience is only the start of an intensive year-long programme during which the 150 students will be developed to become leaders in the different areas of student life on our campuses. These students will be the leaders of tomorrow. They will take up leadership positions in our formal student-representative council, student organisations, residence committees and other leadership formations.

The students started with leadership dialogue forums early this year and will also play a vital role in facilitating the entrance of first-year students to our university during the 2012 Gateway First-Year's College.

Together with students from the 2010 programme, they will also assist with organising and taking part in the first Global Student Exchange Partner Summit, which will take place from 8-22 July 2012 on the Bloemfontein Campus. The aim of the summit is for first-year students from our partner universities in the USA, Europe and Asia to visit us and experience student life at a South African university, Rudi says. **B**

Bloemfonteinensis 'n nuweling tot gisversameling

“ “ Die UV het nou die grootste gisversameling in die Suidelike Halfmond. Oral in die wêreld is die wetenskap besig om ondersoeke te doen wat biodiversiteit bevorder. Hierdie bevorder vir seker die UV se biodiversiteit.”

So sê prof. Jacobus Albertyn van die Departement Mikrobiële, Biochemiese en Voedselbiotegnologie. Hy en kollegas dr. Carlien Pohl en prof. Martie Smit het vier nuwe gissoortes ontdek en dié mikroorganismes wetenskaplik beskryf. Een van hierdie giste is egter geïsoleerd uit 'n grondmonster wat dr. Pohl al in 2000 van onder 'n denneboom by die t-aansluiting van Jock Meiringstraat en Paul Krugerlaan in Bloemfontein geneem het.



“Hierdie spesie is werklik 'n nuwe ontdekking in die veld van mikroorganismes,” sê dr. Pohl. Die gissoort is dan ook deur hulle na Bloemfontein vernoem. Die wetenskaplike benaming hiervoor is *Rhodotorula bloemfonteinensis*. ‘Rhodo’ verwys daarna dat dit 'n rooi soort gissoort is. Die beskrywing van hierdie vier giste is ook in die 1 September 2011-uitgawe van die *International Journal of Systematic and Evolutionary Microbiology* te sien.

Maar wat presies is 'n gis?

Volgens prof. Albertyn is dit 'n mikroorganisme wat deel is van die fungi-familie. “Die bekendste gis is byvoorbeeld bakkersgis, waarvan bloemfonteinensis deel is,” sê hy.

Hoewel twee van die ander giste van Maleisië afkomstig is, het hulle onlangs ook besef dat *Rhodotorula pini* op die UV se Bloemfontein-kampus in Desember 1995 ontdek is. Dus is daar dan twee van hierdie mikroorganismes wat hul oorsprong in Bloemfontein het.

“Ons het aanvanklik giste begin soek om dit na geurstowwe om te sit,” sê prof. Smit. Maar die giste self was later so interessant dat hulle daar vasgesteek het.



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A long-awaited book that celebrates South Africa's greatest teachers has finally hit the shelves. Two of our students assisted Prof. Jonathan Jansen, Vice-Chancellor and Rector, to compile the book.

Nangamso Koza and Lihlumelo Toyana started working on the book in February 2011. They had received overwhelming responses from people of all walks of life about their greatest teacher. Ultimately, 128 stories form part of the book *Great South African Teachers*. Some of the stories highlight the dedication of teachers

who did all they could to bring forth the potential of learners. "Mentorship dates back to those times; it is not a new thing or a new word. What made it work was the willingness to give knowledge to the learners," said Lihlumelo.

Nangamso elaborated: "The book serves to affirm us that education can reunite the nation. It was an honour for both of us to travel back to the 1950s of the Bantu Education System. To read about other people's personal experiences, learn how they made it despite the circumstances."

South Africa needs to look at ways and means of applying a gainful employment policy, says Lihlumelo. Teachers need to work in an environment that will encourage and motivate them. "Teaching should be given back its respect as a profession. I hope the book becomes a motivation to teachers and learners alike. This was a humbling experience and it makes me value teachers even more." **B**



**Sculptures bring a new dimension
to Bloemfontein Campus**

A red tree, a bull rider and a bench in the shape of Adam and Eve are some of the visual forms you might encounter when taking a stroll on the Bloemfontein Campus. These are part of a collection of public artworks by renowned South African artists that have been installed in gardens, on footpaths and in foyers around the campus.

Over the past three years the Lotto Sculpture-on-Campus Project, with support from a grant made available by the National Lottery Distribution Trust Fund, has commissioned artists to create permanent public sculptures for the university's art collection. The main focus behind the project is to set up diverse and site-specific artworks that promote a greater understanding, respect and appreciation of cultural differences and to instil a sense of belonging in all staff and students.

The project has been inspired by the creation of an array of humanising spaces, designed to enrich the educational and multicultural experience of students by stimulating intercultural dialogue and bringing about conversation around the artworks. The collection of artworks is unique to the UFS as no other South African university hosts such a diverse collection of public sculptural artworks.

Amongst the artworks engaging viewers across the campus is a three-metre high fig-wood sculpture in front of the entrance of the Computer Laboratory near Thakaneng Bridge entitled *Unity is power: Let us be united*. The sculpture depicts several grouped figures and celebrates the coming together of many diverse people. It was created by Noriah Mabasa, who is the only Venda female artist to have been recognised for carved wooden sculptures and who has received the Order of the Baobab in Silver Award, which is the highest accolade received by a visual artist in South Africa.

In the vicinity of Mabasa's wooden sculpture is *Bull rider* (left). The artwork was created by Willie Bester who is considered one of South Africa's most important "struggle" artists. He has created a cluster of three life-size sculptural pieces constructed from agricultural and mechanical machinery mainly sourced from local scrap yards. The artwork comprises of a bull, which is an animal significant in many

cultures, a bull rider who sits on the bull gesturing the way forward and a walking figure guiding the bull. The sculpture is a satirical view of a power struggle which raises questions about our social demographic, but at the same time alludes that we are all interconnected and dependent on one other.

In Strijdom van der Merwe's *Tree of knowledge* installed in front of the Education Department at the Winkie Direko Building, the root-like forms of the tree that protrude out of the ground double as benches. This gives the sculpture a unique quality that enables students and staff to interact with it and celebrates the notion that exists in many African traditions of teaching and coming together beneath a tree.

Similar in concept is the *Philosophers' Circle* suited in the garden behind the West Block of the Main Building. The mosaic artwork is loosely based on the idea of a *lekgotla* with the intention of creating a space where discussions and informal lectures can take place. The eight concrete balls, arranged in a circle, is a meeting place for students to share and learn from one another and the references in the artwork to the Free State map, landscapes, Basotho Litema textiles and the cosmos are visual motifs which inspire dialogue and contemplation. The *Philosophers' Circle* is a collaborative work by local artists Jaco Spies (lecturer at the Department of Fine Arts), Loki Maselwane, Tshegofatso Seoco Marogoa, Itumeleng Moamogwa and Dina Grobler.

Other works in the collection include seven sculptural benches by Venda artist Azwifarwi Ragimana positioned in the garden behind the West Block, *Walking Fish* by Thomas Kubayi suited at the fountain in the Red Square and an impressive thirteen-metre long mosaic entitled *Melodi ya matsha* (Birth of rhythm) in the Odeion foyer by artist Kagiso Pat Mautloa in collaboration with the Spier Architectural Arts in Cape Town.

The project's biggest artwork, *Thinking stone*, a 32-ton black granite rock, by one of South Africa's most established artists Willem Boshoff, was delivered in October 2011. **B**





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Vir ons universiteit is dit belangrik om by ons gemeenskappe betrokke te raak, en twee gemeenskapsprojekte waarop ons besluit het, is die UV-Skolevennootskapsprojek en die Extreme Make-over for Schools-projek.

Met die UV-Skolevennootskapsprojek werk die universiteit vir 'n periode van drie tot vyf jaar nou saam met 23 skole om dié skole te help om toppresteerders te word waarop die onderwysers, leerders en ouers trots kan wees. Die skole is in 2010 geïdentifiseer en die aanvoerwerk vir die projek is ook in 2010 gefinaliseer.

Die verbetering in die skole se resultate spreek vanself: Bainsvlei-gecombineerde skool: van 14,3% (2009) tot 100% in 2011; Ntemoseng Senior Sekondêre Skool van 36,84% (2009) tot 93,87%; Hodisa Tegniese Skool van 35,98% (2009) to 85,36%; Moroka Senior Sekondêre Skool van 76,92% (2010) to 84,8%, en nog talle op die lys.

Die UV se betrokkenheid in die Extreme Make-over for Schools-projek sluit onder meer 'n vennootskap

met die Departement van Basiese Onderwys en die Bloemfontein-sakegemeenskap in om saam te werk om 'n aantal nuut-opgradeerde skole aan leerders, onderwysers en die gemeenskap bekend te stel. Bloemfontein-Oos Intermediêre Skool is die eerste skool in Bloemfontein om 'n totale vernuwing te ondergaan.

Dié skool het 'n ooreenkoms met twee sekondêre skole aangegaan waarby hy 'n voedingskool vir sowel Kagisho en Tsotseletso Sekondêre Skole sal word. Laasgenoemde skole is ook begunstigdes van die UV-Skolevennootskapsprojek.

Dr. Choice Makhetha, Viserektor: Eksterne Betrekkinge (waarnemend) sê: "Wanneer 'n mens 'n skool ondersteun, berei 'n mens leerders voor om by die kultuur van die universiteit te kan inskakel. Die vennootskap stel ons nie net in staat om leerders reeds van 'n vroeë ouderdom vir universiteit voor te berei nie, maar ook deur hul hoëskoolloopbaan. Kom ons maak hierdie projek 'n model vir Suid-Afrika."

Die betrokkenheid van die UV en vennote by die Bloem-Oos-skool sluit in:

- Die Project for Peace: 'n Sakrekenaarprojek waar leerders geleer sal word hoe om 'n wetenskap-sakrekenaar behoorlik te gebruik.
- Die Musiek-projek: Die Odeion Skool vir Musiek gaan 'n musiekprogram by die skool vestig.
- Die Tafel-projek: Die regmaak van alle gebreekte lessenaars van al 23 die skole, wat by die UV se Skolevennootskapsprojek betrokke is. ■



Rock 'n Round... the classroom

Concerts of stars like Cliff Richard and Neil Diamond, and a movie like *Mamma Mia! The Movie*, will probably never be the same for some researchers at our Faculty of Education. A group of lecturers studied these shows to achieve better results in the classroom.

Jannie Pretorius said the study sets out to answer three questions: Can educators learn from the arts about their professional practices? Can one, by studying Neil Diamond's artistry, illustrate the suitability of the interdisciplinary model of aesthetic understanding as a descriptive model of the learning process? And, is it possible to compile a body or network of applicable,

scientifically sound educational knowledge from appreciative inquiry into the work of, for instance, Neil Diamond so as to support the use and validity of an aesthetic approach to staff development?

Colleagues who participated in the research were Stephan du Toit, Glynnis Daries and Colwyn Martin.

Jannie says they are confident that it is possible to use the arts in general and pop music/films specifically in the training of some student teachers, and thus as a source of solutions to common problems in teacher training and lesson presentation. Educators can learn from the arts about their educational practices. The study participants indicated that they learned from Diamond about, inter alia, the interaction between themselves and the learners in their classes, that his passion inspires them, and that educators, too, have to prepare thoroughly – insights with which the educational fraternity are naturally familiar.

"What is, however, new is that the educators in this study were able to come to these insights while attending

an enjoyable Neil Diamond concert, and that they could learn from him about educational practices and qualities. We are not aware of any similar studies," Jannie said. "We should like to believe that educationalists, once they are aware of the arts as a potential platform for professional development, would be empowered to achieve in their pursuit of this kind of development. Every film, piece of music, painting, sculpture and play to which educators are exposed can afterwards – at the conscious and cognitive level – serve as a platform for reflection and professional development."

Common attributes exist between aesthetic experiences and educational experiences, and between artistry in the worlds of the arts and education. By means of interdisciplinary connections the attributes of artists and aesthetic experiences can be identified and then serve as direction indicators for the solution of problems in the classroom, Jannie says.

Artists have to know how to get and keep the attention of their audiences, and teachers, by studying their artistry and performances, can identify strategies used by artists

that might be useful in classrooms.

During a workshop twenty teachers from a secondary school in Bloemfontein studied a performance of Cliff Richard and attributes of his performance and artistry were analysed.

The relevance of these attributes for problems in South African classrooms and for the creation of exceptional learning experiences was defined:

- The interaction between him and his audience – he is now closer to his audience, and they know the lyrics of the songs.
- He now uses better technology, a bigger stage and a big band.
- He still enjoys performing and is enthusiastic about his performance.
- His neat clothes and his professional appearance.
- He passionately immerses himself in his performance.
- Good planning
- Create variation and variety. B



n Spesialeloodsprojek is op 'n landgoed buite Bloemfontein bekendgestel met die oog op die bewaring en bestudering van kameelperde in die Kgalagadi-oorgrensspark tussen Suid-Afrika en Botswana.

Die doel van die projek is om die wetenskaplike basis te voorsien wat nodig is om in die toekoms besluite te neem wat in die beste belang van die kameelperde van die park sal wees en behels die toerus van die diere met halsbande en die monitoring van hulle gedrag en bewegings deur middel van GPS.

Met die openbare belangstelling in kameelperde

en die toenemende impak van die groeiende kameelperdbevolking as grondslag, het SANParke die verskuiving van 'n aantal van Kgalagadi se kameelperde oorweeg. Weens beperkte inligting aangaande hulle aanpassingsukses en die potensiële impak op hulle nuwe omgewing, is deeglike beplanning en die daaropvolgende monitering van die spesie nodig.

Mnr. Francois Deacon van die UV het besluit om 'n Ph.D.-studie te onderneem om die bestaande uitdagings aan te spreek. Hierdie is die eerste projek van sy soort met kameelperde. Hy sê hy het op hierdie projek besluit as gevolg van sy liefde vir diere en bewaring. "Kameelperde bestaan uit nege subspesies waarvan sewe reeds bedreig is. Ek wil mense hierby betrek en hulle bewus maak van die nood waarin die diere verkeer en die behoefté aan bewaring."

Dr. Floris Coetzee, 'n veearts, het 'n bul op die landgoed verdoof sodat hy 'n halsband met GPS-toerusting aangebring kon word. Die halsbande is ontwerp en gemaak deur mnr. Martin Haupt, wat uitgebreide ervaring in die ontwerp van soortgelyke halsbande in ander navorsingstudies opgedoen het.

UV help met bewaring van kameelperde

Dit het mnr. Deacon meer as 'n jaar geneem om die halsbandproses en die studie wat daarvan gepaard gaan, te beplan. Hy sê fondse is die grootste uitdaging vir die projek, aangesien dit ongeveer R500 000 sal kos en oor 'n tydperk van vyf jaar sal strek. Die projek word deur die landgoed, raadgewende ingenieurs asook deur Navorsingsontwikkeling aan die UV ondersteun.

As die loodsprojek suksesvol is, sal tussen vier en agt kameelperde in die Kgalagadi opgespoor word met behulp van die GPS-satelliethalsbande. Die GPS-halsbande sal dit moontlik maak dat die bewegings van individuele kameelperde vir tot twee jaar deurlopend aangegeteken kan word. Dit sal die kontrolering en monitering van die diere in reële tyd moontlik maak.

Die hoofvoordele van die projek sluit onder meer in verbeterde besluitneming, insig in toerisme-ontwikkeling, opvoeding en gemeenskapsbetrokkenheid, groter volhoubaarheid en verbeterde oorgrens-samewerking tussen Suid-Afrika en Botswana. **B**

A student to be **proud of**

Not everyone can publish 14 scientific papers in accredited scientific journals in two years, but that dedication and enthusiasm separates Dr Douglas Nkosi from the flock. This top student in the Centre for Sustainable Agriculture, Rural Development and Extension at our university received his Ph.D. in 2011.

Born on 14 February 1965 in Nelspruit, Douglas currently serves as a researcher for Small Ruminant Nutrition in the Department of Animal Nutrition of the ARC Animal Production Institute (API) at Irene since 2006.

Douglas joined the Institute at Irene in 1990 as a research assistant with only matric. Here he was involved in in-vitro studies to determine the metabolites of different feeds. This stimulated his interest in Animal Science and in 1996 he started his studies for his National Diploma in Animal Production at the then Pretoria Technikon (now Tshwane University of Technology), which he completed in 1999. In 2000 he completed his B.Tech. at that institution.

He still wanted to study and completed his master's in Sustainable Agriculture, under the study guidance of Prof. Izak Groenewald, at our university in 2001, where he also received the award for the Best Achiever in the programme. Prof. Groenewald is head of the Centre for Sustainable Agriculture, Rural Development and Extension at our university.

Douglas continued with his Ph.D. studies and was awarded a Ph.D. in Sustainable Agriculture 2011. The title of his thesis is "Potato hash silage as an alternative feed resource for smallholder livestock production".

His research interests include:

- enhancing forage conservation and nutritive value with microbial inoculation and feed additives,
- food safety issues relating to forage fed livestock,
- development of alternative feeding strategies to local communities for sustainable rural agriculture,
- evaluation of methods that quantify on-farm animal performance changes.

Sy medelandsgenoot Dirk Kotze het sy meestersgraad in Volhoubare Ontwikkeling cum laude verwerf. Kotze het, nes Hangara, toe hy in 2000 sy meestersgraad voltooii het, die Sentrum vir Volhoubare Landbou en Uitbreiding se prys vir beste prestasie ontvang.

Prof. Izak Groenewald, hoof van die Sentrum vir Volhoubare Landbou en Uitbreiding, sê die aantreklikheid van dié kwalifikasie is dat studente voltyds kan werk en hul meestersgraad deur middel van afstandsonderrig deeltjys kan voltooï. Studente kom vanuit verskeie werksomgewings. Dit sluit in boere, konsultante, onderwysers, asook amptenare van landboukoöperasies, departemente van landbou, insetverskaffers, handelsbanke

In 2010, he was awarded the Norman Borlaug Fellowship Training Program by the USA Department of Agriculture (USDA), and was attached to the Kansas State University in Manhattan where he worked on a collaborative research project that evaluated the effects of bacterial inoculants and enzymes on the fermentation quality of sweet sorghum.

He is currently an internationally well reputed silage expert and has published 14 scientific papers in accredited scientific journals since 2009. He is a member and served as a sub-editor for *South African Journal of Animal Science*, and is regularly engaged in reviewing research papers for national and international scientific journals (such as *Animal Feed Science and Technology*) and research proposals for the National Research Foundation. He serves as a supervisor or co-supervisor for master's students and external examiner for local universities.





Prof. Kock, outstanding professor in the department, delivered keynote lectures at international conferences of repute in the USA, China and Greece. Teologie is nie net 'n manswêreld nie. Nuwe gesigte by die Fakulteit Teologie is bewys daarvan.

Me. Anlene Taljaard en me. Helené van Tonder het in die tweede semester van 2011 die eerste vroulike dosente in teologie geword om voltyds by die UV aangestel te wees. Anlene het aan die Stellenbosch Universiteit (SU) en ook die Vrye Universiteit Amsterdam, Nederland gestudeer.

Anlene sê: "My kennis is bevraagteken en uitgedaag deur die gemeenskap van Gugulethu, in besonder deur die lidmate van die JL Zwane Presbiteriaanse Gemeente van Gugulethu in Kaapstad." Vandaar dan ook haar navorsingsbelangstellings.

"Gugulethu beteken 'ons erfenis' en watter 'tipe erfenis' ons deur die toepassing van ons kennis nalaat. Dit bly 'n kritiese en meestal etiese vraagstuk. Ek stel daarom belang om na die verband tussen kerk en samelewing binne die Suid-Afrikaanse konteks te kyk en van die spesifieke teologiese bydrae tot die openbare sfere te ondersoek." Haar eie studie fokus tans op die hoëpriesterskap van Christus binne die gereformeerde tradisie.

Helené, wat self tot verlede jaar ook by die SU was en by die Umeå Universiteit vanaf Januarie tot Junie 2008 gestudeer het, meen dat haar belangstelling eerder deur "tendense in hedendaagse historiografie (soos beïnvloed deur filosofie van geskiedenis) en die invloed daarvan op kerkgeskiedenis geprikkel word. "Ek hou ook van fleiks wat my die volgende oggend fronsend laat wakker word. *Beautiful* is die mees onlangse voorbeeld hiervan."

Net soos Helené, haak Anlene ook nie net by die teologie vas nie.

"Reis, stap ingesluit, bly 'n groot lekkerte waardeur 'n mens altyd iets nuuts van jouself en ander ontdek en ook verwonderderd kan bly oor die wêreld waarin ons leef," vertel sy. "Ek geniet dit om kookboeke en resepte van ander plekke af huis toe te bring en hoop dat ek nog eendag my vriende met my kookvernuf sal kan beïndruk."

Daar lê volgens hierdie twee dames "*n wêreld van lees en dink en skryf voor*" waartydens hulle uitsien om die studente se leefwêrelde te leer ken en saam met hulle, asook hul kollegas, deel te raak van groter nasionale en internasionale teologiese gesprekke. ■

Charles Dumas brings a touch of Hollywood

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Professor Charles Dumas was appointed as extraordinary professor in the Drama and Theatre Department at the University of the Free State. This is very good news considering the video unit planned for the department, because Charles brings many years of Hollywood experience along.

With his warm American accent he humbly laughs off his exceptional curriculum vitae. "When you reach my age, you must have done something!"

It is clear from his qualifications and experiences that Charles has a rich and full life. Both academically and practically. He boasts a long list of theatre productions and films which he either directed, wrote, produced or starred in.

If you would like to see him in action, dust off your *Deep Impact* or *Die Hard III* DVD and look out for Jeff Worth or Agent Cross. And those of you who remember *Jake and the Fatman*, Rev. Styles was played by Charles.

Before Charles pursued acting, he was a lawyer. "The first time I came to South Africa was as a lawyer in 1978," he clarifies. Not that his first career prepared him for acting very much!

"Initially, I was not able to get cast for one single lawyer or judge role. Then I realised what I was doing wrong – I was playing a real lawyer! And a real lawyer would first of all try to avoid going to court. Secondly, that finger waving and cocky attitude, that is Hollywood style! But after I understood what the directors were looking for, my dull courtroom days were forever over."

Charles will be spending three months per year at Kovsies for three years. However in 2011, he was staying for six months to help develop filmmaking at the department.

A special moment was when Dumas' original play, *Our Fathers Daughters*, about two Afrikaner women opened the seminar on reconciliation. This seminar was sponsored by the International Institute for Studies in Race, Reconciliation and Social Justice. The play will later be made into a film.

During his stay he also directed *Seven Guitars* for the Grahamstown Arts Festival. The play was written by the premier African-American playwright August Wilson and picked because the circumstances are similar to the situation in South Africa. It was the first multicultural production of the play. Wilson wrote very specifically in a black American voice. Only blacks have played these roles. However, this culture is relatively foreign to all South Africans, regardless of colour.

And something that many people look forward to, is the Spike Lee Film Seminar. Again together with the International Institute for Studies in Race, Reconciliation and Social Justice, a nine-week seminar will be presented with the focus on the films of film maker Spike Lee. "Though American and South African race relations are different, emanating as they do from different histories, there are lessons to be learned from an interrogation of Lee's narratives and documentaries," Charles explains. Therefore a brief lecture by Charles will precede each film, placing it in American and South African context and followed by a town-hall type discussion on the issues of race and reconciliation.

"So far, I really like Kovsies. As Bishop Tutu observed, the students are amongst the happiest I have seen. I think your rector is a wise man with forward thinking ideas, yet he is approachable and down to earth," Charles talks about his time on campus.

He hopes to leave behind special skills and a medium through which South-Africans can tell their story. Through film. ■

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Die feit dat dr. Quintin Cilliers gedurende 2011 se herfsgradeplegtigheid by ons universiteit sy meestersgraad (LL.M.) gekry het, is nie huis nuus nie. Wat hy egter as die tema van sy verhandeling gekies het en uit die ervaring wysgeraak het, is wel indrukwekkend.

Dr. Cilliers het sy voorgraadse studies by Kovsies voltooi en sy LL.B.-graad in 2008 met lof verwerf. "Gedurende 2010 was ek by Webbers Prokureurs as 'n klerk werkzaam en het gepoog om my verhandeling te voltooi," sê hy. Uiteindelik het hy in 2011 sy meestergraad verwerf en is werkzaam as junior lektor in ons Departement Handelsreg.

Sy meestersgraadverhandeling ondersoek krities die toepassing en noodsaaklikheid van die reg om te staak, veral met betrekking tot werknemers wat in diens geneem is in 'n noodsaaklike diens. Die Suid-Afrikaanse regsposisie rakende die kwessie word uiteengesit en vergelyk met die regsposisies van die Internasionale Arbeidsorganisasie, die Verenigde Koninkryk en die Verenigde State van Amerika.

"Die tema van my verhandeling is baie relevant tot die arbeidsverhoudinge in Suid-Afrika tans," vertel dr. Cilliers. "My motivering vir die onderwerp het hoofsaaklik gekom van die staking in die openbare sektor in 2007, wat Suid-Afrika byna op 'sy knieé' gehad het. Ons land gaan steeds gebuk onder stakings, wat moontlik verreikende gevolge vir landsburgers kan inhou en daarom is dit belangrik om vas te stel wat die oorsake van die swak arbeidsverhoudinge is."

Dr. Cilliers se verhandeling toon dat die huidige Suid-Afrikaanse arbeidswetgewingsteorie baie goed is. Dit word ongelukkig swak toegepas en afgedwing, ten spyte

van die bepalings van die Wet op Arbeidsverhoudinge en die Grondwet van die Republiek van Suid-Afrika. Hierdie is duidelik uitgebeeld tydens die stakings in die openbare sektor in 2007, 2009 en 2010, waaraan menige noodsaklikdienstewerknemers deelgeneem het.

Ingevolge die Wet op Arbeidsverhoudinge word mense in dienste wat spesifiek as noodsaklike dienste geklassifiseer is, verbied om te staak. Voorbeeld van noodsaklike dienste sal die SAPS, verpleegsters, dokters en selfs soms munisipale werkers insluit. "Dit behoort dus duidelik te wees waarom hierdie dienste nie aan stakings behoort deel te neem nie. Ongelukkig is dit nie wat in werklikheid gebeur nie."

Die lande wat met Suid-Afrika vergelyk word, het elk verskillende wyses waarop dit stakings en noodsaklike dienste hanteer. Hieruit is dit duidelik dat die reg om te staak 'n belangrike internasionale instrument van kollektiewe onderhandeling is, maar ook dat elke land se noodsaklike dienste in gelyke mate belangrik is. Elke land plaas ten minste een of ander beperking op noodsaklikdienstewerknemers se reg om te staak.

Suid-Afrikaanse arbeidsreg is nie perfek nie en kan deur middel van regsvergelyking verbeter word. Hierdie verbetering, soos duidelik sal blyk, is noodsaklik vir die lewe, gesondheid en persoonlike veiligheid van elke individu in die land, sê hy.

Dr. Cilliers sê dat die verkryging van sy meestersgraad moontlik die belangrikste stap na 'n suksesvolle en betekenisvolle akademiese loopbaan was. "Ek kan werklik nie aan 'n beter tersiäre instelling dink waar ek dit sou wou doen nie. Die vriendelikheid, kundigheid en hulpvaardigheid van die akademiese en administratiewe personeel, soos dr. Jaco Deacon en prof. Elizabeth Snyman-Van Deventer, het my werklik gedra tydens die moeiliker dae en die tye waar ek 'writer's block' gehad het."

"Kovsies bied die beste geleenthede, sowel as die fasilitate en kundigheid, aan nagraadse studente om hul akademiese mikpunte te bereik, mits die student sy kant bring." ■

Hussein has a head

Considering all that Professor Hussein Solomon has done during his journey to the Department of Political Science you would expect to greet an old man with silver-grey hair. Think again!

As confidently as Hussein speaks about his field of interest, he greets in Afrikaans! Unlike most people involved in politics, you soon realise there is no hidden agenda here. Not that he is spared the sparks of a live in the “political eye”!

“My work on Islamic fundamentalism in South-Africa got me into trouble with some sectors of the Muslim community after it has been selectively quoted from by media. This then resulted in death threats against me and my family,” he explains.

According to Hussein, he was politicised at a young age, given the anti-apartheid movement. This led to his interest in history and politics. “I was involved in the Natal Indian Congress and the United Democratic Front and that pushed me to study politics further,” he says. Hussein was also an activist in that he worked as a conflict resolution expert for the African Centre for the Constructive Resolution of Disputes and Global Action to Prevent War as well as the Swiss Peace Foundation.

“I also honed my research skills at institutions like the Centre for Southern African Studies at the University of the Western Cape, the Institute for Security Studies, the Department of War Studies at King’s College, London and then the University of Pretoria,” Hussein elaborates on his career up to now. “I was attracted to the strong research ethos at Kovsies under the dynamic leadership of Prof. Jonathan Jansen,” he explains his move to central South Africa.

In Bloemfontein you will find Professor Hussein Solomon teaching a third-year module on Political Theory, an

honours module in International Relations Theory, and an honours module in War Economies. “The supervision of postgraduate students is another one of my key responsibilities, whilst also focusing on my current research.”

Hussein does not find an interest in politics, strange at all. In fact, it may be strange that people prefer to turn a blind eye. “The study of politics is essential for every person,” he says. “It arms one with the ability of making a difference in the life of your community and further afield.”

With so many accomplishments that one can tick off that “to-do” list that you have for your life, what else could you possibly still want to achieve? But Hussein is not nearly done in his effort to make a difference in the world. “Having published two books in 2011, I guess that right now, I am going less for quantity,” he takes a moment to think. “Maybe, like any writer would probably do, I am seeking that elusive ‘the publication’ which you will be remembered for. Something which would also have a practical aspect in making people’s lives better.”

When speaking to someone with so much experience, knowledge and insight into politics, it is difficult not to ask that one question on every South African’s mind: What is going to happen to us? Is there any hope, or are we beyond repair?

“Under the current leadership in South Africa, I have a dim view of South African politics,” he says the words that we hate to hear. “I believe that political instability will increase as a rapacious political elite spews out more populist slogans whilst at the same time filling their pockets.”

So, what do we do, you want to cry out. And when Hussein answers, he displays a part of his humorous self: “I try to adopt a more positive view by doubling my dosage of Prozac!”

But don’t despair, he says, there is hope. It all depends on your outlook on life, like his favourite slogan goes: “Hou moed, more is nog ‘n dag!” (Don’t despair, tomorrow is another day.)

Baby steps towards great strides for Hasina

At the Early Childhood Foundation Phase Education division, Professor Hasina Ebrahim and her team take great strides. Their vision is “Let’s join hands (care professions, policy makers, early educationists, NGOs) to Shape Strong Foundations for Young Children.”

The move towards this vision begins in dialogue at a September-month seminar. But Professor Hasina’s journey began many years ago.

“My journey to Kovsies relates to my passion to learn, grow and develop,” she says. She undertook many initiatives at the University of KwaZulu-Natal, but wanted a broader application for her work. “The warm reception at Kovsies and the support received thus far in my quest to broaden the horizons are most promising.” Through several initiatives planned Hasina intends making the Kovsies Early Childhood Foundation Phase division the best it can be. Plans are underway to engage students, staff, alumni, mentor teachers and the provincial department of education.

Her career highlight would have to be her Ph.D., she says. She explored the constructions of early childhood. “It was for the first time I really engaged with the idea that knowledge is socially constructed. This discovery was very powerful. I felt myself growing in multiple ways – personally, culturally, professionally and academically. I became deeply reflective and conscious of who I am and where I am heading in life.”

Where Hasina is now, and what she has accomplished, are many miles away from where she was as a little girl. Her spirit, however, has remained the same. “I grew up in an environment with scarce resources. But the one thing that both my dad and my mother instilled in me is that hard work will get you anywhere you want to go. I started dreaming of being a teacher and then acted it out with the flowers in the garden. When the seed is planted it seems like growth is inevitable. So here I am – in the professoriate and all.”

Her most valuable life lesson was that you can be anything if you dream, action your dreams and reflect. “I don’t let fear put the brakes on something that is morally good.”

And she dreams big for her next academic endeavour. “I would like to be heading the first Institute for Early Childhood Care and Education (birth to 9 years) dedicated to the aphorism: Think locally and Act globally. In other words, I want to, through the Institute, build academy for research to produce knowledge and action to expand global thought on early childhood.

“I feel that going down this path will be significant towards improving child outcomes in South Africa. I have a difficult task ahead but strongly believe that through inspired visionary leadership and a community of support, this is possible.”

To persevere in an academic career, that may often look dull and unappreciative, Hasina believes the best way is to get into it. “From the outside everything looks intimidating and unattractive. Once you are in it you begin to develop perspectives by virtue of being involved. So, roll up your sleeves, keep an open mind and just do it. The scenery changes and as it does you decide if you want to be an insider, an in-between or an outsider.”

“What I do in early childhood is not the work of a professor,” she explains, “rather, it is a passion of an individual who believes that she can change the contours of what exists (for the better of course) and against the many odds.”

And at home, this passionate professor is someone who juggles many roles, “but never forgetting the roles of being a friend, mother and a wife”. **B**

International organised has close

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Prof. Barry Rider, respected amongst others for the vital role he is playing in the struggle to combat money laundering and organised and economic crime, has a relationship of more than 20 years with our university.

In this time, he received the Doctor Legum (*honoris causa*) for his involvement with the drafting of money-laundering and insider-trading legislation. The university has also appointed him as Professor Honorarius in our Faculty of Law for his vast and pivotal role in international law reform as an academic law reformer.

Prof. Johan Henning, Dean of our Faculty of Law and Senior Fellow of the Institute of Advanced Legal Studies of which Prof. Rider is a director, said: "I am privileged to have been associated closely with the institute since 1988, which enables me to appreciate the nature and scope of the impressive changes effected by Prof. Rider. Under his leadership the institute was developed into a research institution of great value to the United Kingdom, the Commonwealth and especially Southern Africa."

Prof. Rider, researcher in mainly financial law and the control of economic crime, is not only respected by many colleagues in our Faculty of Law but he is also making a difference in the international legal arena, combating economic crime from the UK to the China as his book *The Prevention and Control of International Financial Crime* was published by the Central Bank of China. He is the only non-Chinese to be appointed by the Supreme People's Procuratorate (SPP) to advise on controversial cases, and he is also on the Standing Counsel to the Central Bank of China.

Although he has taught mainly at Cambridge and London Universities he has also delivered valuable contributions as an academic in various fields of law. Most impressively, he has supervised well over 200 successful Ph.D. candidates and over 130 successful M.Phil. candidates in areas such as company law, commercial crime and banking, commercial fraud, money

laundering control, globalisation of financial markets and international trade at amongst others the Universities of Cambridge, London, Paris, Geneva, Copenhagen, Ghent, Heidelberg, Regensburg, Rome, Genoa, Sienna, Palermo, Budapest, Free State, Malaysia, Singapore, Beijing, Taiwan, Monash, New South Wales and the Philippines.

He has read papers and taught at more than 300 universities and conferences in more than 63 countries. He is author to more than 35 legal handbooks and has made a substantial contribution to several more specialist publications. He is editor of, amongst others, *The Company Lawyer*, the *International and Comparative Corporate Law Journal* and the *Journal of Financial Crime*.

Prof. Rider is also the principal architect of the world-renowned annual international Symposium on Economic Crime held at Jesus College, Cambridge since 1982. It consistently draws more than 1500 participants from 90 or more jurisdictions. "With the Symposium, Prof. Rider has created a lasting event unique in scope and purpose," Prof. Henning said.

In terms of research Prof. Henning is proud to mention our collaboration with Prof. Rider with regard to the *Company Lawyer*. Our university is also working closely with Prof. Rider on a number of joint research programmes and regional training workshops, for example in Lesotho. Together with Prof. Rider, our Institute for the Advancement of Legal Studies is also working on a project to protect the legally vulnerable.

Working for the big international law firm, Bryan Cave Prof. Rider admits that it is working in the field that makes him tick. Organised crime is not only text book material for this Sherlock Homes of financial crime; it is the material which real-life investigations are made of. In one of his cases one of the largest money-transmitting businesses was engaged in money laundering.

But why the focus on financial crime? "Most things in the world go wrong because of greed. If you as lawyer want to try to promote sustainable development and integrity, then it is important to focus on the economical aspects of crime. Especially when one looks at what/where the world's economy will be in a few years from now – China," Prof. Rider said.

What could our students learn from this legend in the field of law? "Our students must equip themselves to

adapt to change, as it is likely that in their lifetime they will, even when they remain in law, have four to five different jobs. With education, students learn to add value to what they do. They learn to achieve change effectively, to be comfortable with change and to think out of the box.

Voer hulle koek vs. gee hulle opleiding

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Dr. Adri du Plessis van die Fakulteit Regsgeleerdheid doen navorsing met die hoop om bemagtiging op voetsoolvlak 'n werklikheid te maak.

"Wat my die meeste gegrief het van BEE is die onregverdigheid daarvan. Die rykes word net ryker, en die mense, wat eintlik daarby moet baat, bly in armoede voortploeter." So verduidelik Adri die dryfveer agter die navorsing wat sy rakende die tekortkominge van Swart Ekonomiese Bemagtiging (BEE) gedoen het.

Maar tipies aan die gehalte van navorsing wat Kovsie-studente doen, wys sy nie net probleme uit nie, maar stel ook werkbare oplossings voor.

"Iets wat ook wyd deur die media gedek word, is die sogenaamde eienaarskaptransaksies wat die huidige wanbalans net vererger," verduidelik sy. Hierdie tipe transaksies gee aan voorheen benadeelde groep eienaarskap in besighede in die vorm van aandele. Maar net 'n handjie vol skatryk individue word – by herhaling – hierdeur bevoordeel.

"Vir hierdie soort transaksie kry maatskappye baie punte op die BEE-puntekaart, maar ek stel voor dat hulle meer punte moet kry vir wat ek noem werknemer-eienaarskaptransaksies." Dit behels dat besighede eerder vir hulle eie werknemers aandele in die maatskappy moet laat bekom. Die werkers stoot klaar hulle arbeid in die maatskappy in en beskik ook oor die nodige vaardighede om verder by te dra tot die sukses van hierdie ondernemings. "Dit maak net soveel meer sin," sê Adri. Omdat besighede nie dadelik finansiële voordeel uit so 'n transaksie trek nie, behoort hulle meer BEE-punte daarvoor te kry.

Verder meen Adri ook dat maatskappye wat individue 'n "eerste keer" met so 'n transaksie bevoordeel, baie meer erkenning behoort te kry. Op die manier verhoed jy ook dat dieselfde multi-miljoenêrs net meer en meer voordeel

uit BEE-transaksies trek. En natuurlik word al hoe meer mense dan so bevoordeel.

"Indië het 'n stelsel waardeur die roomlaag van voorheen-benadeeldes hulle status verloor as lid van die groep," verduidelik Adri. Die kaste-stelsel in Indië (wat verwys na hulle klassestelsel) het ook groot ekonomiese onregverdigheid tot gevolg gehad. Maar gestel jy het tot 'n benadeelde kaste behoort, maar het reeds baie voordeel uit regstellende programme getrek, word jy uit daardie groep uitgehaal. "Dit voorkom dat mense wat byvoorbeeld reeds hoë posisies in die regering bekom het, of wat reeds baie grond besit, steeds aanhou voordeel trek, terwyl die armstes van die armes voortsukkel," sê Adri.

Adri meen ook dat onderrig en vaardigheidsontwikkeling baie meer erkenning op die BEE-puntekaart behoort te geniet. "Wanneer jy vir iemand 'n salaris gee," meen sy, "bemagtig jy hom vir 'n maand of drie. Dieselfde geld vir enige ander transaksie. Maar wanneer jy vir iemand 'n kwalifikasie gee, bemagtig jy hom oor die lang termyn. Onderrig is régte bemagtiging."

Sy beveel aan dat die proses beter gemoniteer moet word en etiek, wat korruksie moet kortvat, ook nog baie aandag korthou. "Korruksie het 'n negatiewe effek wat deur die ekonomie spoel, en so die hele land benadeel."

Deur haar navorsing hoop Adri dat mense op voetsoolvlak 'n regverdigte kans sal kry. Soos wat dit nou is, is die potensiaal vir onregverdigheid en die moontlike ontkenning van menseregte groot. Ons Grondwet, voel sy, spel gelykheid uit, maar ons sukkel om daarby uit te kom. Tog, meen sy, is daar hoop: "Ek glo as die benadering van die proses verander, sal daar gouer as wat ons dink regte ekonomiese gelykheid wees." **B**

Ek hou van emosionele swart-en-wit foto's. Ek hou daarvan om mense af te neem, hul emosies, hul oë, hul gemoedstemming op 'n spesifieke oomblik, die verhouding tussen hulself en diegene waarvoor hulle lief is. Ek hou daarvan om hulle te wys wat hulle voel, maar nie kan sien nie.

Wat maak jou 'n goeie fotograaf?

Jaco: Ek het die gawe om mense gemaklik voor die lens te laat voel, wat tot ontspanne en spontane foto's lei. Ek sien my foto's as kunswerke.

Dynamite does not need size

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You can easily be mistaken looking at the length of Doreen Atkinson. Passion, dedication, determination are all synonymous with this leader of one of the strategic clusters at the University of the Free State.

Prof. Doreen Atkinson is the Director of the Cluster on Sustainable Development and Poverty Alleviation. And the arid areas such as the Karoo and its people are close to her heart, very close.

The cluster offers valuable opportunities for interdisciplinary research on a wide variety of development-related topics. More so, those conducted in the context of the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs), the New Partnership for Africa's Development (NEPAD) and the Accelerated and Shared Growth Initiative of South Africa (ASGISA), she said.

The cluster entails working and networking with a wide range of staff and postgraduate students in some 15 UFS departments. The cluster also provides grants to staff and students working on sustainable development researches. The focus areas are health, wellness and community resilience; economic development; human settlements, housing; and rural development.

Doreen says she can see huge scope for the cluster, because it brings together many different university disciplines and networking with government departments and other stakeholders. Topics cut across disciplinary boundaries, and students learn to think outside their disciplinary silos.

She can also give valuable input on ground. "I am passionate about local development, more so in the Karoo. I am involved in all kinds of local development initiatives in the region and I am interested in the

history of the Anglo-Boer War. I also love doing research, although I do not get enough time for it."

She is currently doing some research on Karoo tourism. The cluster is creating "knowledge hubs" in three areas – Graaff-Reinet, Bethlehem and the Gariep Dam. This involves a lot of interaction with local stakeholders, which will enable the UFS to share its knowledge base with people in outlying regions.

"I would like to create a single Karoo development agency for the whole Karoo region, with the UFS as partner as a lasting legacy, something people will remember me by," she elaborated.

The cluster co-partnered with the Africa meets Africa (AmA) Project (see article in this issue). Research will be conducted on the future implementation of the project in schools, with particular interest in the cross-border perspective of the project, which links the Free State and the Northern Cape.

Doreen also remarks that, "History and heritage tend to cross borders. We hope that the AmA book becomes adopted in schools throughout the Free State and Northern Cape. I am delighted with the professionalism of the project and very proud to be associated with it."

She is inspired and fascinated by people who can break down barriers, between disciplines, social groups, and political jurisdictions – people who can "think out of the box". Entrepreneurs also fascinate her. "People who inspire me are the late Frederick van Zyl Slabbert, who formed the Institute for a Democratic Alternative for South Africa (IDASA) in 1987 and Richard Branson of the Virgin Group.

"I love spending some time with my children and to travel across the Karoo. I also maintain a balance between work and I make time for me."

Doreen is married to Mr Mark Ingle, a research associate at the Centre for Development Support. She is also a mother of two; one is a second-year student at our university and the other is doing some home schooling. They live at Phaliphilipolis in the southern Free State and she spends most of her time at our Bloemfontein Campus. ■

Haar passie is mense en haar ontspanning werk. Haar kleintjedood is mense wat lyf wegsteek. Dít is 'n piepklein neutedorpsig oor die profiel van prof. Rita Niemann, Direkteur vir nagraadse studie en navorsing in die Fakulteit Opvoedkunde.

Prof. Rita se liefde vir onderrig strek van haar skooldae toe sy vir haar sussie Anne-Marie se maatjies skoolgegee het. Sy het hierdie taak ná skool ernstiger opgeneem toe sy haar onderwysdiploma, na 'n aanvanklik B.A. Tale voltooí het. Hierna het sy in 1978 in Bethlehem begin skoolhou waarna sy by onderwyserskolleges in Kroonstad en Bloemfontein betrokke was.

Gedurende hierdie tydperk het sy haar honneurs- en meestersgrade in Opvoedkunde verwerf. "Ek was maar 32 jaar oud toe ek by die UV as lektor in Opvoedkunde aangestel is en is al 23 jaar by die UV." Sedertdien het sy 'n Ph.D. in Onderwysbestuur en 'n MBA verwerf en ook talle honneurs-, 53 meesters- en 13 doktorale graduandi hul grade help inpalms.

Tans tree sy vir agt meestersgraad en tien Ph.D.-studente as mentor en studieleier op – twee rolle wat sy baie ernstig opneem. "Die gewenste mentor en studieleier beskik oor 'n passie vir wat hy of sy doen en is bereid om die pad saam met die ander persoon, soos 'n kollega of student, te stap. Dit moenie 'n geval wees van 'ek versus jou nie'. Dit moet wees: 'ons gaan hierdie taak aanpak en suksesvol deurloop'". Omdat ek so lief is vir mense, is dit vir my lekker."

Sy voeg by dat al haar studente haar na aan die hart lê. "Ná die afhandeling van hul studies, bly ons lewenslank beste vriende. Selfs jare nadat studente hulle M's by my voltooi het, kom hulle weer terug na my toe vir hulle D's." Sy verduidelik dat haar oopregte liefde vir mense sy oorsprong uit haar kinderjare het. "Ek het goeie ouers gehad en was in ses verskillende skole. Ek moes leer om

te verander en aan te pas."

Dít is dalk ook die rede oor hoekom sy nie maklik gespanne raak nie. "Ek dink net, ag wat, dis nie die ergste wat met 'n mens kan gebeur nie."

Volgens Emmie Smit, 'n Ph.D.-student en kollega werksaam by die Skool vir Hoëonderwysstudie, en dr. Susette Brynard, 'n kollega en lektor by die Skool vir Opvoedkundige Studie, is 'n uitstaande kenmerk van prof. Rita dat sy lief is om haar eie grense uit te daag asook die van diegene naby aan haar.

Susette sê sy sou nooit kon dink dat sy ná 22 jaar as biologieonderwyser nou in onderwysbestuur kon werk nie. "Rita het my opgelig, my hand gevat. Binne minute gee sy energie en die rede agter iets. Sy stimuleer die linkerkant van my brein en moedig die regterkant aan om te vlieg. Dit is lekker om onder haar te werk, sy maak werk exciting."

Hierop las Emmie by: "Sy ken jou leemtes en jy kan van 'n veilige plek na 'n plek van hoër hoogtes inbeweeg (met haar aan jou sy)."

Khomotso Marumo en Juliet Ramohai is ook vol lof vir die professor. Khomotso, 'n assistentdirekteur van biblioteekdienste by die Sentrale Universiteit vir Tegnologie, en Juliet, 'n dosent by die Fakulteit Opvoedkunde, is albei doktorsgraadstudente van prof. Rita. Hulle sê dat sy, as hul mentor en studieleier, haar studente beter ken as wat die studente hulself ken en dat, hoewel sy haar studente nooit lepelvoer nie, hulle aanmoedig om wel die "steil leer" te klim.

Op die vraag oor watter bydrae prof. Rita tot die hoëonderwyssektor wil lewer, antwoord sy dat sy graag wou toesien dat nagraadse programme van gehalte aangebied word. Sy droom ook van die begeleiding en vorming van goeie meestersgraad- en doktorale studente en dat sy studente en kollegas in hul navorsing wil ondersteun. Haar oplossing om die algehele stand van onderwys te verbeter, lê in een woord: "Commitment". Beslis iets waaraan sy nie 'n tekort het nie. **B**

Hulle bly normaalweg ses maande of langer in die saal met 'n week huis elke 4 tot 5 weke. Die aanvanklike gedagte was om soveel as moontlik kunstenaars te kry om ons te voorsien van geraamde kunswerke, foto's, ens. wat positief, inspirerend en bemoedigend


van aard is. Sodoende het mense soos Portchie vir ons afdrukke ("limited editions") van sy kunswerke gegee, die Hoëskool Eunice het werke aan ons geskenk wat die leerlinge by die skool geverf het, individue in die stad het geskenk, bv. dr. Frieda Pienaar.

Ons hooffokus was tot dusver die pasiënte met bloed- en beenmurgkanker (bv. leukemie en limfoom) by ons kliniek en by die Nasionale Hospitaal. In 'n stadium het die waterverfklub van Bloemfontein saam met ons pasiënte waterverf kom doen in die saal, mense het kom sit en pasiënte geleer om kreatiewe handwerk te doen en ons het selfs musikante gehad wat soms op 'n naweeksdag in die saal kom musiek maak het.

Heelwat kollegas wat in hematologie werk, ook in die laboratorium, het betrokke geraak deur komberse en musie te hekel. Dr. Pienaar het ons gehelp om 'n pragtige tuin buite die leukemiesaal aan te lê waar daar voorheen twee vullishope was (met rotte in ons leukemiesaal).

Nou is daar honderde roosbome, plek vir die pasiënte om onder die bome te sit en bietjie uit te kom.

Ons het ook 'n biblioteek in die leukemiesaal begin met



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behulp van skenkings van boeke deur individue, wat natuurlik wonderlik vir die pasiënte is. So het ons ook skenkings en hulp van kerke, skole en individue ontvang van rekenaars waarop die tienerpasiënte kan speel en werk, DVD-spelers vir die meeste kamers en 'n skenking van 'n farmaseutiese maatskappy om 'n musieksentrum te koop.

Ons het ook 'n klavier gekry waarop die musikale pasiënte kan speel, wat wonderlik is en speletjies is geskenk vir hul gebruik.

In terme van sukses, weet ek dat die pasiënte nou 'n baie beter kwaliteit van lewe as vantevore het. Familie is dikwels ver en kan nie gereeld kom nie en dit maak tog 'n verskil as jy in 'n opbouende, positiewe omgewing is. Dis egter uitdagend om alles te reël en een van ons grootste behoeftes is om 'n vrywilliger of vrywilligers te kry wat kan help om die projek vorentoe te neem.

Die projek, Kunstenaars teen Kanker (oftewel Artists Against Cancer) gaan dus op die einde van die dag oor baie meer as net kuns, maar die erkenning van 'n pasiënt se waardigheid en om elkeen spesiaal te laat voel en so te behandel. ■

We are now one of 317 institutions worldwide that formally support the call for open access to information. The university joined universities such as Stellenbosch and Harvard who have signed a declaration to make research articles in all academic fields freely available on the internet to everyone, free of most licensing and copyright barriers.

Prof. Jonathan Jansen, Vice-Chancellor and Rector, signed the Berlin Declaration on Open Access to Knowledge in the Sciences and Humanities at a seminar in 2011. An increasing number of academic institutions, scientists and research-funding agencies support the move towards open access. 

Roses in remembrance of loved ones

The month of May 2011 was Compassion Month at our university and cut roses were planted in memory of people who had passed away in the previous year due to some illnesses and other personal issues.

A hundred roses were planted in front of the Main Building on the Bloemfontein Campus, with each rose representing 2 550 South Africans who had passed. There were 51 red roses which represented deaths due to HIV, 14 yellow roses for those who passed away due to ischemic heart disease, 13 white roses for deaths caused by stroke, eleven orange roses for deaths caused by tuberculosis and eleven pink roses for deaths caused by interpersonal violence.

Hoëprestasiesentrum gimnasium

hoëprestasiesentrum, 'n kommersiële gimnasium, 'n nuut opgegradeerde swembad wat aan nasionale standarde voldoen en twee hokkie-astro's. Dit is van die fasiliteite waarmee ons universiteit spog – fasiliteite wat nie net in die behoeftes van sportmanne en -vroue aan ons universiteit voldoen nie, maar wat ook daar is vir die voorbereiding van leiers op die sportgebied.

Fasiliteite soos die hokkie-astro's – lank nie meer 'n nuwigheid aan die universiteit nie – se waarde is onmeetbaar. Nie net is dit die speelveld vir ons eerste en tweede hokkiespanne nie, maar baie hokkiekampe word ook jaarliks hier aangebied. Ons is ook baie trots op die feit dat Giles Bonnet, hoofafrigter van die Suid-Afrikaanse vrouehokkiespan, ons hokkie-astro's in 2011 aanbeveel het vir oefenkompe en toetswedstryde tussen die vrouehokkiespanne van Suid-Afrika, België en China toe die spanne vir die kwalifiserende toernooi vir die 2012- Wêreldbekertoernooi en die Olimpiese Spele in 2012 geoefen het. Dr. Derik Coetzee en Colene Jones van ons Departement Oefen- en Sportwetenskappe het ook bystand aan die spanne in 'n sportkondisioneringshoedanigheid verleen.

Ons universiteit het ook in 2011 tydens 'n feestelike, kleurvolle en geesbelaaide geleenthed sy nuut opgegradeerde swembad geopen. Die swembad, 'n nasionale kompetisiebad (50 m in lengte) met verhitting is befonds deur 'n skenking (R4,6 miljoen) van die Nasionale Lotto. Mnr. Mickey Gordon, Hoof: Korporatiewe Betrekkinge, Institusionele Bevordering en Sport, sê dit is strategies belangrik om in 'n hoë gehalte fasiliteit te belê vir die bevordering van swem aan die UV. "Die universiteit wil 'n sentrum vir uitnemendheid vir Swem Suid-Afrika word," het hy gesê.

In Mei 2012 kan sportlui in hokkie, boks, atletiek en swem by ons om hulp kom aanklop ter voorbereiding vir internasionale kompetisiegeleenthede soos onder meer die Olimpiese Spele. Volgens Mickey sal die UV na verwagting dan die deure van die eerste Hoëprestasiesentrum en Kimmersiële Gimnasium van sy soort in Afrika open, alles onder een dak.

Die sentrum wat sal fokus om sy deskundigheid op genoemde sportgebiede te ontwikkel, sal aan 'n behoeftte voldoen wat al 'n geruime tyd bestaan. Hy sê sal dit baie vir die universiteit beteken om sportlui van hierdie kaliber op die kampus te akkommodeer.

Op die totale oppervlak van 2 114 m² sal die sentrum onder meer bestaan uit 'n ingangsportaal en administratiewe kantore, 'n gesondheidstoornbank, universiteitsportinstytuut, sportverkope, 'n spin- en aërobiese sentrum en aantrekkamers. Die sentrum sal op die westelike deel van die Bloemfonteinkampus, regoor die Furstenburghek en langsaa die nuwe studentebewusing, opgerig word.

Dit is nie net beroemde sportlui wat die geleenthed sal kry om van die spogfasilitet gebruik te maak nie; ons studente sal die kans kry om in hul spreekwoordelike voortuin te oefen en die publiek sal vanaf die Furstenburghek toegang

en kommersiële binnekort ontwikkel

tot die gimnasium verkry. In die gimnasiumgedeelte sal personeel, studente en lede van die publiek saam kan sweat op topgehalte oefenmasjiene, met gewigte, op "spinning"-fietse en in die aërobiese klas.

Terwyl die amptelike gebou van die Hoëprestasiesentrum eers in Mei 2012 sy deure oopmaak, dien ons universiteit reeds as oefengrondte vir spanne wat vir groot kompetisies wil voorberei.

Van ons fasiliteite soos ons hokkie-astro's (oefenterrein vir internasionale hokkiespanne) en ook Shimlapark – met sy 1 000 lux-ligte – dien al vir 'n aantal jare as oefenveld waar hierdie spanne vir belangrike internasionale wedstryde voorberei. Ook op internasionale spanne se voorkeurlys van plekke om voor te berei is ons oefen- en sportsentrum wat tans die tuiste is van ons Hoëprestasiesentrum. Afrika se topboksspan, Algerië en die Suid-Afrikaanse span wat by hulle aangesluit het, het

vroeër in 2011 die fasilitet gebruik om vir die 2011- Afrika-spele voor te berei. Die Algeriese hoofrefrigter, Aggoune Azeddine, sê hy was beïndruk met die fasilitete en dat hy dankbaar is om sy span van nege boksers met die hulp van Suid-Afrikaanse vriende te kon voorberei.

As jy saam met die bestes litte wil los maak – of dit nou in die kryt is, op die atletiekveld, in die swembad of op die hokkieveld – hoef jy nie te ver te soek nie. In die hartjie van Sentraal-Suid-Afrika op Kovsie-bodem sal jy nie net name soos Jannie du Plessis, Lesley-Ann George en Aggoune Azeddine raakloop nie, jy sal ook verras staan voor die diens en die fasilitete wat jy hier sal aantref.



Kovsies excel in sport in 2011

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The 2011 sport season was another brilliant one for our university with some excellent achievements in various sports.

Six ex Shimlas – Jannie du Plessis, CJ van der Linde, Gurthrö Steenkamp, Bismarck du Plessis, Heinrich Brüssow and Ruan Pienaar – were in the Springbok squad in the Rugby World Cup in New Zealand. Apart from Brüssow, the others, along with Juan Smith, had also played in the 2007 tournament.

A further three members of the Springbok management team, Rassie Erasmus (technical specialist), Jacques Nienaber (defensive coach) and Dr Derik Coetzee (conditioning coach) have Kovsie connections. Erasmus and Nienaber were students and Dr Coetzee is a lecturer.

Meanwhile the Shimlas enjoyed their best ever FNB Varsity Cup campaign by ending third, winning five of their eight encounters (one more than 2010 when they also finished third). Their 37-28 victory over the Pukke was significant as it was their first over their arch-rivals in the tournament, breaking a six-match losing streak against them.

More than a dozen of those Shimlas went on to play Currie Cup rugby. Enrico Acker was named as the best backline player in the Varsity Cup.

The Free State regional netball team, the Lightning Roses, became the first winner of the Netball Grand Series with most of the team consisting out of Kovsie and alumni. Goal shooter Maryka Holtzhausen and Burta de Kock (Kovsie coach) were part of the Proteas team at the Netball World Cup. Burta was the assistant coach.

At the University Sports South Africa (USSA) tournament, Kovsies were unbeaten with seven

players included in the team. At the national junior tournament Karla Mostert was named best defender and Ané Botha best centre-court player.

Having won the USSA Tennis Tournament, Duke Munro, PW Holtzhausen and Willem Steenkamp were selected for the SA Student Team – the most Kovsie members ever.

During the USSA Hockey Championships the women's hockey team maintained their status in the A division, whilst the men won the B division. Both will compete in the A division in 2011, the first time since 1994. At the National u.21 men's Hockey Tournament, Jaco Fourie was named player of the tournament.

In athletics, Thuso Mpuang won the silver medal in the 200 m event at the World Student Games, as well as gold as member of the SA 4x100 m relay team. He also qualified to participate at the World Senior Athletics Championship. Meanwhile, Boy Soke was included in die South African Cross-Country team.

On the cricket front Gino Vries was included in the USSA team.

The squash player Paul Rodrigues won the Free State event to be ranked number one in the province.

Kovsies are also proud of swimmer Sarah Shannon who represented South Africa at the Pan Pacific Para-swimming Championship.

In karate Bruno Schwalbach achieved two gold medals and Balungile Ngofe and Elsabé le Roux one each at the Southern Africa Karate Championships. Schwalbach and Ngofe then represented the country with success at the Senior Commonwealth Karate Championships.

The Kovsies men's soccer team ended second in the SAB regional league, winning 17 of their 28 matches. ■

'n Opgewonde Nida sê die beurs bring hope geleenthede. Met hierdie beurs word jy outomatis deel van 'n fellowship. Dit is 'n wonderlike voorreg om iets in gemeen te hê met sulke groot name," vertel sy oor die bekendes wat sedert 1951 dié beurs ontvang het.

n Droom van twee jaar gelede het nie net 'n droom gebly nie. Dr. Scarpa Schoeman, Senior lektor in Interne Geneeskunde, het die vervoerprobleme van vierde- en vyfdejaar- mediese studente ter harte geneem en in 2011 is 'n pendeldiens in werking gestel.

Die diens vergemaklik nou die studente se beweging tussen klasse by die UV en die saaldiens wat hulle by verskeie opleidingshospitale in Bloemfontein en omgewing moet doen.

Dr. Schoeman het vermoed dat studente se vervoeruitdagings 'n wesentlike negatiewe impak op hulle akademiese prestasie maak en die saak het dus aandag benodig. From Japan with Ambassador



Growing up at Odendaalsrus in the Free State, Kovsky Alumni Gert Grobler's father insisted that he and his siblings get to know their country. Looking back at a career that included diplomatic stints in Germany, Spain, Angola, America and Britain, his father's words instilled in him a desire to travel and broaden his horizons, Gert, South Africa's Ambassador to Japan, told **Amanda Tongha**.



"As children we were always ready to go to Durban, but my father firmly insisted that we got to know our country and every holiday we were packed into the car and driven to all corners of South Africa. In retrospect, I am deeply grateful having seen our beautiful country. With images of faraway places always prominently in my mind, I was very fortunate to be selected as a member of the Shimla rugby team that toured Europe in 1967-8 for a period of five weeks. This tour was destined to have a fundamental and lasting impression on my thoughts, life in general and career specifically. I was part of one of the first South African sports teams that encountered strong anti-apartheid demonstrations, particularly in the UK, and I recall our bewilderment when as young players many of our games were disrupted by demonstrators."

Gert said on his return to South Africa his yearning to see the world was stronger than ever and after a brief stint as teacher at St. Andrews School in Bloemfontein, he joined the Department of Foreign Affairs in Pretoria. This was the start of a long career in the Diplomatic Service.

"The life and career of a diplomat is a highly interesting, fascinating and multi-faceted one, dealing with people from all walks of life, from presidents to the man and woman in the street. I have been blessed and fortunate to work closely with Presidents Nelson Mandela, Thabo Mbeki and Jacob Zuma – not only in South Africa's interactions with foreign dignitaries, but also accompanying them on numerous official visits abroad.

"In Japan, as appointed representative of President Zuma, I am responsible for managing and promoting South Africa's political, economic, social, science and technology, cultural, sport and consular relations with Japan. Japan, as the third largest economy in the world, is a strategic partner of South Africa and the economic ties between our two countries are strong and growing. In 2010 alone, Japanese companies invested almost 28 billion rand in South Africa. This was the highest level of foreign investment in 2010 and there are indications of more to come."

According to the ambassador, there are approximately 500 to 600 South Africans in Japan, mainly in the private sector, with some on student exchanges or as students teaching English in the country. "We maintain close contact with South Africans in the country and in particular during this year's earthquake tragedy in Japan, we had our hands full to establish whether they were all unharmed. Fortunately, no South Africans were harmed."

During this time, Gert wrote a poem in Afrikaans for the Japanese people, which were published in a Japanese magazine, translated into English (see poem).

Gert speaks highly of the Asian country. "Japan has a very rich and fascinating culture and tradition. It is a very beautiful country with stunning landscapes, coastlines and mountains, particularly the sacred Mount Fuji and surrounding rivers. Japan's ancient capital Kyoto is also a treasure with several World Heritage sites in the city."

He describes Japan as a "cuisine heaven" with not only the most delicious sushi and sashimi, but also a wide variety of international restaurants. "If you are tired of sushi there is a South African restaurant in Tokyo, Tribes, which serves Castle, Klipdrift, KWV wines and bobotie, boerewors and pampoenkoekies. I am a regular visitor there!" **B**

Dít verduidelik hy, is 'n nie-winsgewende Christelike Bedieningsorganisasie wat uitreik na die gebrokenes, haweloses en werkloses in Bloemfontein.

"Dis wonderlik dat ons op hierdie manier die 'regte wêreld' en die kerk met mekaar kan versoen – want albei het mekaar nodig!"

De la Harpe het in 1990 as eerstejaar op Kovsies aangekom en sy B.A.-graad in teologie voltooi. Daarna het hy 'n honneursgraad gedoen en was van 1994 tot 1996 in die kweekskool. Pas nadat hy afstudeer het, is hy beroep na 'n gemeente in Durban waar hy tot en met einde 2004 was. En toe kom hy terug Bloemfontein toe!

"Aanvanklik was ek dominee by Fichardtkruin en in Oktober 2008 is ek beroep na hierdie wonderlike pos by die Tweetoringkerk in die middestad!" De la Harpe vertel opgewonde dat sy lewe 'n volle sirkel gemaak het – hy en sy gesin woon deesdae in dieselfde straat as waarin hy grootgeword het. "My pa was ook 'n dominee in Bloemfontein en dis te wonderlik om te sien hoe my eie kinders nou kan ervaar wat ek jare gelede beleef het... baie dinge is anders, maar baie goed is ook dieselfde."

Ander mense sal dalk sidder by die aanskoue van die interkulturele gemeente wat De la Harpe in die middestad bedien. "Dis beslis nie everybody's cup of tea nie," sê

hy. "Maar dit is myne! Hierdie is my plek." Hoewel hy dit steeds geniet om soms in homogene Afrikaanse gemeentes te preek, sal hy maar swaar afskeid neem van sy "vriende van die straat".

Die Bloemfonteinse middestadgemeente in die Tweetoringkerk, en die Torings van Hoop Leierskapstigting, loop hand aan hand, hoewel dit twee verskillende entiteite is. Die gemeente, verduidelik De la Harpe, het die Leierskapstigting nodig omdat die gemeente self nie by al die uitdagings kan uitkom wat Torings van Hoop aanspreek nie. Só ook het Torings van Hoop die kerk nodig, omdat dit nie 'n welsynsorganisasie is nie.

"Dit is juis ook die tema van my navorsing," verduidelik De la Harpe wat ingeskryf het vir 'n D.Th. aan die UV, "die tipe uitdagings waarmee 'n gemeente soos die middestadgemeente sit."

De la Harpe is ook baie betrokke by arbeidsbediening. Dit behels dat hy in die werkplek vir mense die Woord bring. "Dit is amper maklik om Sondae kerk toe te gaan... maar vir baie mense is dit moeilik om daardie selfde Here se teenwoordigheid in die werkplek te ervaar." Tussen dominee wees, arbeidsbediening, Torings van Hoop, en deeltyds klasgee by die Fakulteit Teologie, is hy omtrent besig. "Maar ek is mal daaroor, ek het baie energie."

De la Harpe klink amper té opgewonde vir iemand wat in die middestad werk... tussen soveel hooploosheid. Hoe bly hy gemotiveerd? Hoe motiveer hy die mense wat so min hoop het? "Ek doen wat ek moet, daarvan is ek seker. Dis wat my laat aanhou. En om ander te motiveer... ek weet nie regtig nie. Ek is maar net hier. Dit is hoe Jesus ook was. Hy het nie almal wat arm en siek was, gehelp nie. Maar Hy was daar... Ek het nie vir al die nood en krisisse antwoorde en oplossings nie. Maar ek is hier. Ek fokus nie op groot invloede nie, maar as ek 'n klein veranderinkie kan maak met elke mens wat oor my pad kom, dan is dit genoeg."

Dalk, meen De la Harpe, lê die mens se behoud juis daarin om andersheid te omarm. "Jy kan nie groei en ontwikkel as jy heeltyd net deur hulle wat presies soos jy dink en praat omring word nie... ons kan baie by mekaar leer." **B**

Hoewel sy in die kantoor van die Vrystaatse Premier werk, sê sy die belangstelling wat die UV-studentekoerant Irawa gedurende haar universiteitsjare in die joernalistiek by haar gewek het, sal altyd teenwoordig wees.

Ofskoon dit meer as twee dekades is sedert Elzabé Rockman, die direkteur-generaal in die Department van die Premier, haar pen neergelê het, gebruik sy steeds haar joernalistiekvaardighede. "Ek is nie iemand wat dinge in absolute swart of wit beskou nie, maar glo eerder dat verskillende skakerings van grys bestaan. Anders as joernaliste, hoef ek nie terug te hou nie en kan ek deel word van 'n storie en oplossing."

Hierdie voormalige Irawa-redakteur sê haar universiteitsdae was net 'n trappie hoër as hoërskool. Haar universiteitsjare, wat in die doodsnikke van die apartheidsera was, was baie anders as nou. "Nou bestaan 'n baie ander dinamika as tóé; nie dat dit makliker is nie." Sy praat vlugtig oor die impak van die Reitz-incident op die UV se beeld en loof prof. Jonathan Jansen, Visekanselier en Rektor, vir sy bydrae om die universiteit te laat aanbeweg.

Te midde van haar loopbaansukses het sy 'n liefde vir ons provinsie sowel as vir die Noord-Kaap, waar sy in Kimberley grootgeword en 'n groot deel van haar skoolloopbaan deurgebring het. "Die mense hier en daar is baie dieselde. Ons maak opofferings, maar ons het nog nie die essensie van menswees verloor nie." Die kwaliteit van lewe in die streek sal haar nie sommer laat oorweeg om groener weivelde daar buiten te soek nie.

Oor werkgeleenthede in die Vrystaat, sê sy die provinsiale regering probeer om die dinamika van die provinsie te gebruik om werkskepping te bevorder. Hierdie dinamika neem die potensiaal van sektore soos die landbou, toerisme en logistiek in ag asook die sentraliteit van ons provinsie. Elzabé is ook hierby betrokke vanweë haar pos en het die geleentheid om met alle departemente saam te werk om spesifieke programme en inisiatiewe te koördineer. Die ontwikkeling van vaardighede is 'n onontbeerlike

deel om ekonomiese groei en werkskepping te bevorder. Die funksionering van die provinsiale regering se opleidingsinstituut en die implementering van internskappe en leerskappe is daarom programme wat spesifieke aandag van die provinsiale regering geniet.

Nog iets wat volgens haar moet verander, is die omskep van die staatsdiens tot 'n voorkeurwerkgewer en die uitwiss van neerhalende sienswysses wat die publiek jeans staatswerkers huldig. "As almal trots op hul werk is, sal dit 'n voorreg wees om vir die staat te werk, maar die denkkraamwerk moet verander."

Sy raai mense, wat 'n verskil in hul samelewing wil maak, aan om 'n loopbaan in die staatsdiens te oorweeg. "Dit is maklik om terug te staan, maar dit is 'n ander storie om in te gaan en 'n verskil te maak." Elzabé sê sy ervaar toenemend 'n gewilligheid onder haar kollegas om mekaar met take te help. "Mense ervaar 'n groter aansporing en bevrediging om 'n praktiese verskil te maak en die nodige vaardighede oor te dra na iemand wat nog nie die nodige vaardighede opgedoen het nie." Hoewel sy met haar werksure, wat ver buite die normale agt tot vyf strek, 'n verskil in die staatsdiens probeer maak, probeer sy naweke die balans herstel deur tyd saam met haar kinders Caitlyn (10), Matthew (12) en Andrew (14) te bestee.

Sy sê dit is jammer dat nie al die vroue wat 'n verskil in die geskiedenis gemaak het, genoeg erkenning kry nie aangesien hulle met mans om erkenning moet meetding. Die erkenning en opskryf van die geskiedenis oor die vryheidstryd in die Vrystaat moet meer aandag geniet. "As ons nie iets doelbewus vir die nageslag doen nie, sal 'n groot deel van ons geskiedenis verlore gaan."

Sy sê hoewel sy haar werk geniet, droom sy daarvan om een dag weer aan die stuur van 'n publikasie te wees soos die *Transformer* en *The Voice*, wat in die laat 1980's deur studente bedryf is as alternatiewe publikasies tot die hoofstroommedia. "Dit sal 'n publikasie wees waarin ek kan skryf, 'n storie kan vertel wat moet vertel word." En, voeg sy skertsend by, "niks met die regering te make sal hê nie". **B**


in others, but mentor and help them grow has increased exponentially. I believe that while leaders are born, good managers are created over time," says Helen.


