A time for new and fresh leadership

The Council has begun its search for a new rector and vice-chancellor following the announcement by Prof. Frederick Fourie that he is stepping down.

"Applications will be invited through an open and targeted process of recruitment advertising, locally, nationally and internationally to broaden the pool of applicants," the Council said in its statement.

Within this process Council has expressed the view that applications from the designated groups in terms of Employment Equity must be encouraged. It is also Council's wish that this process be completed as soon as is possible, within the approved procedure.

In early September and 40 years since his association with the university began – first as a student, later as a lecturer, dean, vice-rector and finally as rector and vice-chancellor, Prof. Frederick announced that he is stepping down as rector and vice-Chancellor.

"Obviously this decision has not been taken lightly. After careful consideration I am, convinced that this is as far as I can take the university as vice-chancellor and rector. This flows primarily from the exhausting times that I have experienced during the past nine years in managing and implementing several complex strategic projects.

"I think it is time for new and fresh leadership, especially in the light of the transformation challenges of the university. I have thus decided to step down in the interest of transformation and the further dynamic development of the university," Prof. Frederick said.

The Council of the university expressed its heartfelt thanks and appreciation to Prof. Frederick for his contribution to building and developing the university. "We respect this decision and wish him success and everything of the best," Judge Faan Hancke, Chairperson of the UFS Council said.

Prof. Teuns Verschoor, Acting Rector, said the university is saddened that the high intensity of change management processes has taken its toll on Prof. Frederick, but is deeply thankful for the legacy that he leaves. "One cannot help but reflect on the momentous contribution Prof. Frederick has made to the development of the university."

"At the time of his appointment as vice-rector in 1999, the university was in a financial crisis. There had been three rounds of staff reductions, there were no funds for equipment or the maintenance of buildings and there was a general mood of despair amongst staff. With his unique style and talents, and against all odds, Prof. Frederick succeeded in bringing about a financial turnaround that once again brought hope to the staff."

"Research improved dramatically, inter alia due to the

refurbishment of laboratories and the acquisition of world-class research equipment. General campus infrastructure was significantly upgraded and aesthetically improved, making the physical appearance and quality of the campus an example to other universities.

"The university structure was critically analysed in all its dimensions and quality assurance projects were launched to improve the overall package of higher education offerings at the university. It was also under his leadership that a transformation plan, laying the basis for the years ahead, was compiled and adopted.

"Through these and countless other initiatives, Prof. Frederick has contributed significantly to the establishment of the university as a nationally and internationally recognised higher education institution. He has laid the foundations for the next period of academic growth and development, the value of which will only be appreciated in its full significance in historical perspective."

"We wish Prof. Frederick many productive years ahead and have faith that his remarkable intellect and capabilities will enable him to make many more contributions to the betterment of South African society," Prof Teuns said.

In his statement Prof Frederick said: "I am grateful for the opportunity to have been at the helm of the university and to help the institution cross several bridges. It has been a wonderful experience of thinking and working together in order to elevate the functioning of the university to new levels in several key areas.

"I wish to thank all those people with whom I could work during the past years in tackling large and complex challenges with mutual loyalty, shared wisdom and effort – from the Financial Turnaround Team to the Exco, the Executive Management, the Faculties, the Senate, support service divisions, the University Council and several committees and task teams."

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When will we be able to say DUMELA to a new way of 'being or doing'?

August 2007 saw us arrive at the University of the Free State as a new Centre for Sesotho Language Research and Development. A cursory look at the demographics of the campus gives one a picture quite different from my old campus of UNIQWA, with the student population more heterogeneous than the staff. The youthful, vibrant student population is mixed in a way that the staff or the students' representative council is not.

The architecture is a combination of the institution's history and contemporary South Africa. Symbolically therefore one gets the impression of a transition period wherein the 'old' and the 'new' are unevenly mixed, albeit with a nostalgic leaning to the recent past.

Conversations on the effectiveness of the institution's transformation to the 'new order' are either muted or cloistered in language professing change, representativity and progressiveness. Peeling the onion layers of the professed change

becomes an education in learning how to 'be part of change without changing', as well as the art of camouflaging the inequality of access to various services, facilities or similar pertinent aspects of a university's business.

Both are evident in the lack of transformative curricula or courses, and ordinary daily interaction which unmasks the void of euphemisms such as 'inclusiveness', 'tolerance' and 'multilingualism'. Transformation should, after all, refer first to the core business, content, staffing and communication forms.

Were that the case, the 'included, accommodated, or tolerated' population would know and recognise that qualitative difference from their former 'open' exclusion. Should we therefore say 'quo vadis UFS' or settle for the adage: 'die agter os kom ook in die kraal' before saying DUMELA to a 'new way' of being or doing?

Techno versus chalk at the UFS

I am an Honours student in Media Studies at the UFS and would like to voice my concerns regarding the teaching methods which we seem to have at our university. My concern also springs from the fact that I am the tutorial co-ordinator in the Faculty of the Humanities.

The typical scenario one would find in a UFS lecture venue is a lecturer in front, students looking scared and a computer system which was installed – for a purpose – and yet, is not being used.

The student coming here as of 2003 – even earlier – is not attracted to big words or big books, the library nor to the lecturer's office. They want to see what they are being taught and they want it interactively! More young people have access to technology today than ever before. Cellphones, i-pods, digital-, video- and webcams as well as laptops are but a few of the digital devices used for communication, recreation and learning that have been accessed by young people in classrooms in South Africa.

A recent visit to the girls school, Eunice, in Bloemfontein struck me with awe when I saw what type of student is being produced there. A little girl in grade one at Eunice School, will receive "homework" that

instructs her to make use of a technological device, with the help of a parent, to send that homework piece to the teacher. What would happen if this little girl reached this university where our lecturers are still struggling to use an overhead projector?

My guess is that thousands of students are bored and frustrated in Kovsie classes. The student coming from neighboring Eunice and any other South African or foreign school, which makes use of technology at such a rate, should be catered for as much as the student coming from a previously disadvantaged background.

Dear lecturers: some of our lecture venues are equipped with good PC's – please use them. And yes by now, we expect it from you to know how to use Blackboard (not the blackboard – the programme, Blackboard).

The secret to your module getting a great success and throughput rate may be hidden in your ability to use technology wisely.

If your module is struggling – do give me a call on X9578, I would love to see where the New Academic Tutorial Programme can help. You would be surprised.


hier is iets om aan te kou:

reënboogproduksies vir 'n reënboogland



Daar is honderde voorbeelde van produksies wat deur die Departement Drama en Toneelkunde op die planke gebring is waar multi-kulturele vaardighede tussen spelers ontwikkel word – met die doel dat dit ook sal oorspoel na die gehoor. Só 'n tipe toneelstuk is die pas afgeloope Sindiswa wat 'n Afrika verwerking van Aspoesterjie is. Prof. Nico meen dat hierdie kulturele kruisbestuwing Suid-Afrikaanse teater uniek maak: reënboogproduksies vir 'n reënboogland. Dis ook interessant dat, sonder enige dwang, die swart studente begin belangstel in Afrikaans en die wit studente in Sotho en Xhosa. Engels is die meeste studente in die departement se tweede taal.

Wat veral vir Stephnie Brink (dosent) opval, is die gemak waarmee studente multi-kulturele situasies bespreek: "Dis dalk omrede ons klasse klein is. En die studente werkelik vriende word." Die aantal wit en swart studente in die departement is redelik gelyk. Niemand

voel uitgesluit nie. En almal word dieselfde behandel. Daar is 'n gemoedelike interaksie, met geen onderwerp taboe nie. Dit het gewoonlik tot gevolg dat studente probleme buite die departement sal bespreek. Soms daaroor sal lag. En dit ander kere op die verhoog sal plaas – om dit vanuit 'n ander perspektief te aanskou.

Iemand noem dat "hulle toneelkunde 'n verpligte vak vir almal op kampus moet maak" – wat die res van die groep heelik laat lag. En dan skielik stil laat raak. Dalk het 'iemand' 'n punt beet. Dis dalk glad nie so 'n slegte idee om improvisasie en rolspel deel te maak van die eerstejaars se oriënteringsweek nie. Miskien is dit die manier om brûe te bou. Met 'spelterapie'. En om waarlik 'n tree of twee in iemand anders skoene te loop.

Sadness and hope

The news about Prof. Frederick Fourie stepping down as Rector and Vice-chancellor is indeed a sad moment in the life of the UFS. He has contributed immensely to the national and international stature of this institution and I wish him well for the contributions he is still to make in other spheres.

But already the corridors are buzzing with talk about Prof Fourie's replacement. Who exactly it will be, is anyone's guess. Though judging from the statement by Council and the sentiments of leading members, a concerted effort will be made to find someone from the designated groups – a black person to be more specific.

This is a commendable position that has been adopted, though some would say long overdue. But it would be naïve in the extreme to imagine that all the ills of the UFS can be cured simply because of the colour of someone's skin. There is no magic cure for what the UFS has been through this past year and for what still lies ahead.

On the one hand, there are many reasons why a black person should be appointed. Chief among these is the fact that we need to signal a decisive break from the past. At the same time we need to entrench diversity from the highest to the lowest ranks of the UFS, and the office of the Rector is certainly not exempt. Of course, it must never be a case of diversity for diversity's sake, but rather an appointment that will help to propel us forward in our quest to be an excellent university.

On the other hand though, we need to learn from the experience of other historically white higher education institutions who have appointed black rectors. There may be valuable insights we can gain from how the appointment process was managed and how the successful candidate was able to fulfill the mandate he / she was given.

The selection panel of the UFS Council – as large as it is with just over 30 members – will need the wisdom of as many Solomons, for their task is an unenviable one. The panel must be satisfied that they have found the most suitable candidates to interview and then they must ultimately select the one they think offers the best package of knowledge, skills, experience, academic credibility and so on.

Yet how do you begin to reach consensus within a panel of 30-odd members (never mind a university community of close to 30 000 staff and students), about a matter as vital as this is to the UFS, and which is essentially about the leadership qualities we need to take us forward.

To paraphrase a colleague of mine, the essential ingredient in this mix of leadership qualities, must be the ability to provide hope for the future. Hope that the trauma and pain of the past can be overcome (without glossing over the difficult challenges of the present) and that the future will be better. Perhaps my colleague is absolutely spot on: this is really what the UFS needs right now – hope for the future. – **Anton Fisher**


Haar werk behels die bestuur en koördinering van alles wat by die eenheid plaasvind en sy sorg dat die dienste wat deur die eenheid gelewer word, glad verloop. 'n Groot deel van haar werk is ook om voortdurend die korporatiewe beeld van die eenheid te verbeter. "Ek sal graag wil sien dat die eenheid ook help om sy deel te doen om ons universiteit se beeld

uit te bou," sê Hetsie.

'n Ander belangrike deel van haar werk is om ander studente op kampus sowel as personeel bewus te maak van gestremde studente. "Buiten dat ons personeel sensitief wil maak teenoor mense met gestremdhede en vooropgestelde idees wil afbrek, is dit ook vir ons belangrik dat dosente ons rol op kampus verstaan en van ons gebruik maak.

"Die pos kom met 'n klomp uitdagings. Sommige geboue is byvoorbeeld ontoeganklik vir sekere van die studente met gestremdhede. Met die hulp van dosente moet ons dus toesien dat studente in die regte klasse geplaas word. Ons help ook die studente, soos byvoorbeeld die blinde studente, om hul leermaterialiaal in braille om te sit. Dit moet egter teen 'n sekere tyd gedoen word sodat die studente betyds met hul werk kan begin," sê Hetsie.

Hetsie is lank reeds betrokke by persone met gestremdhede en sport. Haar passie vir gestremde sport word op haar mure weerspieël met koerantuitknipsels van dié persone se prestasies. Sy is ook baie opgewonde oor die geleentheid wat sy gekry het om die span na die Paralimpiese Spele in Beijing te vergesel.



Estelle Heideman kry beurs vir MIV-voorkoming

Me. Estelle Heideman, MIV-/ Vigs-koördineerde van die Lengau Landbou-ontwikkelingsentrum, is deur 'n leierskapsinisiatief van die VSA, die M-A-C Aids Fund, gekies om verder opleiding te ontvang om die werk wat sy doen ten opsigte van MIV-voorkoming voort te sit.

Sy het die belangstelling van 'n paneel van beoordelaars van die M-A-C Aids Fund getrek met 'n voorkomingsprogram van agt weke – gesamentlike inisiatief van die Hoofdirektaat Samelewingsdiens en die Free State Rural Development Programme – wat plaaswerkers in die Philippi-distrik toeris om beheer oor hulle lewens te neem deur hulle MIV-status te ken en 'n gesonde lewenstyl te volg.

Estelle woon via 'n beurs van dié inisiatief 'n opleidingsprogram van agt weke by. Na voltooiing van die program, sal die leierskapsinisiatief, afgesien van ander voordele, fondse aan beurshouers voorsien om uitvoer aan hulle voorkomingsprogram in Suid-Afrika te gee.

Nthabeleng gives community

At the young age of 30, Nthabeleng Rammile is already an elder in spirit and caring. For five years she has been lecturing marketing at our university and it has become her channel for the community work she excels at. For this Free State born and bred wife of a church minister, giving back to the world is her credo and she has her eyes firmly set on helping those in need.

Nthabeleng currently runs two community projects reaching approximately 500 people per term and the benefits for the participants are obvious: "They gain valuable confidence, presentation, negotiation and communication skills and have a unique opportunity to develop themselves before going into the work environment," says this mentor to many.

Education 1st is a grade 12 tutoring programme. Each Saturday morning in a church hall in Rocklands up to 120 learners gather to be assisted by students from our university in either mathematics or accounting. Our students set up tutorials with the high schools in the area and tutor those that need help in the week's chosen topic.

Part of the Education 1st programme is the career expo, where UFS students sell their faculty to the learners and this project also hosts an annual bursary fundraising event for grade 12 learners. Learners are advised how to choose the right career, develop much needed skills, apply for bursaries, fill in application forms and are told what the university can offer. The simplicity and effectiveness of the programme is astounding. Nthabeleng says that a lot of learners from the township are for various reasons, including financial, unable to attend the career days held at the university. Some don't attend out of ignorance of what

is on offer. A common complaint is that the university is an intimidating place for the first-timer. This programme is run on their home ground so they tend to be more proactive and get the info they need.

Operation Health is a highly successful clinic run on an *ad hoc* basis for the elderly in the same church hall. Medical students from our university run this one and perform basic medical tests for up to 250 pensioners each time. Three local doctors have also now come on board – inspired by the practicality of the arrangements set up by Nthabeleng. In a lot of cases, they end up referring people with serious problems like TB and heart and lung disease to the hospitals. "It shows that we are not just doing it for ourselves but have a success rate with the patients in mind," she says.

The university's commitment to community service specifically in the Faculty of Economic and Management Sciences where Nthabeleng lectures has been a fantastic support for her as they help with transport and meals for our students as well as a light snack for the patients. Basic medication is also provided.

But she also gets support from the church where a part-time secretary handles the admin work and where her husband is the counseling

"Wat maak my opgewonde? Sommer 'n klomp goed," antwoord sy. "My hand, ek en my fiets in die veld, mense, maar die lekkerste in die hele wêreld is

minister. He also helps her with the administration of all the community programmes.

"The church offers a support network, a computer and a printer to copy student identity documents for registration.

It's important to administer the programmes effectively, to ensure that the elderly are registered and the student's application forms are processed," she says, adding that "a lot of people want to volunteer, they just do not know how, so we show them." Of course she is one of those talented people who can inspire a

volunteering culture.

So how does this minister's wife, mother of two, full time lecturer and PhD student achieve what NGO's, government officials and private corporations try to do? "I delegate and build up very effective teams of people, making it everyone's responsibility to achieve. The students organise themselves. Being seriously organised helps too."

Nthabeleng puts her achievements down to her environment, which she says is the "best place to be to achieve her dreams. The research environment is flexible and is easily integrated into my love for community and lecturing." Her support network is vital to her. "The university offers as much as possible and I have a very supportive and flexible husband."

Nthabeleng has written three booklets and is hoping that her PhD on 'The influence of cultural diversity on the cellular telecoms industry' will also be published. I get the feeling that this dynamic lady is on her way to big things. She has the gift of realising practical solutions to huge problems. She pays tribute to her father, a teacher "who gave back all his life. We always had strangers sleeping on our floor. I never understood it then, but now I know we have to pass it on."

So what is next? Modestly Nthabeleng dreams, "Extending the programmes. I will be speaking to the Head of the Department of Health soon to talk about support and obviously trying to find more sponsors so that we can reach more people."

'The young are attracted by the corporate world so there should be programmes to attract them to academia. In partnership with government, opportunities should be created and advertised. The future of research in South Africa is not too positive. It is going to be limited to the private sector. There is a lack of black academics although I am in a good place now. Something has to be done to stimulate interest. Money is a big factor and then comes working environment.'

Lectures in the Department of Animal Wildlife, Grassland Science.

'We need support in selling our knowledge, it is all we have. We need to develop business skills to make our research sustainable. Regarding our successes, those people who work in groups and build 'islands' of skills get support. Investments need to be made into structures, support staff and young blood to sustain the future of academia. As a country we need to invest in mentors. The university needs to retain young academics to grow academia as a career option.'



Thopelo Makae

Studied at UFS 2000-2007. Lectures in physiology in the Department Animal Wildlife, Grassland Science.

'As a student, staying in academia is not appealing, young people want to be in industry making money and climbing the ladder. As a young professional there are choices outside academia. Our problems in retaining skills are not unique – other universities have the same issues. South Africa and Africa have a challenge especially in agriculture, to retain the skills and improve research.'

Lectures in nutrition in the Department of Animal Wildlife, Grassland Science.

'As professionals, we have the skills and expertise; we can move on but are committed to the work, the students and research. Universities are independent so research work is done independently yet support is lacking. To increase research output and keep researchers, we need incentives; bursaries will attract the cream of the crop to become academics. The future for research is not rosy. There are however opportunities within SADC and South Africa. We need to develop the young to do scientific research. As young academics we feel an obligation to pass on knowledge.'

'Research is my love, I get the support here and my working environment is good for me to do my research. The support is different for different departments. I can combine my love for research with community work to develop myself. The university supports you if you ask – you need to be proactive.'

'Things have been good for me. A move from Wits to Kovsies was good for my career. I have had no problems with support for my research. The future of young researchers anywhere, is in their own hands. The same rules apply as for the private sector - excellence, hard work and strategic thinking. At the UFS there is a lack of support for full-time PhDs. The UFS thinks this can be done part-time; this is simply not the way it is done at truly successful universities. They first complete a well-funded PhD, and then move into full-time teaching and research. We need to reconsider that.'

Sonder geite in 'n vlugtelingskamp

Rampe, lewensverlies, vloede, vlugtelinge... vir tien dae was dit alles deel van my lewe gedurende 'n besoek aan 'n vlugtelingskamp in Mosambiek, 20 km suid van die Malawi-grens. Ek het 'n groep studente en personeel van die universiteit se Afrika Onderrigssentrum in Ramprisikobestuur tydens 'n studietoer vergesel.

"Engtevrees en ander geite laat jy agter die oomblik as die dubbelkajuitbakkie se deur langs jou toeslaan en jy agter op die bakkie sit tussen sewe medereisigers se rugsakke, gepak vir tien dae se trek die wildernis in, alles om getrou aan die ondersoekende gees van die wetenskaplike meer te gaan leer van nie-regeringsorganisasies soos Oxfam, UNICEF en die World Food Program se werkzaamhede in 'n gebied waar vloede jaarliks menselewens eis en die natuur vir die moedwillige mens wys wie nou eintlik baas is.

Ons vertrek op 'n 1,500 km-tog Mosambiek in om na die rampverligtingswerk wat in die Caia distrik gelewer word te kyk en te leer. Ons het dikwels langs die teerpad of wat daarvan oor was gery. Slaggate kan werkelik so groot en diep soos 'n bad wees. Klein kindertjies toon hulle entrepreneursvaardighede om met emmertjies sand in die middel van die pad te staan en dan vol afwagting sand in die gat te gooi sodat jy 'n gladder rit kan hè, terwyl handjies gehou word vir kleingeld 'n want onthou die arbeider is sy loon werd!

Voor die ekskursie het ek hard en duidelik vir die wat ore het gesê, ek sien vir enigiets kans solank ek net kan was en die ander dingetjies in privaatheid kan doen. Helaas. Die eerste nag aan die Suid-Afrikaanse kant so tien kilometer van Swaziland se grens moes ons sonder water klaar kom.

Dis regtig moeilik in die lewe as jy dom is, maar niks kom by die onhandigheid as jy sukkel om tent op te slaan nie 'n al het jy 'n paar oefensesessies met die stophorlosie in die een hand by die huis gehad. Nadat jy elke aand self tent opgeslaan het, was dit vuurmaak en kosmaak op gasbottels en dan het jy behoedsaam die ablusieblok genader met 'n flits in die hand. Soos ons dieper in Mosambiek in beweeg het, het dit meer primitief geraak. Snaaks genoeg so na die derde nag gee jy jou aan om 'net te wees'. Jy smeer nog al die roompies aan, sluk so tussendeur al jou vitamines en doen al die dinge soos jy geleer is. Daar is egter nie vulstasies en waskamers langs die pad soos ons gewoon is op die N1 nie, so jy is dikwels die bosse al springende en handklappende in vir ingeval – mamba of ander ongedierte dalk – idée het om jou te pik, byt of op te vreet. Maar dis 'n mooi land.

Oxfam, 'n internasionale nie-regeringsorganisasie, werk hard om onder andere siektes soos cholera te bekamp. Wat vir my as maatskaplike werker vreemd is, is dat daar nie ook maatskaplike

opheffingsprogramme is nie. Die afwesigheid hiervan dra volgens my vakkundige mening daartoe by dat noodleningsorganisasies jaar na jaar reddingswerk moet doen.

Die natuurskoon is asembenemend. Ek is seker as jy 'n mielepit in een van die slaggate indruk dit sal groei. Die plaaslike inwoners is vriendelik en hulpvaardig. En oral kan jy selfoonkaarte koop waar ek baie seker is die enigste wat jy sal opvang 'n emmer vol water na 'n reënbusi sal wees.


Ek het baie siek geword en teen die einde nie omgegee of hulle my langs die pad los om dood te gaan nie. Vat genoeg maagmedisyne saam en skil selfs vrugte eerder af.

Ons het deur die Musina-grenspas na Suid-Afrika teruggekeer. Almal het al gehoor en gelees van die verwikkelinge in Zimbabwe, maar as grootmense jou om die bene val teen sterk skemer en by jou pleit dat jy enigiets kan vat van hulle handewerk inruil vir iets om tee eet 'n dan breek jou hart. Jy pak jou koskrat se laaste voorrade uit en jy gee tot die klipharde platgedrukte energiestafie. As jy wegry sien jy in jou truspieëltjie hoe baie mense naderstaan om aan die bietjie wat jy gegee het te eet. Jy ry sommer vinniger en vra verskoning vir die alewige hooikoors.




'n mylpaal

Kerk verloor sy invloed, maar geloof in God neem toe

Daar is 'n groeiende afhanklikheid van God, aldus prof. Kees van der Kooi, Sistematiiese teoloog van die Vrije Universiteit Amsterdam. "Al het die kerk as instansie se invloed verminder, word die belangrikheid van geloof deur meer mense as tien jaar gelede erken," sê hy. Prof. Kees het twee lesings in die Departement Dogmatologie aangebied. Sy ander lesing het gehandel oor die integrasie van gereformeerde en charismatiese kerke.

Two heads better than one

It was a proud day when Prof. Sue Walker, lecturer in the Department of Soil, Crop and Climate Sciences, could say "Our university and the University of Nottingham are making a good team because at the two institutions we have different skills that complement one another. Our university has hands on experience with countries in the Southern African Development Community (SADC) region and has the facilities to do field trials whilst the University of

Nottingham has its experiences with countries in the rest of Africa as well as the European Union."

Prof. Sue said this as her department and scientists from the School of Biosciences from the University of Nottingham in the United Kingdom (UK) laid the groundwork for a project that will contribute to maintain food security under the change in climate conditions.

At the workshop "Water use by under-utilised crop in semi-arid areas" our university and the University of Nottingham combined their expertise and proposed two projects to address water stress on alternative crops.

One proposal is to develop and implement a system that will assist farmers to make a good crop selection for a specific area based on how these crops will cope with climate variations. "The system will also help us to bring in different crops and thus diversify the number of crops a farmer is growing," said Prof. Sue.

The second is an intervention that small-scale farmers could apply in cases where they know the rainfall. If a good rainfall is predicted, the product will advise on some simple and reasonable things that farmers could do to optimise their crops, for example to put more fertilizer into the ground," said Prof. Sue.

This proposal will be implemented in East and West Africa as well as the SADC region.

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
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

According to the rector of the University of Salento cultural property (property of great importance to the cultural heritage of people) should be seen as the key element for the cultural and social development of a society. "Cultural heritage should no longer be considered as an untouchable asset," he said.

They both delivered papers, contributing to the conference theme: Cross borders, orality, interculturality, memory archives and technology. Sara's paper about naming an African child today, with special reference to the Basotho, addressed the vital role a name plays in a Basotho's life. Her paper addressed the significance and the implication based on both mythical and historical legends according to incidents, places as well as personal experiences.

Prof. Hennie's paper focused on intertextuality based on Paravion, a novel of the Dutch author Hafid Bouazza's. Paravion tells the story of successive generations of migrant workers in a small Moroccan village. The title is derived from the words "par avion"

meaning by air mail. The workers receive letters from abroad that they cannot read because they are illiterate and uneducated and they take them into town where they are publicly read, thus again being transformed and integrated into oral tradition.

Visionary of Africa Studies says good bye

After a distinguished 33 years of service to our university, Prof Philip Nel, Director of the Centre for Africa Studies (CAS), is bidding farewell.

Prof. Philip has decided that the time has come to scale down his involvement with the university and to spend more time his wife, Olivia and doing more research.

The newly appointed Director of CAS, Prof. Anwar Osman, had only words of praise for the man whose big shoes he has to fill. "We should celebrate Prof. Philip not only for establishing CAS but also for the dynamic role he played and the enormous contributions he made to the development of the university", he says.

Although he will be leaving the full-time employ of the university, Prof. Philip is still involved in a number of active research projects.

He has had a distinguished career since joining the university in 1975 as a Senior Lecturer in the Department of Semitic Languages in the Faculty of the Humanities. In 2003 the Department of Near Eastern Studies evolved into the Department of Afroasiatic Studies, Sign Language and Language Practice, a move in which Prof. Philip was instrumental. During this time he became the driving force behind the

establishment of the Africa Studies Programme and became the Programme Director at its inception in 2002.

Prof. Philip, displaying his usual foresight, recognised early on the importance for our university to cultivate an African focus in its academic offerings and research, a vision that came to fruition with the official launch of CAS on 5 November 2007.

He is one of the most dedicated and gifted study advisers for postgraduate students with more than 41 students who successfully completed their M.A. and Ph.D. studies. His publication record is exemplary with contributions to 11 books as well as 54 scientific articles to date. He has made numerous research visits abroad and participated in archaeological projects in Israel.

His successor Prof Anwar says: "My intention is to build on the groundwork done thus far and to broaden the teaching and research base of the centre to include the natural sciences as well, truly making CAS a beacon for multi-disciplinary study."

"The future success of this centre will be a lasting testament to Prof. Philip's visionary leadership".

Prof. Anwar, who was born in the Sudan, assumed the directorship of CAS on 1 September 2008. He has had a distinguished international career in academia that includes serving on the faculties of many international universities in Sudan, Italy, Spain and Norway amongst others. Prof. Anwar's area of expertise is ethno-botany and ethno-archaeology.

Sound and talent



What could have been more fitting than a springtime musical celebration of ten years of academic achievement and excellent community service, free of charge and open to the general public? The series of three well-attended concerts presented by the staff and students of the Department of Music, testified to the appreciation felt by everyone for the university's past and present role in the Free State.

In the first concert, music from the early to the late Romantic Period was beautifully performed by Nicol Viljoen, Albie van Schalkwyk and a string quartet comprising Denise Sutton, Sharon de Kock, Jeanne-Louise Moolman, and Michael Haller. Nicol gave a sensitive rendition of Schubert's Sonata No. 21, while Albie's exquisitely played piano part perfectly dovetailed with the quartet's equally fine interpretation of César Franck's Piano Quintet, Op.14.

Two further highlights of the festival were the Jazz ensembles and the Free State Youth Symphony Orchestra. Noel Stockton organised a rainbow palette of items that reflected various styles of Jazz comprising American, African and Indian elements. He showcased promising young South African musicians, including the group Twelve Comma 5 who gave a rousing African flavour to the proceedings, eliciting an enthusiastic response from the multiracial audience. This, together with an item entitled "Mandela" composed by the South African artist Abdullah Ibrahim and an unusual jazz combination of piano, bass, percussion and the Indian flute played by Chats Devroop from UNISA reflected the

university's commitment to a new society. As usual, Noel compèred the proceedings in his inimitable way, and introduced two recent compositions of his own, including "Kea Hae" – I'm going home.

The sense of history was reflected in the final concert that presented works ranging from the 16th century to the present. Hans Huyssen's newly formed Collegium Fons Florum introduced secular and religious works from the 17th century on period instruments using gut strings. The highlight of this part of the programme was Claudio Monteverdi's "Lauda, Lauda Jerusalem" for soloists, choir and strings. Hans not only specialises in authentic period performance and in 20th century music, but also has a keen interest in African music. Since his arrival at the university, a number of Baroque instruments have been acquired.

The concert concluded with the Free State Youth Symphony Orchestra performing rousing renditions of works by Dukas, Tchaikovsky, Elgar and Holst, all requiring a considerable brass component. That was no surprise, given the appointment of Paul Loeb van Zuijlenberg a year ago to the Department of Music as a senior lecturer in brass instruments. Since then he has built up an imposing brass ensemble, and is an enthusiastic and inspiring conductor of youthful orchestras, as became evident in the quality of the performance heard in these final works played at the close of a very successful Spring Festival. – Ninette Pretorius

Enhance your corporate value with the right impression

"What we wear does not only reflect our good taste but also our good judgment," said Christa Klink, a Chata Romano representative. She was called in by the Wellness Committee to present a workshop as part of a Women's Week initiative.

Christa provided helpful hints on making the right impression. There are a number of aspects to keep in mind when planning your "corporate confidence"

wardrobe. Some do's and don'ts that will help every lady to step out in style and confidence, are:

- Wear clear colours. Avoid dull and sludgy colours.
- Problem area: tummy and hips. Opt for longer jackets. A helpful hint is to take a measurement between your shoulder and your feet (standing bare feet), divide it in two and that should be the length of your jacket.
- Problem area: full busts. Avoid double breast jackets.
- Accessories: avoid carrying a handbag that is wider than the width of your body.

4. Die enkelmediumopsie is wesenlik ongrondwetlik. Wat ons onself moet afvra, is of dit die uiteindelike bedoeling van die grondwetskrywers

- was om alle staatsinstellinge te laat verengels?
5. Die enkelmediumopsie druis ook wesenlik in teen die ideale van die Taalbeleid vir Hoër Onderwys. Daarin staan onteenseglik dat Afrikaans as voertaal aan hoéronderwysinstellings behou sal word.
 6. Die parallelmediummodel (wat trouens in die Taalbeleid vir Hoër Onderwys voorsien word) word gebaseer op die veronderstelling dat studente uit een van twee onderriginstrumente kan kies (of selfs beide kan kies, soos wat reeds begin gebeur – een module in Afrikaans, 'n ander module in Engels). Dit word nie veronderstel dat studente 'n keuse oor identiteit uitoefen nie.
 7. Enkelmedium maak nie noodwendig gelyk nie. Swart studente KIES om in hulle tweedetaal onderrig te word, dit is 'n keuse wat hulle reeds baie vroeg op skool maak. Die studente kom dus nie na die UV met die bedoeling of verwagting om in hulle moedertaal onderrig te word nie. Hulle skakel dus nie hier oor na hulle tweedetaal nie. Afrikaanse studente daarenteen verwerf meestal Engels as tweedetaal binne 'n model van moedertaalgebaseerde tweetaligheid. Die moedertaal word behou as voertaal. Die

uiteenlopende tweetalige modelle bring mee dat daar nie gelykheid in emosionele en kognitiewe ontwikkeling by die twee stelle leerders was/is nie. 8. Deur enkelmediumonderrig faal die UV in haar groter onderrigtaak. Gegewe die ideale van 'n funksionele meertalige bestel, het die UV 'n onderrigverantwoordelikheid wat betref die taalbestel. Suid-Afrika se taalkompleksiteit word allermis opgelos met slagkrete en 'n aandrang op Engels elke keer wanneer die meertalige realiteit vir ons een te veel word.

Hierdie paar oorwegings bied sekerlik nie antwoord op al die vrae rondom die taalkwessie wat tans die ronde doen nie. Ook probeer ek doelbewus die emosionele en sentimentele argumente (aan beide kante) te vermy. Debatte wat hierdeur geïnspireer word, val soveel kere vas in 'n warboel van perspepies en etikettering. Ek laat dit maar aan andere oor.

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Streamlined M.A. in Higher Education Studies on offer

As from 2009, the newly adapted and streamlined curriculum for the structured MA (Higher Education Studies) will be offered by CHESD to lecturing, non-lecturing and management colleagues. This is an opportunity for professional development focusing on the latest developments in the field of university education. An honours degree (or equivalent) and appropriate work experience at the university will serve as admission requirements (no previous teaching qualification is required). The variety of course work modules in the programme will have an interdisciplinary focus and will be offered by means of an active, but practical resource-based approach during limited, dispersed block contact sessions.

The two compulsory modules in the curriculum for the structured degree will not only lay a broad foundation regarding university education and the management thereof, but also in the context of the candidates' university work environment. Additionally, the elective course work modules will cover important fields such as quality assurance, adult learning, learning facilitation, assessment,

e-learning, community service learning, postgraduate supervision, the development of study material, as well as module and programme development at university level. An extended mini-dissertation on a topic related to the candidate's own work environment and/or interest will finally be completed during the second year of study by means of a well planned and structured group supervision programme.

The academic programme in Higher Education Studies of CHESD is viewed as a leader in its field. During the past four years nearly 40 graduates obtained the structured M.A. (HES) degree. The programme also hosts certain credit-bearing short learning programmes for academic and support staff of the UFS. With a view to personal enrichment, candidates sometimes also follow single modules in the curriculum as occasional study students.

Lesing vereer een van SA se grootste vroue-leiers

'n Lid van die nasionale uitvoerende komitee van die ANC-vroueliga, Yolanda Botha, het 'n beroep gedoen op alle Suid-Afrikaners om die nalatenskap van Charlotte Maxeke, een van Suid-Afrika se grootste vroue-leiers, te koester.

Me. Botha het by die eerste Charlotte Maxeke-gedenklesing aan die universiteit 'n lesing gelewer om die pioniersrol ter vereer wat Maxeke gespeel het in die stryd vir menseregte, demokrasie en vryheid.

Maxeke is op 7 April 1874 as Charlotte Makgomo Manye in Ramokgopa in die Polokwane-distrik van

Limpopo gebore. In 1905 het sy gegradeer aan die Wilberforce-universiteit in Ohio, VSA as die eerste swart Suid-Afrikaanse vrou wat 'n graad in die wetenskappe behaal het. Sy is getroud met ds. MM Maxeke, 'n prominente predikant in die African Methodist Episcopal-kerk (AME) wat ook oorse studeer het. Hulle het gewerk aan die samestelling en publikasie van die eerste AME-kerkgesangeboek in Xhosa.

Later het sy die stigterslid en president van die Bantoe-vroueliga, voorloper van die ANC-vroueliga,

geword. Sy was 'n vroeë teenstander van die paswette vir swart vroue en 'n organiseerde van die antipasbeweging in Bloemfontein.

Charlotte Maxeke het in 1939 gesterf. Twee jaar later, by 'n ANC-konferensie, is besluit om die vroueliga te stig.

Ter uitbreiding op die uitdagings wat vroue nog in die gesig staar, het me. Botha gesê dat armoede een van die uitdagings is wat die meerderheid vroue beïnvloed. Die lesing is 'n vennootskap tussen die UV en die Vrystaatse provinsiale regering. – **Anton Fisher**



Elgonda speaks out on safe motherhood

An estimated half a million women die each year from complications of pregnancy and childbirth. A further nine million women a year suffer complications while three million newborns die during the first week of life and another three million are stillborn. These statistics are revealed by the International Confederation of Midwives (ICM), an organisation that strives to globally help reduce the numbers of mothers and babies dying in and around childbirth by strengthening the midwifery profession.

Ms Elgonda Bekker, lecturer in the School of Nursing, is the only South African and one of only five midwives in the world who completed the Young

Midwifery Leaders' Programme of the ICM.

The ICM believes that it is important to develop the leadership capacity of midwives because it is midwives that are the most valuable resource in achieving better health for mothers and their newborns and their voice needs to be heard in decision-making. Successfully completing the programme means that Elgonda's role will extend beyond her position as lecturer at our university, influencing policy developers and decision makers in the field of maternal and child-health care. The programme enhances the skills of midwives in research-based decision and policy making; thus increasing the influence of the profession on national

government issues that relate to midwifery worldwide.

As part of the programme Elgonda had to complete certain projects, some on-going. She successfully contributed to the establishment of the White Ribbon Alliance for safe motherhood, a first for South Africa. This worldwide initiative unites individuals, organisations and communities who are working to increase public awareness about the needless loss of life and to promote safe motherhood.

Elgonda was also appointed as the regional representative for Africa on the Educational Standing Committee of the ICM.
