Kovsies verloor krag!

Daar is reeds maatreëls om energie te bespaar in plek, maar elke student, dosent en werknemer van ons universiteit sal moet help! Onthou, elke eenheid elektrisiteit wat ons bespaar, maak 'n verskil. Niemand het meer 'n keuse nie, ons aarde bloei. En op ons Hoofkampus is genoeg insig, kennis en omgee om 'n gesonde toekoms te help skep.

Soos gewoonlik, neem Kovsies die voortou – Vergeet-My-Nie-koshuis se warmwaterstel sal voortaan met 'n nuwe hittepomp wat met sonpanele geïntegreer is, verhit word. Dit is 'n eerste vir Bloemfontein, en net 'n klein deel van ons universiteit se plan om energie te bespaar.

Wat doen ons?

Energiemeters vir die UV-Sasol-biblioteek, Rekenaarlaboratoriumgebou, François Retief-gebou en Steyn-substasie word ook as 'n loodsprojek beplan met toekomstige initiatiewe vir Suid- en Qwaqwa-kampusse. Die inligting op hierdie nuwe energiemeters sal oor 'n afstand afgelaai kan word. Gevolglik kan statistiek van lasprofiel gebruik word om energiebesparingsplanne te formuleer. Energiebesparingsinligting sal nie net agter die skerms beskikbaar wees nie. Elke persoon op kampus wat besig is om op 'n rekenaar te werk sal presies weet wat die huidige kragverbruik is. Danksy 'n lewendige of *real-time* meting, sal kragverbruikboodskappe na rekenaars gestuur word, baie soortgelyk aan die *Power Alert*- boodskappe wat op SABC verskyn.

Geboubestuurstelsels (BMS) is reeds in plek. Die sentrale lugversorgingstelsel op kampus word deur die BMS bestuur, wat beteken dat dit beurtelings vir kort tye met afstandbeheer afgeskakel kan word. So kan die las, indien nodig, verminder word.

Die volgende geboue het ook al 'n 'groener' kleur gekry:

- **Argitektuur:** Bewegingsensors word aangebring om die aan- en afskakel van ligte te beheer.
- **Genmin-Lektorium:** Daar is 'n 40% besparing bewerkstellig deur 160 bestaande ligte met energiebesparende ligte te vervang.
- **Geologie-lesingsaal:** Dieselfde besparing is verkry deur 36 bestaande ligte met energiebesparende ligte te vervang.

- **Winkie Direko-gebou:** Hier is 'n totaal van 354 bestaande ligte met energiebesparende ligte vervang.
- **Die George du Toit-gebou en UV-Sasol-biblioteek:** In die proses om bestaande ligte met energiebesparende ligte te vervang. Die George du Toit-administrasiegebou se hysers word ook vervang met energiebesparende motors en beheersisteme.
- **Landbougebou:** Die nuwe hysbakmotor en beheerstelsel gebruik minder energie.
- **Rekenaarlaboratoriumgebou:** Die temperatuurstelpunt van die lokale is op 22 °C vasgestel.

Heelparty koshuise is ook al van energiebesparende lampies, wat gratis deur ESKOM verskaf is, voorsien.

Ondersoeke na energiebesparende ligte vir die Suid- en Qwaqwa-kampusse word in die nabye toekoms voorsien wat maandelik gedeeltelik deur die ESKOM Laskantbestuur-projek befonds sal word.

Hoekom doen ons dit?

- Dit word van ons verwag. Die regering en plaaslike owerhede plaas druk op alle instansies om energie te bespaar. Hierdie tendens sal na verwagting tot en met 2014 volgehou word, wanneer bykomende kragstasies in bedryf gebring word.
- Dit maak ekonomiese sin. Na raming het ons energieverbruik vanaf 2004 tot nou vermeerder en daar is jaarliks ongeveer 'n 34% verhoging in die prys van elektrisiteit.
- Ons wil. Elkeen het 'n verantwoordelikheid teenoor die planeet. Jy hoef net om jou te kyk om te sien hoeveel skade ons reeds gedoen het. Spesies sterf uit. Temperature wêreldwyd raak by die dag vreemder. Ons water is min. Kos is skraps. En ons dae om die skade ongedaan te maak, raak min. Dit is tyd dat ons

teruggee wat ons so mildelik ontvang.

Wat kan jy doen?

Elkeen op kampus kan saamwerk en help met ons besparingsprojek. Hier is 'n paar riglyne wat julle kan volg. Al klink dit eenvoudig en holrug gery, is daar tog steeds heelwat mense wat nalaat om dit te doen:

- Skakel slegs ligte en lugverkoeling in kantore en geboue aan wanneer dit regtig nodig is. Skakel dit af na gebruik of wanneer die kantoor of gebou vir 'n lang ruk nie gebruik gaan word nie.
- Moet asseblief nie elektriese ligte aanskakel nie, wanneer natuurlike lig genoegsaam is.
- Trek volgens die weer aan om sodoende die onnodige gebruik van verwarmers of lugverkoelers te beperk.
- Probeer ook om van natuurlike ventilasie, eerder as lugverkoelers of waaiers gebruik te maak.
- Indien lugverkoeling wel aan is, sorg dat alle deure en vensters toe is.
- Beperk die gebruik van warm water, veral wanneer jy jou hande was. Koue water en seep werk net so goed.
- Probeer om 'n ketel, eerder as 'n kookwater-urn te gebruik, veral as jy net 'n paar koppies water wil kook.
- Gebruik jou rekenaar se 'slaap'-funksie wanneer jy dit vir 'n ruk lank nie gebruik nie.
- Wanneer jy jou rekenaar vir langer as 'n uur nie gaan gebruik nie, skakel die monitor af.

Fisiese Hulpbronne is op die oomblik besig om statistiek voor te berei waarmee Kovsies se energieverbruik met dié van ander universiteite vergelyk sal kan word. En ons glo dit sal goed lyk! Ons is baie trots op al die maatreëls wat reeds in plek is en weet dat ons, met almal se samewerking, nog beter op hierdie gebied sal vaar.

Water is being wasted

Dear *Dumela*,

Water is being wasted on our Main Campus. One frequently sees sprayers that have been left on too long, resulting in water that streams over the tops of plant containers, or off lawns, forming a river down the road. Seeing that we live in a semi-desert, I feel that it is scandalous.

I get the impression that the gardeners who appear to be in charge of the irrigation have not been properly trained in good environmental practice. The systems are often turned on in the middle of the day when evaporation is at its highest. They are also clearly not aware that the soil here in Bloemfontein is clay-rich, and that short periods of irrigation, frequently repeated, would be much more beneficial (both for the plants and for our university's budget) than a single, long session once in a while.

We have more than enough expertise here on campus to do the research necessary to determine the optimal conditions for effective irrigation of our gardens. (Maybe it has been done already?) Such information would of course be very useful to all gardeners and farmers in and around Bloemfontein. However, until we follow best practice ourselves, it would be a cheek to expect it of the community around us.

Grounds Maintenance: Irrigation replies:

Unfortunately we have to agree with the writer that water wastage does occur to a certain degree when watering the lawns etc. At this stage it is difficult to have absolute control over the irrigation because the person who opens the irrigation is frequently not nearby to see when a sprayer gives a problem or when there is too much run-off of water. In order to irrigate a large enough area, the person opens a few valves at the same time and, because of the extent of the area, he cannot sometimes pay the necessary attention simultaneously to all the irrigation stations. Another factor that contributes to this perception of water wastage is that some areas are lower than others and that while run-off from this area is much quicker, the areas that are at a higher level need to be irrigated for a longer period. Even after a valve has been closed, we find that sprayers at a lower level still produce water for a period of time and contribute to run-off water. The general view is that about 10% of water is lost in this way.

Measures are however being taken to conserve water as far as possible. For instance, there is an ongoing process to upgrade the irrigation on our Main Campus by installing computerised irrigation whereby it can be set according to certain requirements. This is also not the alpha and the omega. The other system that we are implementing is by making use of a central PC with modems attached and which communicates on the basis of cell phone technology. The advantages of this system seem to be quite comprehensive.

Irrigation and maintenance of the grounds on campus is one of our core businesses and therefore the horticulturist of our university is well aware of the composition of the soil, frequency of irrigation, time and length of irrigation, water consumption, cost of irrigation, the effect of mulching, scarifying, the effect on the budget, etc. The effectiveness of irrigation is therefore dependent on practical circumstances, funding, labour and other aspects. Taking these aspects in consideration, staff and students are very welcome to make recommendations to improve the situation. 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Ekonomiese resessie, wat nou?

Ons word daaglik blootgestel aan mediaberigte oor die ekonomiese resessie wat internasionaal hopelik naby sy laagtepunt is, asook die verswakking in die Suid-Afrikaanse ekonomie, terwyl banke se slegte skulde toeneem en al hoe meer gesinne in 'n geldelike knyp raak. Ja, rentekoerse het weer verlaag en dit help beslis vir diegene wat aan groot skuld blootgestel is wat in die beter tye aangegaan is. Maar sake is nog ver van normaal. Daar is natuurlik baie kundiges wat advies gee en aan ons gewone sterflinge aanbeveel dat dit nou die tyd is om jou skuld te betaal!

Goeie genugtig, hulle leef seker op 'n ander planeet, want dit is so goed om te wil sê as jy siek is, moet jy gimnasium toe gaan, hard oefen en jou vitamienes drink. Dan sou jy nie siek geword het nie!

Die feit is, die ekonomie en markte beweeg in siklusse. Dit verg besondere moed en geduld om die siklusse in die gewone huisgesin se geldbeplanning in ag te neem. Ons is nou in 'n erge daalsiklus en diegene wat in die goeie jare geld gespaar het, is nou in 'n besonder gunstige posisie om te beding en bates teen baie billike pryse te kan koop! Dit is wat ons behoort na te streef, naamlik om die ekonomiese en rentekoerssiklus te benut en nie daardeur gevang te word nie.

As die ekonomie groei en dit gaan goed, word jy oorval met aanbiedinge van goeie kopies en die krediet wat daarmee gepaard gaan. Rentekoerse is gemaklik en jy kan sonder 'n sent deposito eiendom koop om te verhuur, en sommer ook 'n motor daarmee saam. Moet ook nie van die aanbouings vergeet en die groter fasiliteit op die kredietkaart nie. Dis nogal

swaar om vir die familie te sê dit is tyd om te spaar en breek aan te draai as almal op krediet koop!

Dit is presies wat ons behoort te doen, maar nou ja, makliker gesê as gedaan!

Aan die bopunt van die siklus, nadat ons almal krediet opgeneem het, het die reserwebank rentekoerse skerp verhoog. In 2007/08 het huis- en motorpaaie somer met duisende rande per maand gestyg, terwyl die ekonomiese borrel internasionaal ook gebars het. Ons banke het geskrik, opgehou krediet gee en somer ongeskik taai geraak.

Kredietvoorsiening in Suid-Afrika het ernstig in die laaste jaar van die resessie gekrimp, wat sy eie probleme vir baie besighede en huishoudings geskep het. Die inperking van krediet ontnem baie relatief gesonde besighede en huishoudings van broodnodige finansiering en kontantvloei om deur die insinking te kom.

Wat staan die gewone huisgesin te doen? Dit gaan nou oor kop bo water hou en bowenal om nie agter te raak met rekeninge nie.

Nuwe skuld is nie 'n goeie idee nie, veral nie om ou skuld mee te betaal nie.

Kan jy nou spaar en jou rekeninge almal afbetaal soos almal aanbeveel? Nee, ek dink jy moet nou net kophou. Al is die rentekoerse laag, moet jy nie verlei word om nuwe skuld te maak nie. Betaal jou skuld af in die groeisiklus wat gaan kom, want glo my, oor drie na vier jaar het rentekoerse weer in sy stygsiklus inbeweeg. Dan gaan ons weer wurg.

As jy egter nou geld in die lae rentekoersfase spaar, sal daar baie koopgeleenthede wees as die ekonomie sy volgende daalsiklus ingaan – na so vyf tot ses jaar, want markte werk in siklusse. Wanneer rentekoerse op hulle laagtepunt is, is die ekonomie in die knyp en is dit tyd vir goeie kopies, mits jy jou daarvoor posisioneer het.

Diegene wat spaarsamig deur die vorige paar jaar se groei- en kredietfase gewerk het en kapitaal opgebou het, is nou in 'n besonder goeie posisie om bates teen baie billike pryse aan die onderpunt van die siklus te koop! Dit is die uitdaging: om jou so te posisioneer dat jy teen die siklus beweeg en die geleenthede benut.

Diegene wat nou knyp, moet vasbyt en deur die siklus werk. Hulle moenie onnodige nuwe skuld maak met die lae rentekoerse nie. Bou liever ruimte op vir die volgende rentekoersstygfase, want dan sal jy ruimte hê om goeie bates teen lae pryse te koop as rentekoerse knyp. Dit verg baie geduld en motivering vir die familie as almal koop en jy spaar, maar dit is nogal gaaf as jy jou reg geposisioneer het, om nou die ruimte te hê om te koop en krediet teen die lae rentekoerse op te neem. Wanneer die goeie tye kom, spaar dat dit bars vir die volgende ekonomiese afswaai, waar jy bates weer goedkoper gaan koop!

Reptiles and guitars. These are the two passions of Prof. Neil Heideman, Vice-Dean of our Faculty of Natural and Agricultural Sciences. It's a strange combination to most of us but, to Prof. Neil that's what makes him tick.

He was busy on the phone when I walked into his office for our interview. I couldn't help but hear the excitement in his voice as he spoke. "That was Gerhardus Damara, one of my former students at the University of Namibia in Windhoek. He wants me to join him in a research project in the Riemvasmaak area," he explained as he put the phone down. I could sense that research and contact with students were still very much part of him; and rightfully so, since he has been in the teaching profession for more than 23 years.

Being a teacher and manager in our Faculty of Natural and Agricultural Sciences is not all Prof. Neil does. When we started talking, I discovered that he had many hidden talents. His great passion is playing the guitar, and he has two electric and two acoustic guitars. "I started playing the guitar when I was 12 years old. I grew up in the Stellenbosch area and my friends in the rural village were all very musical," he explained. His favourite guitar is a 12-string Ibanez, bought by his mother and sister when he completed his BSc Honours degree, cum laude, in 1979. "It was an expensive gift from two special people," he said.

"If you play the guitar, you must also be able to sing," I said. "Well, my favourite music is anything from rock to country, but I only sing when no-one is around!" he said with a smile.

Our conversation turns to his work. "What do you do when you leave the office in the afternoon?" I asked. "My office moves to my house, as is the case with many academics and managers," he said. Over and above his hobby and primary duties, Prof. Neil is also a herpetologist by training and he makes time at home to work on aspects of research such as manuscripts and proposals. "At home I have time to analyse results, write and interact with members of the research team I'm part of," he said.

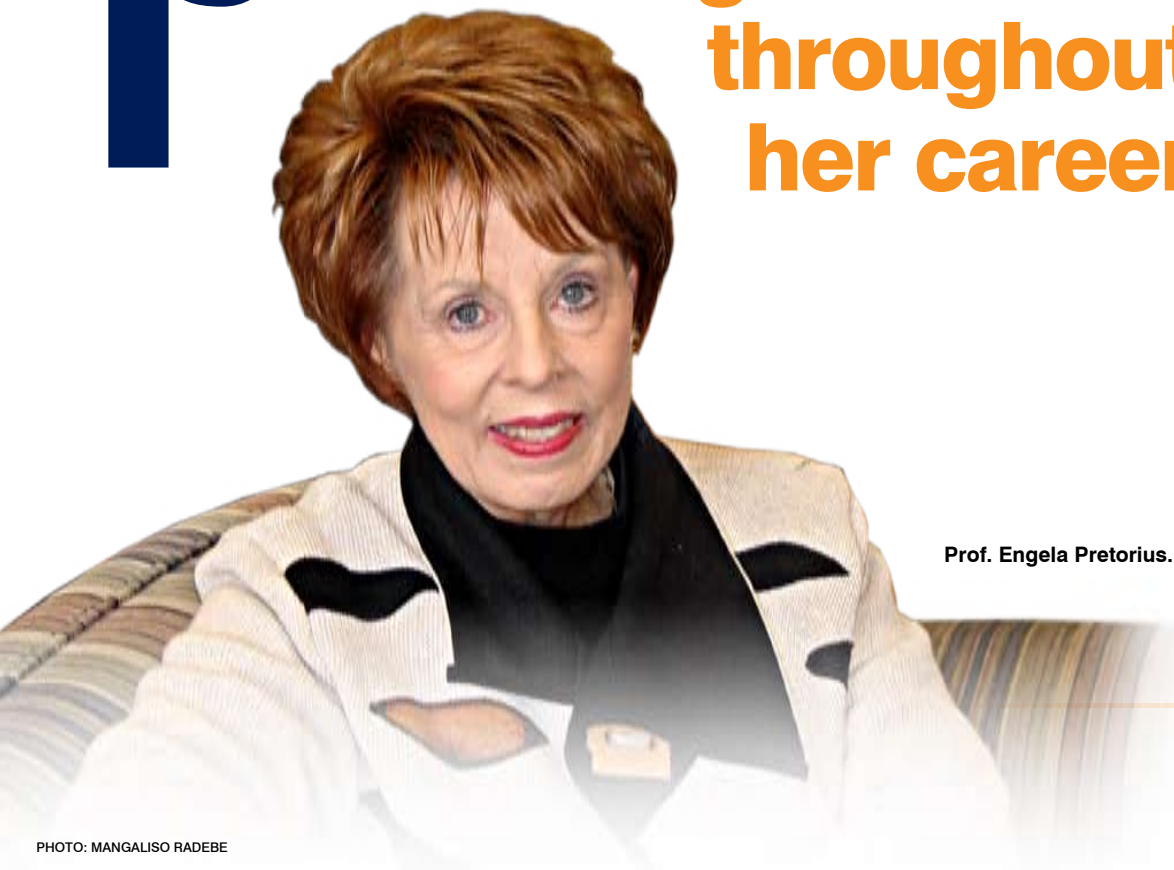
Central to his existence is his family. His wife Estelle manages our university's HIV/Aids Centre, their daughter Lee-Anne (23) studies BCom Marketing and O'Ryan (20) their son is studying BA Media Studies. "They are an important element of my unwinding when I get home after work," he said.

His career started in 1981 at the University of the Western Cape, followed by the University of Namibia from 1982. From there he moved to the National Museum in Bloemfontein in 1995, to our Qwaqwa Campus in 1998 and in 2004 he was appointed Vice-Dean on our Main Campus. One of the highlights of his career was receiving a Fulbright Senior Researcher Fellowship to conduct research in the laboratory of Prof. Jack Sites, a leading herpetologist at Brigham Young University,

"I do not think I leave behind any big monuments, but it has been one long, joyous journey. And if I can encapsulate it, it must be something about empowerment."

Being able to empower fellow human beings must surely rank up there among major achievements – "big monuments" for any individual. But not for this modest woman who, some 30 years ago, set out on a journey to uplift other women who were not as privileged as she was.

Prof. Engela Pretorius, until recently the Vice-Dean of the Faculty of the Humanities at our university, retired at the end of June this year.

Being the altruistic person that she is, Prof. Engela could not just selfishly wallow in the glory of being one of the only few female academic shining stars in a galaxy of inequity and discrimination.

"In the Faculty of the Humanities we had a so-called Equity Committee long before it was an institutional requirement, long before there was a legal requirement by the Department of Labour to look into issues of equity," she explains.

"In terms of women there were people who had been in positions for more than 20 years and they had done everything right by the book. They had obtained qualifications, they had published, they had done everything that an academic should do, but there was no promotion. They were not even considered. When the last of those women had been promoted to the right position, that was a good feeling."

"Yes, we have made great strides and many of those have made me very happy. In terms of women, especially white women, I think we have reached a good point. But in terms of black staff we are not there yet. We do sometimes get people appointed, only to lose them in a year or two or three. So there are still

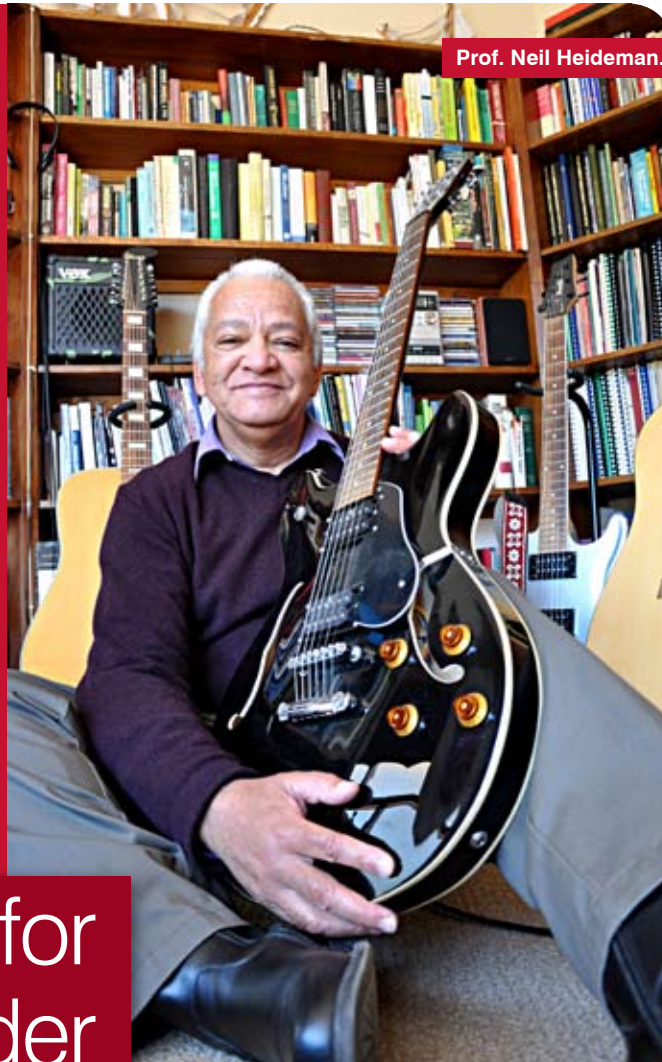
Utah, in the United States of America, from October 2006–April 2007. "That was an enriching experience, which included facilitating a series of seminars on conservation issues in our country to senior undergraduate and graduate students."

Prof. Neil's research currently focuses on the phylogeny, phylogeography and the conservation of legless and semi-legless lizards, but he has also done work on general ecological issues such as reproduction and social organisation in other lizard species. "DNA diagnostic markers are central to what we are currently doing and they have provided interesting insights into the diversity and evolutionary relationships of these legless and semi-legless species," he said. They are morphologically very conservative, but genetically extremely diverse. Globally, South Africa, together with countries such as Australia and Mexico, is one of the countries with the highest diversity of amphibians and reptiles.

Prof. Neil's research team consists of Prof. Savel Daniels, Department of Botany and Zoology at Stellenbosch University and Martin Hendricks, Department of Biodiversity and Conservation Biology, University of the Western Cape, with postgraduates students who are coming and going. Their current projects focus mainly on species found along the Western Cape Coast, but at times they go even as far as southern Namibia to collect specimens. A recent special find was a specimen unexpectedly collected by Profs. Jo and Liesl van As in their research camp on the Okavango Delta, a first record of the species in Botswana. "I would, however, like to get into the lab more often," he said.

And what are the challenges for him in his portfolio as Vice-Dean? "We all have a duty to advance academic excellence in our faculty and to produce world-class graduates capable of functioning well in society. We also have to continue working towards changing our staff profile in terms of black academics to better reflect our provincial demography, a challenge underscored, amongst others, by the poor performance of many students from these designated groups, mainly due to their under-preparedness for university studies as well as competition from the government and private sectors for the top graduandi from these groups," he said.

Leaving his office, I could not help thinking of the many times I'd had contact with Prof. Neil over the years. Two things stand out for me: his unruffled temperament and ability to always be the same – to my mind good characteristics for a person in a position of leadership. - **Lacea Loader**

some things that we are not doing right."

So, what are these things that our university is not doing right?

"It is not always about salaries," she says. "It is about the institutional culture. It is about how people feel about coming here every day. It is the 'wow' feeling, that 'yes, I belong here and I feel good about it'. I think that is where we are still lacking and there are still so many horror stories of how people are being treated. So, in terms of that, much work still needs to be done."

Prof. Engela is not totally lost to this institution, which she reckons has become part of her life. She is still a Research Associate with the Department of Communication Science.

"I was blessed to be part of our university," she says. "I loved every position that I was in, from junior lecturer right through the ranks. It is in every fibre of my body."

She concedes, though, that it is a daily struggle for her to come to grips with the fact that she is now retired.

"For a long time I used to wake up at night and have this terrible feeling that I have forgotten something very important. I am slowly getting rid of that, but you have to work at it. Sometimes I feel a bit down and I think it is because of that. You think, 'am I still useful?' because before this many people were reliant on me and I felt as if my life was purposeful," she says.

"That I can still serve many people in other ways, is something I need to get used to. But it does take time to adjust."

However, being retired comes with its own privileges, as Prof. Engela has since discovered. She can now enjoy the simplest of joys that life can offer that she would otherwise not have been able to enjoy before retiring. "Because I was here from dawn to dusk, I missed so many things," she says. "It is just lovely to walk out the front door in the middle of the day and look at a bunch of daffodils. That is just so wonderful."

"Apart from that, I enjoy spending time with my husband. And I also enjoy cooking; I love cooking."

Besides reading a lot of books and other literature, she is also writing essays about her life and her experiences to keep herself busy, as she says she cannot just sit and do nothing. "I have so many stories in me about my life and experiences," she says. "Stories like 'Why I do not drink whisky' and things like 'Wimp, you should not touch me like that again'."

"And I am also passionate about history. The first history that I want to research is my own family history." She reckons she is very happy with the way her life has turned out.

"Everything I did in my life, even the smallest, most insignificant thing, I tried to do to the best of my ability. Therefore I am satisfied with what I did and how I did it," she says, as a parting shot. - **Mangaliso Radebe**

Human interaction major focus of new building

Our university strives for all its interventions, including the physical development of our campus, to be quality based. A good example of this is the development of a new building that will accommodate more students and lecturing halls and that will boost the image of the Faculty of Economic and Management Sciences as well as the School of Management within this faculty.

The development includes a new lecture hall building, with an auditorium for 800 students and fourteen 25-seater lecture halls, as well as a new wing which will house amongst others the offices and lecturing facilities of the School of Management.

The site for this project is located on the northern side of the campus next to the Wynand Mouton Theatre. According to Erika, this development has

the potential to become a bridge and link between the central campus and the edge of the campus. The main focus of this development is on activating pedestrian and student activity on this part of the campus.

"The conceptual idea is to create a fragment of an urban environment, with intertwining and overlapping functions. As in all city environments, and as on campus, varying public realms of pedestrian and vehicle flow are intricately linked together. To create open public spaces and a backdrop for students to congregate, the two buildings are extruded over the site, overlapping the existing street, promoting student flow in, out and through the site and buildings. This enables human interaction and flow in a flexible way.

"This development will also create pedestrian flow through main circulation areas, opening the building to public areas with the use of lightweight structures and glass. Bulk campus activities (lecture halls, auditoriums, etc.) are at the ground and lower levels, also opening up to public areas where interaction can take place," said Erika.

With this project, lecturer's offices are placed on upper, more private levels. A multi-level circulation area with ramps will link the different levels, functions, spaces and people and will promote interaction between lecturers and students.

The new buildings will contribute to our university's plan to create a campus where students can gather and interact, not only with one another, but also with their surroundings. - **Leonie Bolleurs**

International jazz maestro teaches our students

Om die waarheid te sê ...

Die gehalte van drinkwater bly 'n netelige kwessie en dit bly 'n punt van bespreking. Wel, hier is goeie nuus vir ons personeel wat in Bloemfontein bly: die gehalte van die drinkwater van vyf woonbuurte in die stad is ten minste so goed, indien nie beter nie, as gebottelde water.

Dit is die resultaat van 'n standaard chemiese, sowel as bakteriële analise wat ons universiteit se Sentrum vir Omgewingsbestuur, in samewerking met ons Instituut vir Grondwaterstudies (IGS), gedoen het.

Vyf monsters van kraanwaterbronne is in die woonbuurte Universitas, Brandwag, Bainsvlei, Langenhovenpark en Bayswater geneem en 15 monsters is van verskillende handelsmerke van stil, ongegeurde gebottelde water geneem. Die monsters is by die IGS se laboratorium ontleed, terwyl die vertolking van die analise deur ons Sentrum vir Omgewingsbestuur gedoen is.

"Ons wou die verskil in gehalte vir menslike verbruik tussen Bloemfontein se kraanwater en dié van die verskillende handelsmerke van gebottelde water evalueer," verduidelik prof. Maitland Seaman, Hoof van ons Sentrum vir Omgewingsbestuur.

"Met die uitsondering van twee monsters wat deur multinasionale maatskappye by hulle aanlegte in Suid-Afrika geproduseer is, is die verskillende tipes gebottelde water wat vir die studie gebruik is deur Suid-Afrikaanse maatskappye geproduseer, insluitend 'n plaaslike, kleinskaal Bloemfonteinse produsent," sê prof. Seaman.

Volgens die etikette varieer die bronne van die water van suiwer fonteinwater tot gedeeltelike tru-osmose, tot slegs tru-osmose. (Tru-osmose is 'n proses waarin water onder druk gestuur word deur 'n pyp met uiters klein porieë waardeur water, maar geen – of baie lae konsentrasies van – soute nie, gelaat word.)

Die ontleding het 'n paar interessante bevindings opgelewer, aldus prof. Seaman:

- Een van die gebottelde watermonsters het 'n baie lae mineraalinhoud getoon. Deur oor 'n uitgebreide tydperk slegs sulke water te drink, het waarskynlik 'n negatiewe uitwerking op die menslike fisiologie.
- Die analise het verskille aangetoon in die mineraalinhoud wat op die

etikette van die meeste van die waterbottels aangedui is, in vergelyking met dié wat deur die IGS-analise bevind is. Die handelsmerke van twee pare gebottelde water maak daarop aanspraak om presies dieselfde mineraalinhoud te hê, maar word onder verskillende handelsname, asook teen verskillende pryse gebottel. In albei gevalle was een van die twee 'n bekende huishoudelike handelsnaam en die ander waarskynlik die oorspronklike produsent. In een van hierdie gevalle pare het die huishoudelike handelsnaam aangedui dat die water fonteinwater was, terwyl die ander (identiese) "oorspronklike" handelsnaam aangedui het dat dit fonteinwater was wat met tru-osmose behandel en suurstofverryk is.

- Die prys van die verskillende handelsname gebottelde water, wat elk 500 ml stil water bevat, het tussen R3,99 en R8,99 gewissel, met R5,03 die gemiddelde prys. 'n Vergelyking tussen die goedkoopste en die duurste bottels water het geen betekenisvolle verskil in gehalte opgelewer nie. Trouens, teenstrydighede is in die duurste bottel waargeneem. Daar is gevind dat die hoeveelheid kalsium daarin betekenisvol verskil het van wat die analise aangetoon het (29,6 mg/l teenoor 0,92 mg/l). Daar is ook bevind dat die alkaliniteit (CaCO_3 mg/l) wat op die bottel aangedui is heelwat verskil het (83 mg/l teenoor 9,4 mg/l).

"Die voorkeur vir gebottelde water bo Bloemfontein se kraanwater, vanuit 'n kwalitatiewe perspektief sowel as wat die prysverskil betref, is nie geregtig nie. Die omgewingsvoetspoor van gebottelde water is ook groot. Die verkryging, behandeling, bottelering, verpakking en vervoer, om maar enkele van die stappe te noem wat betrokke is by die prosessering van gebottelde water, laat 'n reuse koolstofvoetspoor sowel as 'n groot watervoetspoor, omdat die prosessering van gebottelde water ook water vir die behandeling en spoeling daarvan benodig," sê prof. Seaman.

Dit is navorsing soos hierdie wat spreek van ons universiteit se strewe om kritiese, wetenskaplike denke te bevorder. - **Lacea Loader**

Hetsie Veitch van die Sentrum vir Studente met Gestremdhede:

Vir ons studente met gestremdhede sal ek graag al die nodige fondse beskikbaar wou hê om al die hulpbronne en tegnologie wat elkeen van hulle individueel nodig het om die lewe vir hulle te vergemaklik, aan hulle te verskaf, insluitend beursgeld vir hulle studies. Ons is voortdurend op soek na eksterne donasies en fondse hiervoor. Meer realisties sal ek aanhou veg om mense meer bewus te maak van die vermoëns van mense met gestremdhede. Dit is noodsaaklik dat mense met meer kennis toegerus moet wees om die leefwêreld en behoeftes van mense met gestremdhede beter te verstaan.



Lyle Markham from the Department of Industrial Psychology:

I would try to clear the misconceptions regarding persons with disabilities by ensuring that able-bodied people have the necessary knowledge of the correct terminology and etiquette when it comes to persons with disabilities, for example, when referring to a person with a physical disability, the wording should be "a person with a disability" and not a "disabled person".

Stereotyping, coupled with prevailing prejudice against persons with disabilities, plays a major role in preventing them to have equal opportunities for education and employment. It also isolates them from mainstream society, withholding the integration they so desperately crave. These issues will become a top priority. I will make sure everyone treats persons with disabilities fairly, and that they always think about the needs of people with disabilities when planning services.



Pieter du Plessis van Finansies:

Ek dink een van die beste maniere om 'n gestremde persoon te help is om die persoon net soos enige ander mens te behandel en nie vreemd ("weird") te wees omdat die persoon anders is nie. Ek probeer altyd om op 'n baie natuurlike manier met gestremde mense te gesels en bied my hulp aan soos wat ek dit vir enigiemand anders sou doen. By die kerk se kinderbediening het ons 'n blinde meisie wat by ons universiteit studeer wat lesse vir die kinders aanbied. Dit is baie lekker vir haar om deur almal as 'n doodnormale mens wat 'n bydrae kan maak, aanvaar te word.



Naomi de Valdoleiros van ERAS:

By die nagraadse skryfsentrum ERAS (Eenheid van Retoriese en Akademiese Skryfwerk) is ons bewus van gestremde studente en akkommodeer hul sover moontlik. Ons kantore is op die boonste vloer van Steynanneks, waarvan die hysbak onlangs voltooi en in werkende orde is; dus kan gestremde studente ons maklik bereik. Ons het 'n kursusaanvraagvorm waarop spesifiek gevra word of studente spesiale behoeftes het, en ons akkommodeer hulle daarvolgens.

Vanaf 2010, met die implementering van Blackboard, gaan prof. Our university strives towards being a place where high-quality science practice and learning take place. The successful work that is done at the Institute for Reformatory and Classical Studies – seated in the Faculty of Theology – bears testimony to this.

Meer as 100 000 rekords al elektronies beskikbaar

In die minder as drie jaar vandat die reuse projek aangepak is om ons universiteit se studenterekords elektronies vas te lê en te bewaar, is meer as 103 390 lêers reeds verwerk en die 3 053 383 bladsye hiervan is met die druk van 'n knoppie gelyktydig aan alle gebruikers beskikbaar.

Miemie Joubert, Assistentdirekteur by Rekenaardienste, deel 'n klompie interessante feite met ons. Die skandering van studenterekords het op 14 Junie 2006 begin en op 12 Junie vanjaar was 102 000 lêers reeds deurgewerk en elektronies via die ImageNow-sagteware beskikbaar.

Die papierrekords word in meer as 777 kartonne van gemiddeld 15,9 kg elk deur 'n argiveringsmaatskappy vir ons universiteit in veilige bewaring gehou nadat dit gekategoriseer en geïndekseer is om ook toegang tot die papierrekords te vergemaklik. Die meer as 12 ton papier wat elders gestoor word, stel natuurlik waardevolle ruimte op kampus beskikbaar.

Die proses is nog ver van afgehandel en

van die ouer rekords sal ook so vasgelê word.

Haumie Joubert, Assistentdirekteur by Registrasies, sê dit help ontsaglik dat studenterekords nou met die druk van 'n knoppie beskikbaar is. Ook Wieda McCrae, Adjunkdirekteur by Finansies, is vol lof vir die stelsel. Sy sê dit is wonderlik en baie waardevol en die afdeling gebruik dit daaglik.

'n Mens kry 'n idee van hierdie waardevolle diens wat aan gebruikers op kampus gelewer word as jy na die volgende internasionale syfers in terme van die handliassing van dokumente kyk:

- 'n Gemiddeld van 19 afskrifte word van elke dokument gemaak.
- Die koste van handliassing beloop gemiddeld R160 vir elke dokument.
- Dit kos sowat R960 om een dokument op te spoor wat nie reg geliasseer is nie.
- Minstens 1 uit elke 20 dokumente gaan verlore.
- Daar word gemiddeld 25 uur bestee om elke verlore dokument te herskep.
- 'n Professionele persoon kan tot 50% van sy

tyd aan die soek van lêers afstaan.

Die elektroniese byhou van rekords help om kantoorruimte te bespaar. Elektroniese dokumente is maklik beskikbaar en verg nie kantoorruimte nie. Talle mense het op dieselfde tyd toegang tot die rekords, en werk hoef nie stil te staan terwyl rekords deur een persoon bestudeer word nie. In die geval van 'n ramp is dit ook maklik beskikbaar. Rekords kan ook vir 'n lang tyd aanlyn of in 'n bewaarplek bewaar word. - **Leatitia Pienaar**

Prof. Dolf Britz, Professor Researcher in the Office of the Registrar: Strategic Planning and Dr Victor d'Assonville are the joint directors of the institute. Dr Victor is a research fellow at our university and currently associated with the Akademie für Reformatorische Theologie in Germany.

Together with Prof. Dolf and Dr Victor, Prof. Erik de Boer, also a research fellow at our university, is also specialising in 16th century church history. Prof. Erik is associated with the Vrije Universiteit of Amsterdam as well as the Theological University of Kampen in the Netherlands. During August this year he was a guest lecturer at our Faculty of Theology.

This past year the institute has yielded many "firsts". As an example, Prof. Dolf and Dr Victor were the only two South Africans from a group of more than 50 internationally recognised experts on Calvin who were collaborators for a new book on Calvin. This publication, which enjoys international recognition, is available in four languages, namely English, Dutch, German and Italian.

"In order to help writing the book, primary sources had to be consulted, in other words, the authors had to make use of the original French and Latin sources," said Prof. Dolf.

One of the objectives of the institute is to empower students as researchers. "More than 15 theology students took Latin during the past four years. This skill is very important, because most writing on theology was written in Latin until far into the 17th century," said Prof. Dolf.

The institute is also the only institution in South Africa where organised research on Calvin is undertaken. "In this regard our university has been requested to host the major international Calvin Research Conference that will take place in 2010. More than 100 recognised Calvin researchers will deliver lectures at this conference," said Prof. Dolf. It will be first time that the conference convenes in Africa.

Another major work on which the institute can be congratulated, is the publication of Calvin's commentaries in Afrikaans. The commentary on the book of Romans was published last year. Prof. Fanus Postma from the University of the North-West did the translation.

Prof. Boelie Wessels from the Department of Roman Law, History of Law and Comparative Law at our university has also been involved in the project. Currently he is busy translating Calvin's commentary on Genesis. Prof. Boelie is also translating shorter writings by Calvin, for example, his well-known answer from Cardinal to Sodaletus and his defence regarding Servetus.

According to Prof. Dolf, a next project of the institute will be to translate Calvin's works into Sesotho.

Prof. Erik also edited two new text-critical editions of Calvin's works that were included in the Calvini Opera Recognita Series by Droz, Genève. Apart from this, he also published sermons by Calvin on the book of Ezekiel in the Calvini Supplementa Series. These sermons were prepared for publication from original manuscripts, and have therefore now been published for the first time in history. - **Leonie Bolleurs**

Onderwerp of fokuspunt: Op elke foto moet daar 'n fokuspunt wees. Dit is die voorwerp wat jy afneem, 'n mens, 'n dier, 'n voertuig, ens. en dit is die belangrikste ding wat jy op jou foto wil wys. Gewoonlik deel 'n fotograaf sy foto horisontaal en vertikaal in derdes op en plaas die onderwerp op een van die snypunte.

Voorgond: Te veel voorgond kan jou foto kelder, maar soms kan dit help om die foto trefkrag te gee. Dink aan 'n droë dam met gebarste modder in die onderste tweederdes van die foto met 'n wit songebakte kopbeen kleinerig op die regterkantste snypunt doer op die foto. Jou voorgond vloei dikwels in jou agtergrond in om 'n eenheid te vorm wat mekaar ondersteun, byvoorbeeld die wit strand wat dan in die see oorgaan met die blou lug doer agter. Voltooi die prentjie in jou kop met 'n rooi strandsambreel waaronder 'n kind met 'n grafie en emmer in die sand speel. Koekblik-mooi!

Kamerahoek (viewpoint): Waar jy staan, gaan op die ou end ook bepaal hoe jou agtergrond lyk. As dit moontlik is, moet jy 'n bietjie rondbeweeg en terselfdertyd deur jou kamerasoeker loer hoe die agtergrond ten opsigte van jou fokuspunt verander soos wat jy rondbeweeg. Staan op jou knieë, lê plat op die grond, klim op 'n stoel. (Maak seker die stoel kan jou gewig hanteer – Oeps).

Formaat: Portret of landskap is die sleutelwoorde. Rekenaarskerm, televisie en motorvensters is maar 'n paar van die goed wat ons in 'n horisontale of landskapblik inprop. Dit is ook gemakliker om 'n kamera horisontaal vas te hou. Klim uit die kas en draai jou kamera vertikaal in die portretposisie en neem sulke foto's vir afwisseling. Dieselfde opstellingriglyne geld.

Ligomstandighede: 'n Goeie riglyn is om die onderwerp (fokuspunt) in dieselfde ligomstandighede as die voorgond en die agtergrond te hou. 'n Mondvol, wat beteken: As jy vier mense afneem, moet hulle verkieslik almal in die son staan (met skrefiesoë); die son moet oor die fotograaf se skouer op die voorgond en die agtergrond val. Of, al vier moet in die skaduwee staan, maar dan moet die agtergrond en die voorgond lief ook in die skaduwee wees. Die helfte van die groep mense moenie in die skaduwee wees en die res in die son nie. Aaklig! Die kamera se fotosensor kan nie die uiteenlopende ligomstandighede hanteer nie. Skuif die mense na dieselfde ligomgewing: of in die son of in die skaduwee.

Sophia Gray – an extraordinary architect

Our Department of Architecture annually presents the Sophia Gray Memorial Lecture. This year the 21st lecture entitled "More ways of being an architect", was delivered by Prof. Walter Peters, well-known academic and editor of the Journal of the KwaZulu-Natal Institute for Architecture.

But who is Sophia Gray, one would ask? Sophia Gray (1814-1871) was the first woman to practise architecture in South Africa and one of the earliest in the world. She was married to Robert Gray, inaugural Anglican Bishop of Cape Town, and devoted herself to the diocese. By cart or wagon, or on horseback she accompanied her husband on all but two of his visitations throughout the country, sketching wherever they went.

Sophia was active in architecture over a period of 22 years, during which time she built 52 churches throughout South Africa. She was the first architect, male or female, to have been professionally active in the Free State. The remarkable thing is that Sophia had no training at all – she was self-taught, having learnt architecture only from observation. Her highly accomplished drawings and insightful diaries are held in the William Cullen Library of the University of the Witwatersrand.

As a university that values excellence, our university started the Sophia Gray Memorial Lecture in 1989 to pay tribute to this great pioneering architect.

Grant Nthala from Malawi is the first international student to do a master's degree in Ethnomusicology at our university, which he has since completed. "I am told I have completed it a semester earlier," he says, with pride. "So I am due for graduation this September."

Ethnomusicology is the study of ethnic music. Grant studied the music of the Chewa people, the largest ethnic group in Malawi. "My area of interest was the drumming patterns that they use for their different dances," he explains.

"Their music, which I have known all these years, displays some complicated and complex rhythms. Therefore I was interested to find out what constitutes their drumming patterns for the different dances.

"However, as a scholar I had to go further and look at the social issues. In other words, does drumming among them just exist in isolation or is it related to their daily lives?

"I also wanted to find out if their music has contributed anything in Malawi, not only among the Chewa people, but also among other groups of people. For example, have the modern music artists been inspired in a way or motivated or influenced by what the Chewa people offer through their music?"

Grant says.

Grant is not only an academic but also a multi-instrumentalist of note.

"I play the African drum, the acoustic guitar, the bass guitar, the piano and the keyboard family," he says.

He completed his undergraduate studies at the University of Malawi and because he could not further his studies there due to a lack of postgraduate studies in music, he had to come to South Africa.

"I have tried several universities in South Africa and I found the University of the Free State being flexible in its requirements for the postgraduate degree," he says.

"They were flexible, they were supportive, they showed interest and were ready to listen. So they gave me a chance to explain myself. I did not have similar opportunities at the other universities," he says.

"I also found the fees here, compared to the other universities in this country, very affordable," Grant continues to say.

"The university's website also made things easy for me. It is very good. It has enough information that one does not even have to ask for clarification," he says.

No wonder he intends to prolong his association with our university.

"I intend to do my PhD as soon as possible. I hope to apply for the next academic year this year and hope to finish it in three years' time," he says.

"Studying in a foreign country is not easy. Everything is new, the people are new, the languages are new, places are difficult to find, sometimes you run out of resources, and so on, but the Department of Music has always made me feel at home here," he says.

Grant intends to return to his alma mater, where he is a lecturer, after completing his PhD.

"I train undergraduate students in music and teach music theory and African Performance," he says. "I will definitely go back there to continue with the work and do it much better this time with all the knowledge that I have gained here," Grant says.

“Wat studies nie alles vir 'n mens kan doen nie”

Die omvattende ontwikkeling van studente sowel as personeel is baie belangrik vir ons universiteit. Susan Esterhuizen, sekretaresse van die Registrateur: Algemeen en 'n student aan ons universiteit (BA Taalstudie), het onlangs die geleentheid gehad om die 54ste *Zomercursus* in Zeist, Nederland by te woon toe sy 'n beurs, wat kursusfooie en verblyf insluit, van die Nederlandse Taalunie ontvang het.

Susan vertel: “Deelnemers se ouderdomme het gewissel van 20 tot 48 jaar en na gelang van ons kennis oor die Nederlandse taal is ons in 12 groepe verdeel. Die *Zomercursus* het baie fasette van die Nederlandse taal gedek, insluitend Nederlandse spraaklesse, luister- en spreeklesse, lesings oor die Nederlandse skilderkuns uit die 17^{de} eeu, emansipasie, politiek, literatuur, popmusiek, die televisie- en filmbedryf en 'n ontmoeting met twee skrywers, drs. Arie Storm en Mensje van Keulen. Uitstappies na onderskeidelik Rotterdam, Delft, Otterlo, Amsterdam en Den Haag is ook onderneem.

“Nederland het geen tekort aan fietse, stroopwafels, koekies (die deelnemers het 10 000 koekies verorber), vis of water nie – vandaar die idioom wat vir welgestelde persone gebruik word: “Hij heeft geld zoals water.” Jonk en oud maak daagliks van fietse gebruik om inkopies te doen en om hul bestemmings te bereik. Moeders met klein kindertjies is nie 'n uitsondering nie en maak gebruik van 'n *bakfiets* om hul inkopies en klein kindertjies te vervoer. Die konferensiesentrum het dan ook 75 fietse tot die

Joint venture enhances learners' academic success rate

‘You are heaven-sent!’ ‘I am a bookworm but have no books to read.’ ‘I really like being here because reading teaches me words and phrases I’ve never heard before’ ‘... sometimes I feel like the books are written especially for me’ ‘... it motivates me in wanting to become a news reporter.’

These are the words of a few of the pupils at Dr Blok Secondary School in Heidedal where an action research project to develop reading was started in 2007, following a request by the school principal to the Community Service Committee of the Faculty of Humanities. Dr Arlys van Wyk of the Department of English and Classical Languages was approached and the project was registered as a master's thesis for Jeanne van der Westhuizen.

The principal identified poor reading skills as the cause of the poor matriculation results – an opinion confirmed by literacy testing with Grade 8, 9 and 10 learners, which revealed that 34% were at risk. In other words, 34% of learners in these grades were unable to read at a level that would ensure their academic success. Several learners could not read at all. With reading proficiency being one of the best predictors of success at any educational level, which means that these learners lack the necessary language skills and reading proficiency to be able to read or understand their textbooks, are unable to access the explanations and activities in the classroom, and will experience failure and exclusion, which lead to disciplinary problems at school.

It was clear that reading and books should be presented in a pleasurable way that would increase their appeal to the learners and encourage print awareness at the school. It soon became evident that without books and plenty of reading material this was not possible.

A generous sponsorship from Raubex Construction, a locally-based construction company, made the buying of books and other equipment possible. Dr Arlys and Jeanne bought well-illustrated and interesting reading materials for the pupils to stimulate their interest and build their general knowledge which, together with knowledge of the language is an important requirement for reading at any

academic level. “It was touching to see learners caressing the books, explaining that they had never owned a storybook in their lives,” Dr Arlys said.

Several methods were implemented to develop a culture of reading at the school. A Sustained Silent Reading (SSR) Programme was started. For one hour every week, everyone in the school is uninterruptedly reading something they enjoy. Learners are then encouraged to share it at the end of the period. Reading research advocates this method as a tried and tested means of improving overall literacy and learner concentration. Many learners come from poor socio-economic backgrounds and have no reading materials at home. Dr Arlys and Jeanne collected magazines from friends and relatives for such learners.

Jeanne also started reading aloud to the pupils at break-times. Reading to an audience of one snowballed to a voluntary listenership of between 30 and 45 learners who do not want to leave when the bell rings. Jeanne also plays read-along stories where learners read a book while listening and following the words of the story being read on CD. This enables learners to see the language and hear it as they read and it forces them to read at a certain speed. Jeanne has also prepared song sheets which the learners read in order to take part in sing-along activities.

Dr Arlys has been demonstrating and introducing staff members to Content-based Instruction (CBI) because reading alone is insufficient if the classroom teaching does not focus on reading as a central activity. CBI is a universally recognised method used in second-language settings where the need is to achieve language acquisition and content goals simultaneously.

The project team also applied the Raubex sponsorship to provide classrooms with adequate cupboards to store books and magazines. Through this sponsorship 18 teachers also received *Readucate* (basic literacy) training to teach learners who

“Die uitstappie na Amsterdam was 'n ongelooflike belewenis – hoë geboue, straatmusikante, busse, fietse, trems, die Van Gogh-museum en die vaart deur bekende grachten soos die Prinsegracht, Herengracht, Singel- en Keizersgracht.

“Die uitstappie na die Noord-Zee (Den Haag), op die warmste dag van Nederland het my laat terugverlang na Suid-Afrika. Honderde skulpies versier die strand, maar die see is nie blou nie – die water is 'n vuil bruin-groen. My Romeense vriendin, Simona Schouten, wat Nederlands vlot kan praat en Afrikaans kan verstaan, het die uitstappie na die see terdeë geniet.

“Vakansie was dit nie heeltemal nie. Deelnemers aan die verskillende groepe het onderhoude met deelnemers van ander groepe gevoer, voorleggings gedoen oor die onderskeie deelnemers se lande, opvoerings gedoen, verslae geskryf oor ons ervarings en, asof dit nie genoeg was nie, huiswerk ook gedoen. cannot read at all, to read.

“It has been a heartening experience to see the excitement that the books, have generated at the school. Many learners are now so excited about reading that their behaviour has changed: they voluntarily attend the readings at break. Once noisy classrooms are now hushed during the SSR periods,” Dr Arlys said.

Another big plus of this intervention is that the matriculation pass rate increased by 30% last year. The researchers are hesitant to claim credit for this improvement after such a short time, but a few factors such as the results of other schools in the area that did not experience the same improvement, point out that this intervention has made a big difference. World-renowned linguists also stated that the effect of SSR should not be underestimated in gauging the reasons for this improvement.

This project has been a life-changing experience for both members of the project team. Many valuable lessons about the state of literacy and the reasons for low literacy in our schools have been learned. Above all, the project is making a real difference in the lives of the pupils at Dr Blok School, thanks to the cooperation of business and higher education. - **Dr Arlys van Wyk**

Tokkie ewe tuis in regsgeledere as op die water met sy jetski's

Tokkie Pretorius, alhoewel 'n oud-Kovsie, is nog steeds baie betrokke by ons universiteit. Deesdae bevind hierdie voorstander van die geskiedenis en die reg hom in die direkteurstoel by die Anglo-Boereoorlogmuseum.

Tokkie is op 1 Julie 2009 as die nuwe direkteur van die Anglo-Boereoorlogmuseum aangestel. En hy droom groot drome vir die museum – dit is immers die plek waar hy wil wees as gevolg van sy groot belangstelling in museums en die verloop van die oorlog.

“Een van my visies is om die geskiedenis te vertel soos wat dit gebeur het,” sê Tokkie. Hy het 'n aantal inisiatiewe by die museum geïmplementeer om hierdie visie te verwesenlik. In een van sy projekte fokus hy veral op Sol Plaatjes, 'n latere stigterslid van die ANC. 'n Personeellid is ook byvoorbeeld afgesonder om mondelinge oorlewings oor die Anglo-Boereoorlog by die swart gemeenskap in te samel. Dr. Stowel Kessler se doktorsale proefskrif gaan ook persklaar gemaak word en as die eerste wetenskaplik-verantwoorde publikasie oor die swart vlugtelingskampe uitgegee word.

Ook in die pyplyn is opvoedkundige programme waar museumvakkundiges skole besoek en aanbiedinge doen. “Die opvoedkundige program van die museum het nog altyd gehaper aan items wat jong kinders se verbeelding kon vasvang. 'n Vervaardiger van replikaspeelgoed is in die buiteland opgespoor. Van hierdie items is op bestelling en sal 'n deurslaggewende bydrae kan lewer om kinders na 'n tydsgewrig van meer as 'n honderd jaar gelede terug te verplaas,” sê Tokkie.

Voordat Tokkie sy plek as direkteur van die museum ingeneem het, het hy by verskeie regsfirmas en die Vrystaat Ontwikkelingskorporasie (VSOK) gewerk. Sy pos as maatskappysekretaris van die VSOK, sowel as die hoofbestuurder van regsdienste aan hierdie instansie, is maar twee van die hoogtepunte van sy loopbaan. Tokkie het ook 'n groot rol in die ontwikkeling van VSOK se wysigingswette in 1999 en 2006 gespeel.

Dit is nie net die museum en die VSOK wat by Tokkie se regskennis baat nie. Tokkie, 'n toegelate prokureur van die Hooggeregshof van Suid-Afrika, gee op meer as een manier uiting aan sy liefde vir die regsprofessie. Hy is 'n bemaande skrywer van 'n paar regsboeke. Saam met medeskrywers soos prof. Johan Henning, dekaan van ons

Fakulteit Regsgeleerdheid, en prof. Loot Pretorius van ons Departement Staatsreg en Regsfilosofie het hy *The Legal Position of Development and Corporations* die lig laat sien. “Hierdie boek was ook een van my hoogtepunte, veral omdat alle ontwikkelingskorporasies dit as 'n handboek gebruik,” sê Tokkie.

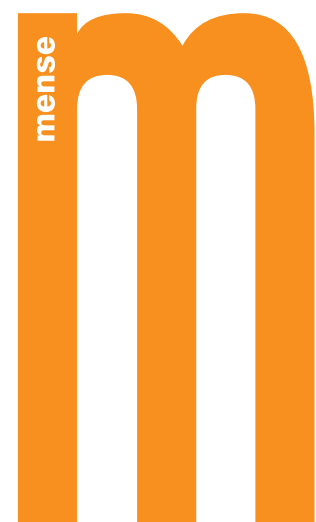
Hy beoog ook 'n soortgelyke publikasie, *Die regsposisie van kulturele instellings met verwysing na die ABO-museum*. Met hierdie projek gaan Tokkie sy liefde vir die reg en kulturele instellings kombineer. Hierdie publikasie sal ook deel van die mededelingsreeks wees.

'n Ander publikasie waarmee Tokkie tans besig is, is die *Invloed van die ABO op regspleging*.

Alhoewel Tokkie vir die afgelope paar jaar in besigheidskringe in Bloemfontein rondbeweeg, het hy nog glad nie sy bande met ons universiteit verbreek nie. Intendeel, as hy nie optree as eksaminator by die Departement Handelsreg vir die M-studente nie, is hy 'n assessor vir LLB-verhandelings. Verder is hy betrokke by die Bestuurskool as moderator vir MBA-studente. Hy gee ook deelyds klas vir M-studente in Korporatiewe Reg.

Tokkie se suksesvolle loopbaan is die gevolg van 'n stewige akademiese fondasie. As eerstejaar – toe 'n inwoner van Reitz-kamerwonings – het hy ingeskryf vir die BProc-grad. Tokkie het uitblink op universiteit. Hy slaag sy LLB en later sy LLM met onderskeidings in al sy vakke en is die ontvanger van die dekaansmedalje in 1999 vir die beste LLM-student. Dieselfde jaar ontvang hy ook akademiese erekleure en die Juta-prys as die beste regstudent aan ons universiteit. Tokkie was ingeskryf vir LLD in 2005 maar moes sy studies onderbreek. Hy hervat sy studies in 2010 met 'n nuwe onderwerp wat handel oor Korporatiewe Reg met verwysing na Nasionale Erfenisinstellings.

Wanneer hy nie aan die een of ander boek skryf, klasgee of aan sy visie vir die museum werk nie, waar sal jy dan vir Tokkie aantref, wonder ek. “Op die water,” sê hierdie uitblinkerman met die uiteenlopende belangstellings. Op 'n stel jetski's. - **Leonie Bolleurs**



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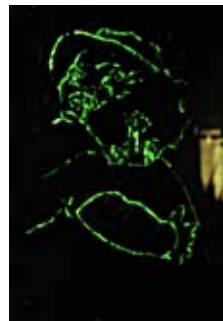
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Janine se kunswerk praat met jou

Personeel gee met oop hande en oop harte

Die afgelope winter het van die personeel by ons UV-Sasol-biblioteek die spreekwoordelike ekstra myl gestap (of is dit nou gebrei) toe hulle besluit het om aan diensingesteldheid, een van ons universiteit se waardes, 'n nuwe betekenis te gee.

"Soos wat die winter nadergekrui het, en die breinaalde tydens tee- en etenstye te voorskyn gekom het, het een van die personeellede voorgestel dat ons blokkies vir komberse brei om aan 'n liefdadigheidsorganisasie te skenk. Net die volgende dag is die breigare, breinaalde en hekelpenne gebring," vertel Huibre Lombard, Adjunkdirekteur: Biblioteek- en Inligtingsdiens.

Alhoewel die hoofdoel van die projek was om 'n geskenk aan dié wat minderbevoorreg is te gee, het almal wat gebrei het, baat gevind. Sommige het 'n nuwe vaardigheid aangeleer, ander het nuwe patrone onder die knie gekry en boonop was dit 'n wonderlike spanbou-oefening. Die span het die vrug van hul handewerk geniet deur aan elke pasiënt by die Tshepo-huis in Bloemfontein, waar twaalf volwasse terminaal-siek en verstote MIV/Vigs-pasiënte woon, sy eie, unieke kombors te skenk. "Die projek was so lekker dat dit voortgaan, en binnekort sal 'n volgende instansie baat vind. Enige donasies is welkom," sê Huibré.

UVPERSU het ook 'n paar inisiatiewe die lig laat sien om kollegas in nood by te staan. Die vakbond streef daarna om 'n gees van omgee, verdraagsaamheid en respek op kampus te kweek en glo dat hierdie inisiatiewe veel daartoe kan bydra. Deur die "Kollegas in nood"-inisiatief word personeel genooi om bydraes te maak in die vorm van nie-bederfbare voedsel, klere en nuttige geskenkies vir kinders van 2 tot 15 jaar.

Prof. Fief van der Merwe van ons Departement Kurrikulumstudies is 'n groot ondersteuner van hierdie inisiatief. Ander gereelde donateurs is Christa du Plessis en Henda Henning, albei van ons Sentrum vir Hoëronderwysstudies en -ontwikkeling.

Volgens Anita Lombard, Hoof-uitvoerende Beampte van UVPERSU, is die projek uitgebrei en word daar nou ook in die winter komberse ingesamel om die nood op kampus te verlig.

"Dit is nie slegs UVPERSU-lede wat daarby baat nie, maar alle personeel wat 'n behoefte aan hulp en bystand het," sê Anita. Die projek word deur die UVPERSU-kantoor in samewerking met die Welstandkantoor bedryf en Liesl Botha van ons Welstandkantoor tree tans as koördineerder op.

Baie van ons personeel by Beskermingsdienste werk op Kersdag en tydens die Volksblad-kunstefees. Jaarliks maak personeel en die UVPERSU-kantoor hulle beursies oop en lewer 'n bydrae om geskenke en lekkernye vir hierdie personeel wat moet werk, te koop. Vanjaar het UVPERSU ook gesorg dat

hierdie personeellede heerlike warm sjokolade tussen skofte by die Kunstefees kon geniet.

Ons kampus wemel ook van diere liefhebbers en 'n projek om die lewenskwaliteit van diere wat swaar kry beter te maak, het ontstaan. "Baie diere ly geweldig in die winter en ook veral tydens die Desemberavakansie. 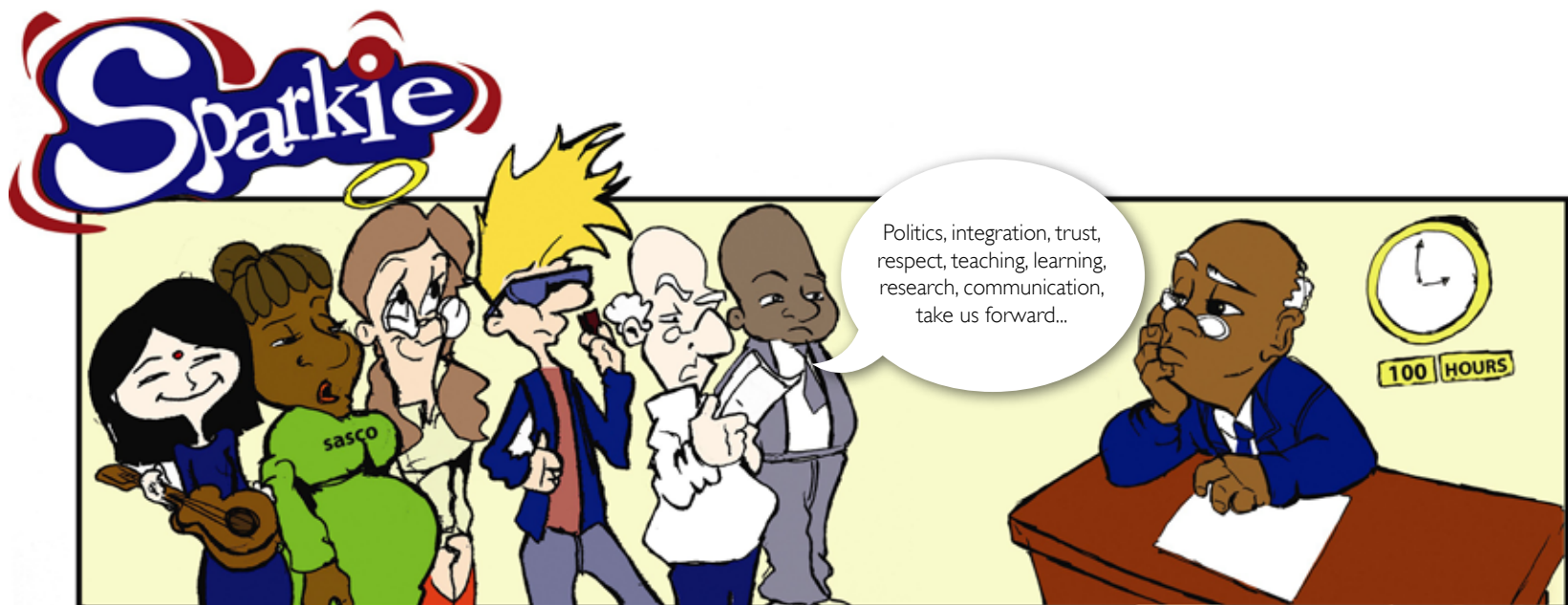
