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Strategiese plan sal UV van ander onderskei

Die Universiteit van die Vrystaat (UV) se Strategiese Plan vir 2012-2016 is vandeemaand bekend gestel. Die plan sal die instelling se werksaamhede vir die volgende vyf jaar rig en lei. **Lacea Loader** gee 'n breë oorsig van die plan.

“Ons het die afgelope twee jaar lank en hard op alle vlakke gedink oor wie die universiteit wil wees en waar ons in die 21ste eeu as 'n globale universiteit wil wees. Daarom is konsultasies met 'n wye groep belanghebbendes binne en buite die universiteit gedoen,” sê prof. Jonathan Jansen, Visekanselier en Rektor.

Die konsultasies het daartoe gelei dat 'n Strategiese Plan ontwerp is wat nie lyk en klink soos dié van enige ander tersiêre instelling in die land nie. “Hiermee wil die UV 'n duidelike boodskap aan die land uitdra dat ons ernstig is oor

akademiese standaarde en wil uitstaan in 'n kompeterende wêreld,” sê prof. Jansen.

Volgens hom is die Strategiese Plan op die inisiatiewe gegrond wat die UV reeds begin vorm het en sal voortgaan om oor die volgende vyf jaar te vorm. “Die plan bied h oorsig van die transformasie wat hier aan die gang is en verskaf h raamwerk vir die betrokkenes om hul eie bydraes te kontekstualiseer, te prioritiseer en na waarde te skat,” sê hy.

Die Strategiese Plan het ten doel om die breedte en die diepte van die inisiatiewe wat onderneem word, vas te vang binne die konteks van die instelling se nuwe strategiese koers. Die inisiatiewe word onder twee hooftemas gegroepeer, naamlik die Akademiese Projek en die Menseprojek.

Met die Akademiese Projek word na akademiese uitnemendheid gestreef; om hoë akademiese standaarde te stel en die rigting in onder meer die onderwysstelsel aan te wys. Die Akademiese Projek is in vier klusters gegroepeer, naamlik

prestasie van student, prestasie van akademici, akademiese onderskeiding, en die akademiese kultuur van die kampus.

Met die Menseprojek word gefokus op hoe ons mekaar hanteer en met mekaar kommunikeer; – ten spyte van die grense wat ons in die verlede van mekaar geskei het. Die Menseprojek is ook in vier klusters gegroepeer, naamlik konfrontasie met vooroordeel, die kultuur van insluiting, billikheid, openheid en toeganklikheid, en gemeenskapsdiens en -betrok-kenheid.

“Die plan is dus nie net 'n uitbeelding van ons trotse verlede as universiteit nie, maar ook 'n aanduiding van waar ons oor vyf jaar as 'n universiteit van uitnemendheid wil wees,” sê prof. Jansen.

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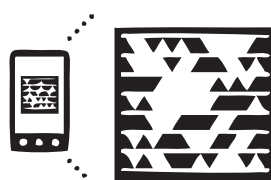

Adopt a healthy lifestyle for a better life

“You are in good health, but ...”

This remark from your GP will make you think twice before taking another helping of deep-fried chicken and spending hours in front of your television set.

Being diagnosed with a chronic disease of lifestyle (CDL) may be alarming, but it is still possible to lead a normal life and look forward to normal life expectancy.

CDL are diseases closely associated with lifestyle, lack of exercise and being overweight or obese. Because most CDL are asymptomatic (showing no noticeable symptoms), a diagnosis is often only made when complications are already present.

High blood pressure is one of the commonest CDLs. It affects about 30% of adults in South Africa, but only half are actually aware of it. Other common CDLs are diabetes, elevated blood cholesterol levels, excessive weight and obesity.

Most of these conditions can be prevented and treated, but if left undiagnosed and untreated, they are

collectively responsible for the largest proportion of deaths in South Africa.

Since complications of CDLs (strokes, heart disease and kidney failure) are so prevalent and costly to manage, the Medical Schemes Act makes it compulsory for all medical schemes to cover in full the cost of the diagnosis and treatment of these conditions.

Health-care workers in both the public and private health-care sector are encouraged to scan high-risk patients routinely for these conditions. After being diagnosed with a CDL, you will be encouraged to adapt to a healthy lifestyle. Regular exercise is highly effective in reducing blood pressure, controlling weight and improving blood sugar control.

Restricting the intake of salt and saturated fats and limiting your kilojoule intake if you are overweight is essential for the effective management of these conditions. It is recommended that you consult a dietician to assist you in this.

Patients are also encouraged to know what their blood pressure, blood sugar and cholesterol levels are and what to aim for.

Complying with your doctor's prescription is always challenging. Skipping doses or taking medication later is not advised and may lead to unpleasant side effects. Always plan ahead and make sure you have a sufficient supply of medication at all times.

Time out with...

For our Assistant Dean: Student Life and Leadership, Pura Mgolombane, the building of a vibrant student life at Kopsies is what he has eaten, slept and breathed since joining our university in September 2011. Margaret Linström spoke to him.

When I enter Pura's office in the Student Centre, my first impression is of a task-driven, focused individual, but his yellow tie and friendly smile balance out the picture.

When I ask what his title means, he says one of his main tasks is to be the conduit between our students and the university systems, and to be an advocate for the co-curricular-curricular interface. For Pura it boils down to "balancing the energy of the students with the university's bureaucracy". However, he is quick to point out that the students

understand that there are processes that must be followed. "The exuberance of student life is often perceived to be on a collision course with the curricular side of the university. Student-driven activities could easily be considered a nuisance for curricular activities, but I'm happy to note that there is a radical shift to embrace co-curricular activities as having a critical role to play in increasing the throughput rate of the university and towards the achievement of the human project." The energy and innovation displayed by Kopsie students keeps him going as "the vibrancy of a university emanates from its student life".

Pura has high praise for our students. "I'm fascinated by the prevailing culture of respect among our students. You must understand that we're sometimes involved in robust interaction, but even in these situations there is a sense of humaneness. This is something we should appreciate."

From our conversation it becomes obvious that Pura's first six months at our university have been extremely busy ones. "Since coming to Kopsies, things have changed drastically – no gym, no movies. Student life often means early mornings and late nights. For now my only spare time is used to get home to Jozi to spend time with my family."



'Architecture is fashion'

She loves how fashion and architecture come together and will NOT compromise on coffee. "I come from coffee country and my mom must send me good coffee ever so often," laughs the Ugandan-born architect, Phillippa Tumubweinee.

She is one of the latest appointments at the university and has just arrived in Bloemfontein, but has already made a few interesting architectural discoveries about this town. "Did you know that three iconic Bloemfontein monuments are built in one straight line from west to east?" she asks, referring to the university's Main Building, NALN (National Afrikaans Literary Museum and Research Centre) and Hoffman Square. Was this intentional? Phillippa's passion for architecture will make her find out.

Talking to Phillippa about architecture, it is hard to believe that architecture was not her first choice of study. She actually wanted to go into the field of fashion, "... but my parents did not consider fashion as a proper career". She decided to work at an architectural company in Uganda for a while before starting her studies.

"Just to see if I like it."

And she did.

Today Phillippa has her own practice in Johannesburg and she was a lecturer at the

University of Johannesburg before joining our university. Besides this, she did not have to give up her ideas of fashion.

"Fashion is just another form of architecture. Clothes are made up of different pieces – just like buildings. But the nice thing about fashion and architecture is how the two influence each other."

Phillippa points out how buildings are designed and made to accommodate the fashion of the day. "As ladies' dresses got smaller, arches and doorways were also built narrower. In many European cities where cycling is more of a habit than here, you'll find cycling lanes as part of their roads."

Taking a stroll on the Bloemfontein Campus, Phillippa discusses how she "reads" buildings. "By just looking at a building, one can actually see the whole philosophy behind it. I sometimes amuse myself by what I can see from a building's design."

Before reaching one of her favourite structures on campus, she utters a quick sound of irritation.

Susan, 'n gekwalifiseerde bedryfsielkunde, sê om in menslike hulpbronne te werk is 'n groot verantwoordelikheid, omdat sy en haar kollegas met mense werk. "Daar is nie regte of verkeerde antwoorde nie, veral omdat dit om mense, hul emosies en belange gaan."

Buite die werk ontspan dié ma van twee tieners deur te lees. Bloot uit nuuskierigheid, vertel sy: "Ek is een van daai mense wat selfs die advertensies of die heengegaankolom in koerante lees."

Getting to know Bella Rametse

The title of "Mother" is given to the women in our lives who nurture and care for us beyond what is asked of them. One such figure comes in the form of Commercial Law lecturer Bella Rametse, who has been on the staff of the university since December 2009, an environment she describes as completely different from the corporate one she came from. "When I was practising law, I would go to court and only had to speak facing a few people; as a lecturer I have classes of over two hundred. The thought was intimidating at first," she said.

Twelve years spent in a corporate legal atmosphere has the ability to depersonalise most practitioners, turning them into cold and removed individuals. Bella is a special case. She is using the shrewdness that she learnt in the corporate environment to help mould the "legal eagles" of tomorrow into sharp and smart novices. She does so, however, without compromising her belief that youth should be respectful towards their elders even at university level. "I am concerned by the manner in which some students approach lecturers; even though we are here to teach and serve their needs, they still need to give us the respect that we deserve as elders," she said.

The place where her impact is felt is the place where it matters most; the classroom. Tebogo Mosaka, a student in Bella's HRG214 class, writes in an e-mail to her. "Last year I failed HRG114, but this year it's a different story. After failing last year, I wanted to give up. I lost interest in the course, but because you taught it with such passion, knowledge and experience I began to like it and enjoy coming to class." He concludes: "Thank you for being patient with us and also being a mother figure to us; thank you for your love and warmth towards us when we ran to you for help." Bella says such e-mails from students keep her motivated and help to pick her up on bad days.

"As a lecturer there are challenges that I face daily." She lists communication with students from previously disadvantaged schools as one such challenge. Bella says these students find it difficult to communicate in English. "They would come to my office to ask questions about a lecture, rather than ask in a class full of students fluent in the language, for fear of being ridiculed. I sincerely hope that the university can find practical solutions to such problems," Bella says.

Her other passions include helping NGOs with community outreach projects. She is also currently working on starting a mentoring programme for young people. Bella works on the project with Dr Ilze Keevy, whom she admires as her own mentor. Other women that she admires include activist Mamphela Ramphele, Advocate Thuli Madonsela and the Head of a department in the Faculty of Law, Prof. Elizabeth Snyman-Van Deventer. She says these women inspire her in diverse ways and have helped her become the strong woman that she is today.

Kan 'n universiteit teologie doseer?

Prof. Conrad Wethmar van die Universiteit van Pretoria het met breë penstrepe die pad wat teologie deur die eeue aan universiteite geloop het, geskets tydens 'n reeks lesings oor transformasie van kennis wat die Fakulteit Teologie vanjaar aanbied. Sedert die ontstaan van universiteite in die Middeleeue het die Christelike geloof 'n belangrike rol gespeel.

Sokrates se ideaal was dat studente nie net meer kennis bekom nie, maar ook moreel gevorm word. "Daar kan oor verskeie aspekte van die verhouding tussen teologie en 'n universiteit nagedink word," sê prof. Wethmar. Hy vra ook: "Kan 'n universiteit teologie doseer? Of, is daar ruimte vir teologie by 'n universiteit?"

"Die klassieke idee van die universiteit is ondermeer om die gemeenskap te dien deur persone vir hul beroep op te lei. Die universiteitsideaal was universaliteit, diversiteit en gemeenskapsdiens. Die moderne universiteitsidee het egter hiervan wegbeweeg. In hierdie universiteitsideaal kom die universiteit nie soseer die beste tot sy reg waar dit prakties bruikbare kennis bring nie, maar wanneer wetenskap beoefen word ter wille van die waarheid. John Henry Newman en Karl Jaspers is prominente denkers op hierdie gebied," sê prof. Wethmar.

Hy vervolg: "Die erflikheidseienskappe van die universiteits-idee kom ter sprake wanneer oor die

plek van teologiese onderrig aan 'n universiteit besin word. Die verhouding tussen teologie en kerk speel egter ook 'n rol. Hoewel teologiese onderrig aan 'n universiteit nie die enigste onderrigopsie is nie, is daar tog verskeie redes waarom dit vir 'n kerk sinvol is om teologiese opleiding aan 'n universiteit te koppel. Om werklik "kerk-van-die-Woord" te wees, moet wetenskaplike insigte hieroor in ag geneem word. Dit is goed vir die samelewing dat 'n invloedryke saak soos die Christelike geloof aan die hoogste vlak van akademiese uitmuntendheid bestudeer word. Dit is ook goed vir die teologie om op 'n kritiese afstand van die amptelike strukture van die kerk te kan funksioneer."

"Teologie se noue verbondenheid tot samelewing, akademie en kerk kan juis die heel beste tot sy reg kom binne die universiteitskonteks," sê prof. Wethmar. – dr. Lyzette Hoffman

Prof. Jita is changing education

Upon making an appointment with Prof. Loyiso Jita, one immediately senses a welcoming personality, a sense of confidence and a willingness to share. Then, upon entering his office in the new Education Building, you find Prof. Loyiso, and all your expectations are met. He is well-prepared, focused and present during our conversation.

So, what is his true academic passion?

The answer is straightforward: "Teacher change."

On the whiteboard in his office, Prof. Loyiso has scribbled down concepts which are the foundations of his research on teacher change. It is all about identity, leadership and professional growth. Teachers have to find within themselves the passion to teach, to develop their approach to teaching, to become accountable for what happens in the classroom. Prof. Loyiso becomes serious: "Change in education, especially the education of mathematics and science is crucial for the future of our country: It is now eighteen years after we founded our democracy. In these eighteen years there has been a lot to celebrate. Still, there are some things that are fundamentally wrong, especially if we look inside the classrooms in many of our schools. This is more so when we look specifically into the teaching of mathematics and science. Apartheid cannot be an excuse for what happens inside the classroom, after close to two decades of change. We need to move forward."

As he talks on, it becomes clear that Prof. Loyiso is a man on a mission. As someone who always saw Bloemfontein as a fuelling stop on the way from Pretoria to the Eastern Cape, he was convinced by Prof. Jonathan Jansen that the university was the place to be. After being excited by the Vice-Chancellor's vision, Prof. Loyiso seized the opportunity to come to Bloemfontein and live his dream. Convincing his wife, an instructional designer who had just taken up a position at an IT firm in Johannesburg, and his kids, who were quite happy at their schools to come to Bloemfontein must have taken some doing. Apparently the dream was sold really well as the whole family is now settled in the City of Roses; and Prof. Loyiso. Has he started working on his part of the dream?

Of course. He could not wait, and several initiatives have been launched already.

Recently, for example, role-players in science and mathematics education from the Free State Department of Education were invited to a work session at the university. "If we want to make a difference, we have to engage with the important stakeholders," Prof. Loyiso says, while shaking his head at the fact that this has not happened before at the university. Many of these role-players had never set foot on our campus, and were amazed at the new state-of-the-art building in which Mathematics, Science and Technology Education are housed. In terms of experience in higher education, he has been involved in education first at the Universities of Zululand, KwaZulu-Natal, Pretoria and, until recently, has been the director of the School of Education at UNISA. Now he is here at the university, ready to make a difference, ready to initiate change; to work on the dream, to change the teaching and learning of science and mathematics in our schools and thereby to build a positive and sustainable future for our children.

To ensure quality standards of the institution at large, the university offers training opportunities to its diverse staff members. **Thabo Motsoane** visited some of the staff and students on the Bloemfontein Campus to reflect on how training programmes made available to them have improved their work efficiency. This is how they responded:

Jamiëlee Simons, Business Communication Lecturer at the Department of Communication Science: "The university does a great job in offering training opportunities to its staff, especially to lecturers. The training that I attended has helped me to manage my students and myself effectively and has given me a clear picture of what is expected of me as a lecturer."

"I have learned new lecturing methods and learnt tactics on how to interact effectively with people from different backgrounds. The way in which we received education is different from how the new generation is attaining it; therefore, it is important for us to keep on learning new methods."

Ekaetee Benedict, Business Management Lecturer in the Faculty of Economic and Management Science: "I think the university offers enough training opportunities, especially for academic staff. We learn how to conduct and teach large classes and how to use materials available to us such as Blackboard. We learn more on how to conduct research, therefore making my job more enjoyable. As an academic I would say that the training I have received is adequate, because my job has now become easier."

Hanli Erasmus, Secretary at the Faculty of Law: "There is enough training for the campus staff for various professions. I received training on conflict management, financial management and time management. As a secretary, I have also learned to get along with people in a better fashion and to prioritise my work effectively. I have even improved my computer skills through these programmes. I always say, even though it is not easy, one can never be too old to learn."

Ruth Tsheisi, Admission Officer at Student Academic Services: "Yes, training is available to the university's staff. I work a lot with students from all over the country and sometimes across the borders. The training that I attended has helped me with the strategy on how to detect forged certificates. This used to be a problem where you find people with fake qualifications. Fortunately, with the help of the training programmes offered by the university, there is an increased productivity in what I do and I can now detect landmines from miles away."

Tsamai Joshua Selebalo, Messenger at the Faculty of Health Sciences: "I think there is enough training, because I have received training in many things such as filing, computer programmes, record-keeping, and first-aid training. These training sessions have taught me to perform my duties effectively and my work has become much easier."

Khosi Mohlakeng, Student Assistant at the Department of Political Science: "The university has training opportunities for its staff. I am currently undergoing training as a Student Assistant in the Department of Political Science. The training that I have received has helped me to understand the importance of dealing with temper effectively better, because sometimes I deal with difficult students. I have learnt to put my differences aside and give people the benefit of the doubt."

Meningspeiling oor behuising toon verrassende uitslae

'n Meningspeiling op die Bloemfontein-kampus het getoon dat die behuisingseriewe hier baie goed daar uit sien.

Bykans 800 ouers en eerstejaars het tydens die Gateway-eerstejaarsweek en verwelkoming van die universiteit vraelyste voltooi waarin hulle moes aandui wat hul indrukke van geselekteerde koshuise was.

Vir bevrediging onder studente was die gemiddelde uitslag 84% en onder die ouers 93%. Hier is Wag-'n-Bietjie en Veritas die hoogste gereken, met sowat 95% studente en ouers wat die twee koshuise as bevredigend ervaar het. Alhoewel Vergeet-my-nie die laagste gereken is, is dit steeds 65% studente en bykans 90% ouers wat die koshuis as bevredigend beskou.

Vir die algemene atmosfeer in koshuise, netheid, verwelkoming het sowat 55% respondente dit as 'uitstekend' aangedui. Ander respondente het dit as 'goed' (sowat 33%) of 'aanvaarbaar' (9%) aangedui.

Bykans 60% respondente het aangedui dat die huiskomitee, koshuishoofde en mentors hulle veilig in die koshuise laat voel. Vir baie van die respondente was dit ook aangenaam om te weet dat hulle in bekwame hande gelaat is en het meer as 60% respondente hul koshuishoofde en komiteelede se bekwaamheid as uitstekend beskou.

"Al die koshuise is genooi om aan die meningspeiling deel te neem. Die uitslae wys vir ons dat die koshuisverwelkoming tydens die Gateway-eerstejaarsweek 'n groot sukses was. Hulle het baie moeite gedoen om studente welkom te laat voel en ouers op hul gerus te stel.

"One of the two most beautiful non-curricular programmes we are heading in the Office of the Vice-Rector: External Relations, are Project Inspire and the Culture of Reading Project.

"During school visits last year numerous principals identified that motivation was highly needed for learners as well as teachers. This is where we came in.

"We approached deans in our various faculties to identify top academic students to act as motivational ambassadors for our 25 schools in our Schools Partnership Programme. Faculties were thrilled to facilitate the process of students into this programme. We met with 26 learners who were more than happy to assist by giving back to their community.

"What makes the project special is that most of our students themselves have walked that road. They overcame their challenges and turned them around. They now work with Grade 10-12 learners by teaching them methods to face day-to-day challenges that have an effect on their studies.

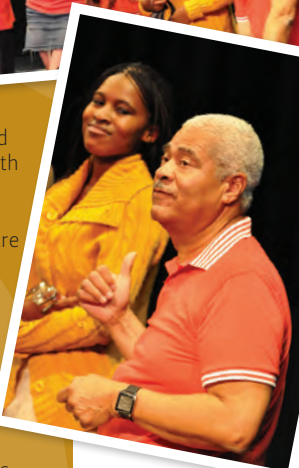
"Project Inspire, on the other hand, brings out the best in all of us. We managed to host an Easter Play on 8 April 2012 during the Easter weekend. We took one of our schools in our Schools Partnership

Programme and identified eight highly motivated learners in Grade 10. We linked these learners with our third-year drama students and professional actors such as Prof. Charles Dumas, visiting professor at the Department of Drama and Theatre Arts," said Tessa.

"We have so many tricks up our sleeve. We will soon start on one of our other projects at Dr Blok and Moroka High Schools, respectively. This is where we will instil an innate need for reading in learners. This will all be done through Project Culture of Reading.

"It is heartbreaking to see schools that have no reading resources or a ghost-library. Teachers are terribly overburdened, and to instil the passion of reading in them is another chore they do not get to.

"The problem snowballs as learners come to institutions of higher learning. You will find students who can hardly read, write or analyse a written text. We have identified two of our students who are assisting us by designing a model for reading programmes for the schools we partner with. Andrew Westover is a Fulbright Scholar from the USA, doing his Master's degree in Second Language Acquisition and Talita Calitz is a Ph.D. student in Higher Education and Social Justice. The School Partnership Programme is open to everyone on campus," Tessa concluded. – Phelekwa Mpono

Performance management **improves communication** between **service level workers** and **supervisors**

Once a week Evelyn Mabija meets with her team of workers to discuss what needs to be done for that week. At these meetings, the six employees who she supervises get the opportunity to discuss any problems they experience in the workplace. An important part of this is that everybody discusses what should be done to improve their job performance.

Evelyn, who works in our Residence and Housing Department, says they did not always meet like this. Since our university introduced performance management for service level workers, communication with the six women on her team has improved. The women are responsible for cleaning some of the residences on our Bloemfontein Campus.

Our university introduced performance management for service level workers in March last year, starting the process with three-hour workshops for supervisors of service level workers. Supervisors were taught how to communicate effectively with workers, help solve problems and assist employees to work according to required



standards. They also learned skills like how to conduct meetings.

"The aim of Performance Management is to improve service delivery and coaching by supervisors creates a rewarding environment in which employees are empowered to solve problems and prevent mistakes themselves", says Dr Renalde Huysamen, Head of Performance Management and Staff Development.

Mamokete Ratsoane, Deputy Director of Human Resources, who facilitated the workshops, says those involved were very supportive of the process. She says performance management for service level workers gives supervisors the platform to act without fear. "It also assisted supervisors to have a deeper understanding of work related problems of the members of staff reporting to them". The roll-out of the performance management process continues in 2012.



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Geboue op Bloemfontein-kampus trek 'n nuwe baadjie aan

Ons universiteit sit met 'n institusionele geskiedenis en tradisies van meer as 100 jaar. Só ook is daar 'n paar geboue op die kampus wat ooggetuie was van die wel en wee van menige student en akademikus. Die universiteit beplan om vir sekere van hierdie ou geboue weer 'n nuwe baadjie aan te trek, asook om ander geboue nuut in te rig met 'n heeltemal nuwe funksie.

Só 'n gebou is die Noordblok, wat tans klaskamers huisves en na verwagting teen Oktober vanjaar in 12 kantore omskep sal word.

Onder die geboue wat opgeknop word, is die Albert Wessels-ouditorium en die CR Swart-gebou. Die AWO met sy 196 sitplekke word in 'n hoër-

klas ouditorium omskep. Die projek is nog in die beplanningsfase, sê Louis Badenhorst van Fisiese Hulpbronne. Die CR Swart-gebou sal opgraderings ondergaan, wat onder meer verbeterings aan die ligte en plafonne in die ingangsportaal en veranderings aan die looproete na die gebou aan Justicia se kant insluit.

'n Opwindende toevoeging tot die fasiliteite van die Fakulteit Gesondheidswetenskappe in die Francois Retief-gebou is die inrigting van 'n wêreldklas simulatie-eenheid. Die projek sal na verwagting in November vanjaar voltooi wees.

In terme van studente-akkommodasie gaan bouwerk aan die twee koshuise op die Wes-kampus voort. Die koshuise saam sal aan 500 studente

akkommodasie kan verskaf. Hierdie twee koshuise wat tans gebou word, sal in Januarie 2013 voltooi wees.

Studente op ons Qwaqwa-kampus kan ook uitsien na 'n addisionele koshuis op die kampus. Die koshuis is ook nog in die beplanningsfase. Verder word daar ook opgraderings vir die Hoofingang na die kampus en die monitoringsfasiliteite op die Qwaqwa-kampus beplan, soortgelyk aan dié van die Bloemfontein-kampus, deur kameras en rooipaaltjies aan te bring.

'n Ander spogprojek wat in sy beplanningsfase is, is die Alumni-gebou. Die fasiliteit sal tussen die George du Toit-gebou en die Benedictus Kok-gebou opgerig word.

Together with the South African Nanotechnology Initiative (SANi), our Department of Physics was the co-organisers of the conference under the chairmanship of Prof. Martin Ntwaeaborwa.

The theme of NanoAfrica 2012 was "Nanostructured materials for social and industrial development", which was realised by cutting-edge presentations on topics related to front-line areas of nanoscience and nanotechnology. After a warm Free State welcome by the Dean of the Faculty of Natural and Agricultural

Sciences, Prof. Neil Heidemann, Prof. Lodewyk Kock from the Department of Microbial, Biochemical and Food Biotechnology, gave an excellent opening lecture titled, "A new nanotechnology for Biology".

A feather in our university's cap was when Prof. Martin was elected as the new Chairperson of SANi. Two students, Jack Madito (Ph.D. Physics) and Leon Wessels (M.Sc. Physics), were elected to serve in the executive council of the SANi student chapter, and three other students, GH Ndlovu (Ph.D. Physics), MM Duvenhage (Ph.D. Physics) and K Dithebe (M.Sc. Microbiology), were among the winners of student prizes for best presentations at the conference.

Not only did the conference provide a wonderful opportunity for networking and interaction, but it also gave recognition to our university as one of the contributors to global research in Nanoscience and Nanotechnology. – Prof. Martin Ntwaeaborwa

Prof. Frans Swanepoel moves on, bidding farewell



Research at our university has become synonymous with Prof. Frans Swanepoel who, after 10 years, is leaving our university to take up a post at Cornell University in the United States of America. The academic will join the Institute for African Development (IAD) at Cornell as a Senior Research Fellow. After serving two five-year terms as a member of the senior leadership for research, he says it is time to move on and make way for new energy. "At Cornell I will have the opportunity to re-establish my research career."

Prof. Frans is not getting into his new job right away. From August he takes a sabbatical for a few months to complete a book on the restructuring of agricultural education and training in Africa. The book is funded by the WK Kellogg and Rockefeller Foundations.

About the university he is leaving behind, he says he has been privileged to be part of the change process at our university.

"It was the most stimulating and rewarding part of my career thus far. When I was appointed as founding

Director for Research in 2002, the research function was mainly administrative. We developed the first research strategy, and moved the focus from administration to a much more nuanced and strategic approach."

Emanating from the research strategy were recommendations to establish an International Office, a Innovation and Business Development office, and the Postgraduate School. All three now acknowledged units. Other significant highlights include the allocation of three SARCHI Chairs to our university and the establishment of the Strategic Academic Clusters. This year is the first time in history the university hosts more than 100 NRF-rated researchers.

"I will look back on the past 10 years with pride and a sense of privilege at being given this extraordinary opportunity to serve the university and its community. It was both a personal and professional growth experience. The best years for the university are yet to come!"

With its No Student Hungry (NSH) Programme our university makes sure those young minds who cannot afford such a meal do not fall out of the higher education system.

An investment in the NSH Programme equals an investment in the future of our country.

The NSH Programme, founded by Prof. Jonathan Jansen, Vice-Chancellor and Rector, got fresh momentum with solid donations of more than R200 000 this year. Prof. Jansen donated R100 000 of the proceeds of one of his books (*We Need to Talk*) for this worthy cause. The programme started in 2011 with the proceeds of his book, *KNOWLEDGE IN THE BLOOD*.

The programme raises funds to provide food bursaries for needy students and give them daily access to a balanced meal. More than a 100 students are assisted with these bursaries. The students are selected on the basis of their financial needs, academic achievements, participation in student-

life programmes and commitment to give something back to the community.

It is estimated that between 10 to 20% of our students have insufficient nutrition on a daily basis. This means that quite a significant number of our future leaders cannot concentrate properly on their studies.

At a launch function at the beginning of 2012, Prof. Jansen said the NSH Programme is not only about creating a university campus that cares. "It is about creating a country where being human matters. Our students on the NSH project are amazing young people. They struggle to get by, but they have great potential and achieve good marks."

At the heart of the fundraising for the NSH Programme are Prof. Jansen's wife, Grace, and Dr Carin Buys, wife of Rudi Buys, Dean of Student Affairs. They are supported by René Pelserr (as Programme Coordinator) and various divisions at our university.

How does it work: Salary Advice

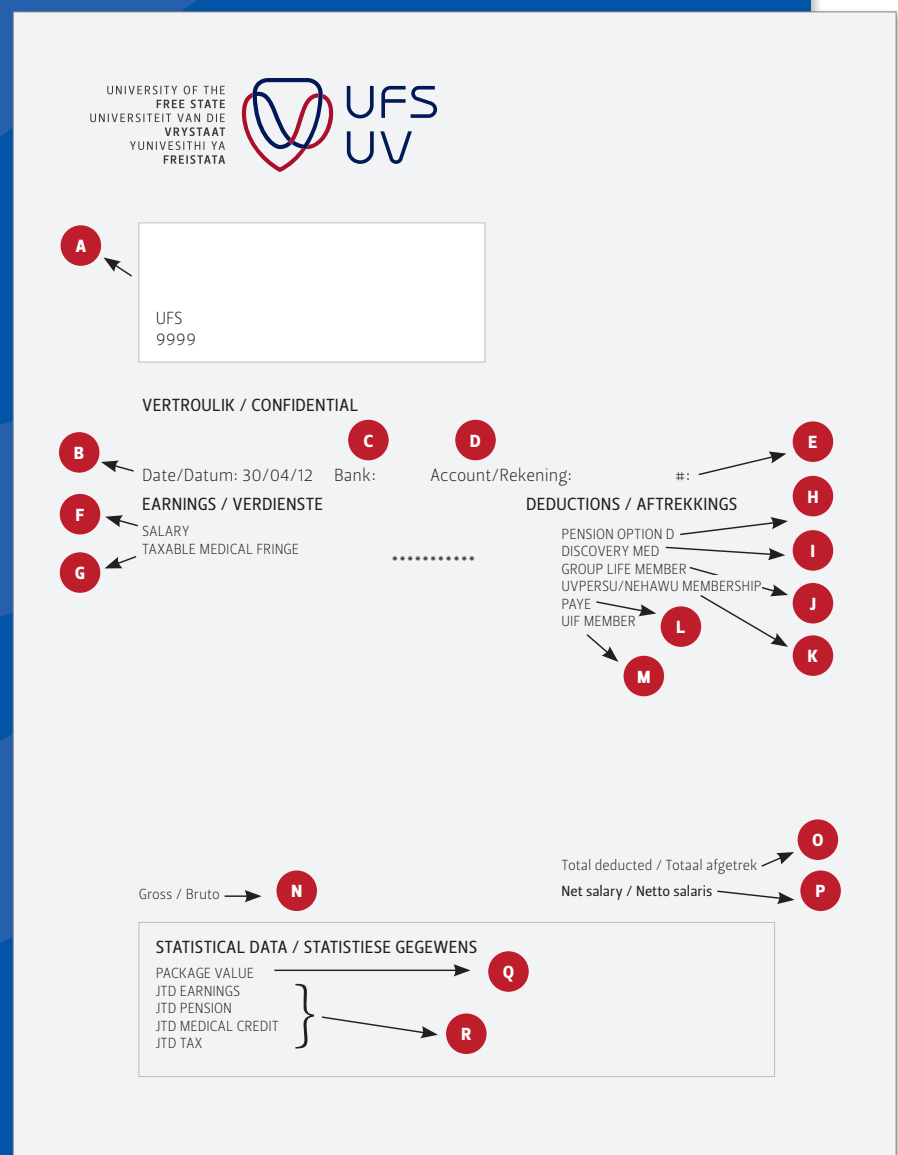

"At the end of my salary I always have a lot of month left."

Bottom-up. That is how most of us read our salary slips. Tearing it open the eyes goes straight to where it says net salary. That is the money reflecting in your bank account, money that has to settle accounts and stands between you and a couple of luxuries. But do you know what is further up on your salary slip? Do you know how they got to the amount at the bottom right?

Working through the salary slip this is the information you need to know.

- A - That is where your name appears.
- B - The date on which salaries will appear in employees' bank accounts. Pay days are normally the last work day of the month. In December salaries are paid in on the 20th. If the 20th is on a Saturday or Sunday, money will be paid into your account on the 18th.
- C - Your bank e.g. Absa, Standard Bank.
- D - Your bank account number.
- E - Your tax number.
- F - That is what you earn before deductions come off and includes allowances such as your housing subsidy.
- G - This is the taxable medical aid benefit.
- H - That is the amount deducted for your Pension or Provident Fund. It is calculated at 7,5%. The university contributes double the amount to your pension or provident fund (See copy of our *March Dumela*).
- I - Discovery/BestMed. It is the difference between your medical aid allowance and total premium.
- J - Group Life Insurance is calculated at 0,804192% of your salary notch (on the left of your salary slip).
- K - Union fees. Uvpersu/Nehawu
- L - PAYE - This is a statutory deduction and you pay according to the relevant tax year.
- M - Unemployment Insurance is another statutory deduction. It is calculated at 1% of your income and you cannot pay more than R124,78 per month.
- N - This is the total income before deductions are made.
- O - The total deductions. Everything on the right adds up.
- P - This is the amount after deductions.
- Q - This is your total remuneration package. Employer contributions are included.
- R - Accumulated totals for that specific tax year.

Meer as 2 000 studente is vanjaar in die program opgeneem en dit sal in 2013 met meer as 'n duisend groei wanneer studente in verlengde kursusse ook die UFS101-module moet aanpak.

Onderwerpe wat in die UFS101-module hanteer word, is:

- Hoe hanteer ons ons gewelddadige verlede? (Geskiedenis, Opvoedkunde, Politieke Wetenskap)
- Wat behels regverdigheid? (Regte)
- Is ons alleen? (Astronomie, Fisika)
- Het God regtig gesê? (Teologie, Filosofie, Teksanalise)

- Hoe groen is groen? (Chemie, Fisika, Nanotegnologie)
- Hoekom is die finansiële krisis "globaal"? (Ekonomie)
- Hoe word ons Suid-Afrikaners? (Antropologie, Sosiale Sielkunde)

Die module behels massa-lesings in die Callie Human-sentrum, wat opgegradeer is met die nuutste oudiovisuele tegnologie. Blackboard is die primêre medium waardeur die studente en leerfasiliteerders kommunikeer. Afsprake kan ook met die span van sowat 70 leerfasiliteerders gemaak word. Die kursus word in 'n byna papierlose omgewing aangebied.

Mallory sê die gedagte dat die universiteit 'n meer afgeronde student aan die gemeenskap kan lewer, maak hom opgewonde. "Die module bring 'n wyer en dieper insig oor 'n breë spektrum van onderwerpe by die studente tuis."

Die UFS101-span, met kantore in die Ou KovsieSport-gebou, is verantwoordelik vir die koördinerende van die projek, asook vir die saamstel en skryf van die studiegids.

Studente moet die module met 'n gemiddeld van 50% in die sewe assesseringsgeleenthede slaag om hulle kwalifikasie te behaal.

At your service is the Staff Health and Wellness Centre. The dedicated staff of the centre currently manages two support groups on the Bloemfontein Campus, namely the Depression and Anxiety Support Group and the Single-Parent Support Group.

"We started the groups due to the relatively high numbers of people with depression (anxiety is the flip side of depression) according to our medical-aid statistics. There are also a lot of single parents as the statistics are also generally high in the population.

"Those who attend are generally positive about the support being offered by our office. They initially requested monthly meetings, but our capacity unfortunately allows only for quarterly meetings. Small numbers of staff attend the support groups due to the more sensitive nature of the issues at hand," said Dr Annette Prins from the centre.

A person should attempt to negotiate a balanced and fulfilling life, pursuing optimal health, thereby allowing both themselves and the university community to thrive.

Staff Wellness has a remedial office where free psychological services are offered to staff by Dr Annette. They also have a small employee assistance programme (EAP) fund which may be applied for referrals to outside agencies according to set criteria. Some staff is also assisted with referrals related to financial problems and for legal advice. "We also manage a small emergency fund for staff that is experiencing severe financial problems in aid of either food or medical expenses.

"We as a team attempt to follow a healthy lifestyle; follow a developmental trajectory. Mostly we strive towards good time management and the competent support of one another," she concluded.

Vertel ons daarvan ...

Deur uiters sensitiewe optredes maak hulle 'n groot verskil in ander se lewens; of dit nou is om 'n reeksverkrachter vas te trek, of om 'n jong man die geleentheid te gee om opeenvolgende opehartoperasies te vermy, of net om eenheid onder studente te bewerkstellig. Karen Ehlers, prof. Stephen Brown en sy kollega, dr. Danie Buys, asook Richard Chemaly vertel ons die een en ander van hul interessante dagtake.

Karen Ehlers is tans 'n dosent in die Departement Genetika, waar haar navorsingsveld forensies, wildforensies en bewaringsgenetika is. "My navorsing het begin toe ek in 1997 by die Landbounavorsingsraad (LNR) se Dieregenetika-afdeling in Pretoria gewerk het," sê Karen.

"Ek is met 'n staatsaanklaer getroud wat daaglik betrokke is in die oorlog teen misdaad. Deur met hom en ander aanklaers te gesels het die belang van DNS-bewyse sterk na vore gekom. Verkrachters stop nie vanself nie, hulle moet gestop word. Die meeste verkrachters is reeksverkrachters en dikwels is DNS die enigste bewysstuk wat beskikbaar is. Skuldbevindings op verkrachtingsake is maar ongeveer 10%, wat beteken dat vir die 90% wat los kom, daar nog 'n slagoffer gaan wees. By die 2^{de} Interpol Suider-Afrikaanse Forensiese DNS-konferensie wat ek verlede jaar in Pretoria bygewoon het, is daar geskat dat daar tans oor 'n 1 000 reeksmoordenaars en verkrachters in Suid Afrika aktief is. Dit is 'n syfer wat my bang maak en persoonlik voel ek dat dit elke mens se plig is om 'n bydrae te lewer om misdaad te bekamp," sê Karen.

Tans fokus haar navorsing op menslike forensies naamlik molekulêre fotopassing. "Molekulêre fotopassing is waar jy van DNS-merkers gebruik kan maak om 'n persoon se fenotipiese eienskappe soos byvoorbeeld oogkleur kan voorspel. As jy dus DNS op 'n misdaadtoneel kry en jy gebruik hierdie merkers, kan jy 'n idee kry van hoe die verdagte gaan lyk," vertel sy.

Verder vertel forensiese bewyse 'n "onsigbare" storie wat van groot waarde is, veral omdat ooggetuies baie keer getraumatiseer is en daar gevind is dat hulle getuie is nie baie betroubaar is nie.

Wat is die een deurbraak wat Karen hoop in dié veld gemaak word? Vir Suid Afrika het dit baie belangrik geword dat tersiêre instansies betrokke raak by die opleiding van forensiese analiste. Ons universiteit was die eerste instansie wat in 2010 'n forensiese kwalifikasie – B.Sc. Hons, M.Sc. en Ph.D. in Forensiese Genetika ingestel het. Ek hoop die ander universiteite raak ook meer betrokke by forensiese navorsingsvelde en dat ons forensiese opleiding by ons universiteit kan uitbrei. Indien meer mense by die bekamping van misdaad betrokke raak, sal ons hopelik 'n verskil in hierdie land kan maak. – Leonie Bolleurs

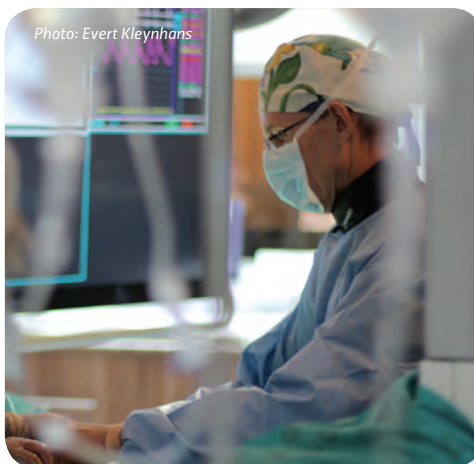

Prof. Stephen Brown and Dr Danie Buys from the Department of Paediatrics and Child Health implanted special pulmonary heart valves in two patients at the Universitas hospital earlier this year. This is the first time the procedure has been carried out in Africa.

The doctors both agreed that "it is a great honour and privilege to be part of a team, including the Department of Health and all the members in our team here at paediatric cardiology."

The Melody valve is a percutaneous valve, meaning it is implanted through a catheter from the groin of the person and then guided to the heart valve that goes to the lungs and then is implanted in the pulmonary position.

People who qualify for this type of procedure are usually children who were born with a specific group of inherited heart defects. This group of patients often needs recurrent open-heart surgery and this valve is implanted to avoid this. Dr Buys states: "One must remember that these patients need to weigh more than 30 kg and all of them had previous heart surgery."

The procedure can take up to four hours to perform and has several possible complications. Some of the procedural complications include dislodgement of the valve, coronary compression, rupture of homograft and haemothorax due to the pulmonary artery damages. Other complications could be due to operator inexperience and the early learning curve. This is however, "extremely rare, especially with pre-stenting and proper preparation of the landing site", Dr Buys said.

This is a rather new procedure in medical history. The first valve was implanted in 2000 and since then about 3 000 valves have been implanted worldwide. The development of the expertise and equipment needed to make this procedure a success may take some time. – Callie Hendricks

Earlier this year the Department of Zoology and Entomology at our Qwaqwa Campus received state-of-the-art research equipment valued at R296 400. The equipment was purchased under the national equipment programme of the National Research Foundation (NRF). It is called Loopamp Real-time Turbimeter and according to Dr Oriël Thekisoë, the Qwaqwa Campus is the only institution in the country with the equipment.

“This equipment enables us to use a DNA amplification technique called loop-mediated isothermal amplification. We will be able to develop lamp-assay techniques for diagnosis and application in epidemiological studies of various pathogens (bacterial,

fungal, viral and parasitic),” said Dr Thekisoë, Head of the Department of Zoology and Entomology.

“Lamp technique can also be used for diagnosis of pathogens in plants, specific identification of organisms, for example, insect species in entomology,” Dr Thekisoë concluded.

Two Master's of Science students at the Department of Zoology and Entomology are conducting lamp-based research for parasitic infections and will be able to improve the quality of their studies with this equipment. Researchers from other institutions are welcome to use the equipment at a low cost for maintenance purposes.
