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Research on sense of belonging provides opportunity to access campus climate

A project to assess the sense of belonging of members of our university community was conducted in November/December 2011 by the office of Prof. Driekie Hay, Vice-Rector: Academic. "One of the main objectives with the research was to develop an understanding of what sense of belonging means to the diverse staff and students of the university in the context of a transforming and transitional society and university. It also gave us the opportunity to assess the overall campus climate," said Prof. Hay.

Other objectives included the identification of the factors influencing a sense of belonging for staff and students and to propose specific key interventions in the short, medium and long term that are most likely to enhance a sense of belonging at the university for staff and students.

"With the survey we aimed to measure the current levels of staff and student sense of belonging and explore possible determinants of sense of belonging for staff and students in order to identify the determinants that have the greatest influence on sense of belonging. We also wanted to explore differences in the levels of sense of belonging across different groups of staff and students and explore differences in determinants of sense of belonging for different groups of staff and students," she said.

For the purpose of the study the following definition of sense of belonging was adapted: when members of the university community feel personally accepted, respected, included, supported and valued in the university's academic, social and physical environments.

Three perception surveys were conducted: with staff, undergraduate students and postgraduate students. Although

the participation of staff and postgraduate students was fairly average, the number of undergraduate students that took part was good.

Some of the findings of the research have shown that staff generally have an acceptable overall level of sense of belonging and it is the highest at the departmental level. Collegiality and good working relations have a very positive impact on sense of belonging and, for academic staff, interaction with students also positively impacts on this.

Another outcome is the positive sense of pride our postgraduate students feel towards the university with more or less three-quarters of respondents indicating that they would choose the university again and that they would recommend it to others.

Undergraduate students had a fairly positive perception of campus climate and were most positive about the attitude of their lecturers in promoting a climate of mutual respect. The students with the strongest sense of belonging, acceptance and pride were those from the South Campus.

No in-depth studies of sense of belonging of university staff at South African universities have been undertaken and therefore there is no benchmark against which to measure the results obtained in the survey. "It is, however, a valuable way of establishing the campus climate and to determine where interventions should be made," said Prof. Hay.

The survey was well received by the University Management as well as Council during its quarterly meeting on 14 September 2012. "In order to keep track of the perceptions of staff and students and to stay informed, an annual campus climate survey is envisaged," she said. The survey will be available on the Intranet once feedback is received from line managers.

The 20-year-old Karabo studies towards a degree in Information Technology Geographical Systems at the university. This year is his second year. He completed Grade 12 at the Martie Du Plessis School in Bloemfontein – a school catering for learners with conditions like his. Generally many able-bodied people would doubt his abilities and think he struggles to cope with his studies. However, he possesses the qualities and abilities to succeed. Getting a distinction in Geography this term is testimony to this.

“Studying technology fascinates me very much; yet I was only exposed to it in my first year at university. Technology was not part of our learning programme at school,” says Karabo.

He cites the will to succeed in all his

endeavours as the driving force in his studies. “To study at university is the best time of my life. I enjoy everything about my studies because it equips me with the knowledge required to live my dream. The course comprehends my true nature of being out and about, and liking to explore. 
“My Meidjie, loop leer mooi. Miskien kan jy een dag skryf van die goeters wat die vrouens so oorkom.”

As 'n predikant in sinodale diens in opdrag vir getuienis en vennootskap vereis dr. Gideon van der Watt se werk by die Sinodale Sentrum van die NG Kerk in die Vrystaat tans dat hy oor die landsgrens heen vennootskappe in die kerk verseker.

Of dit nou onder plaaslike gemeentes, met sustergemeentes in Suid-Afrika se buurlande, gemeentes in ander Afrikalande, of selfs met 'n gemeente in Japan is, sy hart borrel al jare lank daaroor.

"Ek is al oor die 30 jaar by die kerk betrokke," sê hy met passie in sy oë. "Ek het nog altyd oor grense gewerk en nooit net by een gemeente nie. Om die kultuur, taal en geografiese grense tussen gemeentes te verminder en so die liggaaam te verenig was nog altyd in my hart."

Dr. Gideon se hart om verhoudings en vennootskappe oor grense heen te bou is reeds destyds as 'n student aan ons universiteit gekweek,

al was dit in daardie tyd moeilik as gevolg van die Apartheidsjare.

"Ek het nog altyd 'n roeping gehad om mense vanuit verskillende kontekste bymekaar te bring. Dit was moeilik gewees in daai jare, maar dit is die kerk se roeping en nog niks het verander nie."

Dr. Gideon was al voorheen in 'n voltydse hoedanigheid by ons universiteit betrokke as lektor, maar vir nou is hy net hier as navorsingsgenoot in die Departement Sendingswetenskappe en slegs so elke nou en dan is hy in die klas te sien.

Judge Mahube Molemela is so much more than a simple law practitioner.

In fact, she is inspiring, living a balanced lifestyle as judge at the High Court in Bloemfontein, a mother, outdoor lover and alumna of our Faculty of Law.

Although not currently involved in any formal programme at our university, the university still occupies a very special place in her heart.

"My fondest memory at the university was when I became a lecturer for Introduction to Legal Studies," says the judge.

"This course was for first-year students and the class was rather big. On the first day of the lecture I provided students with my cellular phone number so that they could contact me whenever they needed help with the course. Some of the messages I received on the phone had absolutely nothing to do with the course and were truly amusing! I must say, I really enjoyed my interaction with the students back then and there was never a dull moment. Some of my old students are lawyers today and have even appeared before me as legal representatives. I suppose this

entitles me to say that I have made some meaningful contributions to society."

Now in the honourable position of High Court judge, she explains that nothing came easy at first. While her first love in matters legal was to practise as an attorney, for a period of a year after graduation she was jobless, having unsuccessfully applied for articles of clerkship at various law firms in Bloemfontein.

"If you ask me whether, as a law student, I ever aspired to be a judge, my answer would be a firm 'no'.

"None of this would have been possible, had I not met certain influential people throughout my life.


"The lesson I learnt from my own journey of life is that indeed, in a race, what matters most is not how fast you get off the starting blocks, but how well you finish it. Expressed differently, never let your shaky start determine your finish."

She believes in not placing too much focus on one specific facet of life at the expense of the other. Time with family or spent on travelling and hiking gives the necessary balance this judge needs in her life.

"As a family, we really enjoy the outdoors. We often go on hiking excursions, despite my phobia for snakes," she says.



David Johannes, School of Nursing: "Yes, I did attend the lectures because they offer one news on current issues and challenge one also to conduct further research on the topics addressed so that one can find solutions to the problems identified. The lectures are very informational and they enlighten a person."

Prof. André Wessels, Department of History: "Yes, I try to attend as many as I can, because it is important to get speakers across various disciplines to speak about various topics to stimulate debate. In doing this, we get knowledge and exposure to other important things. Lectures give you the opportunity to learn about the issues of the day and challenges faced by the world."

What you learn every time is to affirm your ideas on issues of culture or education. If not affirming it, at least start thinking about solutions to issues."

Jareer Bakharia, student: "Yes, I did attend a lecture because I wanted to interact with other people so as to educate myself and uplift my leadership skills."

Janie van der Merwe, Communication Science honours student: "Yes, I attend some of them, for example, the one about the American presidential elections. I attended that lecture because I needed information regarding my assignment and I learnt how political systems differ from country to country."

Dr Josefa Mohatlane, Department of African Languages (Sesotho): "Yes, I do attend, because as an academic, you get the opportunity to brighten the horizon of your knowledge. Seminars motivate you to enhance your research objectives and sharpen your method of teaching as an academic and they deal with important current affairs so that you can know what is happening within your immediate surroundings. I would encourage people to attend these seminars; people should see them as an opportunity to learn."



On 18 July 2012 the university celebrated former President Nelson Mandela's birthday with a R5 coin-laying ceremony. This event coincided with the GLS. The university was especially honoured by the visit of Archbishop Emeritus Desmond Tutu on this day. He took part in the Dialogue between Science and Society series hosted by Prof. Pumla Gobodo-Madikizela. Events of the day were reported in *Volksblad*, *The Star*, *Bloemfontein Courant*, *The New Age*, *Mercury*, and *Pretoria News*. The day's events were also covered on the SABC radio stations, *LesediFM*, *Ukhozi FM*, *SAFM*, *5FM* and *Lotus FM* as well *Cape Talk*, *OFM*, and *e-News*.
- Another big event was the 5th annual Charlotte Maxeke Memorial Lecture which our university hosted. President Jacob Zuma delivered the keynote address at the event, which officially opened the national Women's Month celebrations. The lecture attracted big names like Dr Nkosazana Dlamini-Zuma, Chairperson of the African Union, national Ministers Lulu Xingwana and Angie Motshekga, as well as Free State Premier Ace Magashule. *Public Eye*, *Volksblad*, *e-News*, *City Press*, *Sowetan*, *Daily Sun*, *Lesedi FM*, *Ukhozi FM*, *SAFM*, *OFM* all mentioned the lecture.
- In the run-up to the Olympic Games the South African Men's Hockey team had a training camp at our Bloemfontein Campus. The camp was run by Dr Derick Coetzee, Head of

our High Performance Centre. *Business Day*, *The Citizen*, *Free State Times*, *Volksblad*, *Die Burger*, *The New Age* and *Herald* reported about the conditioning camp.

- Writer Etienne van Heerden received an honorary doctorate in literature at our winter graduation ceremony. *Ons Stad*, *The New Age*, *Volksblad*, *Die Burger* and *Bloemfontein Courant* carried reports about the graduation ceremony.
- A host of acclaimed journalists visited our campus to take part in the Beyond the Spear seminar, discussing lessons South Africans learnt from the controversial Brett Murray painting. Justice Malala, political analyst and host of news show, *The Justice Factor*, Nic Dawes, Editor-in-chief of *Mail & Guardian*, Max du Preez, investigative journalist and political columnist, and Ferial Haffajee, Editor of *City Press*, presented their views and experiences. Ferial wrote a flattering opinion piece about the university in *City Press* after her visit, writing that our Bloemfontein Campus has a "global character and has become a jewel". Ferial said The Spear is art that is part of a rich cultural heritage of protest art and Justice said with the debates around The Spear painting, something died in South Africa. "The debate was taken away from us. We let politicians get to us."

Well-known author and political economist Moeletsi Mbeki also made his contribution to enrich the lives of scholars and academics with his talk about "The political economy of South Africa".

The university community was also honoured to host Rev. Frank Chikane delivering the Beyers Naudé lecture on our South Campus. His presentation was in line with the theme of the lecture, "Collaborative partnerships for social cohesion: Building a nation with ethics".



She encouraged women to live passionately and to let go of fears they carried with them. – Leonie Bolleurs



Computers their passion; give our Service Desk a call

It doesn't matter how long you have been with the university, you must have dialled the number x2752 at least once to report a computer-related problem or have somebody reporting it on your behalf. If you have wondered who the people are that come to the rescue just as you are about to blow up your computer,

forget the Hollywood version of the IT person. Erase images of the geek who plays computer games for hours.

Taking your phone calls is a dedicated team of professionals who know they are the first point of contact and that the image of a whole department depends on what service they give you. The people at our Information and Communication Technology (ICT) service desk take their job seriously and geeky they are not.

Take Thulani Shabalala, a musician who aspires to be a gospel minister one day. Starting as a field technician in our ICT department, Thulani now works as one of seven service-desk analysts. They are the people who take your calls and see that you perform your job with as little interruption as possible, the least of all a computer problem.

"I was not even an IT person; I got into it as part of a learnership. As I was doing it, studying it I realised this was wonderful. Now I love it."

That love he brings to the ICT service desk, making sure that when you hang up the phone after reporting a computer problem, everything is sorted out.

Sharing Thulani's love of computers is colleague

Johannes Coetsee, who believes in empowering users while talking to them over the phone. "You can do one of two things. You can talk to them and also explain how you do things. Give them a bit of training in the basic things."

At the age of 23, Johannes is one of the youngest in his department, but he is an old hand at computers, having taken his parents' computers apart at the age of 11 to see how they worked.

"I don't buy computers; I buy the parts and build them to my specifications," this IT boffin says.

He brings his expertise to the service desk, making IT as easy as possible for everyone.

"I always think about my mother; think why she doesn't understand. First, you have to get the user calm and then you can attend to the problem. It is the nicest thing when somebody is frustrated and you can solve his or her problem within 10 seconds. It makes you feel good."

Both service-desk analysts agree that patience and friendliness are important requirements for their job.

"You don't know to whom you are talking; whether it is a doctor or professor. You must have respect for everyone," Johannes says.


“Ons is susters,” sê Olga.

2012 Global Leadership Summit attracts students and scholars from around the world

From 8 to 20 July 2012, the university welcomed and hosted 200 students, academics and senior administrators from 27 universities in the US, Europe and Asia during its inaugural biennial Global Leadership Summit.

This two-week summit, with the theme, "Transcending Boundaries in Global Change Leadership", focused on international and critical dialogue in addressing salient issues of change leadership, diversity and reconciliation in Higher Education.

Participants attended lectures by eminent academics (including Fulbright Scholars) and prominent leaders addressing, among others, transformational leadership, social justice and globalisation. Staff, students and group mentors reflected on the various themes of the human capabilities required for change leadership as part of a formal learning programme. The programme also included visits to schools, communities and historical sites surrounding the university campuses in Bloemfontein and Phuthaditjhaba.

The summit forms part of the UFS Leadership for Change initiative, started in 2010, which annually provides 150 diverse students with a lot of potential with an opportunity to study abroad as part of a year-long engagement to develop change leadership capacity.

The university and its partner institutions continue this multidimensional programme to develop its global initiatives further. This includes various research programmes, global think tanks and co-curricular learning engagements.

Hoe werk dit: Verlof

Die universiteit is die akademiese instansie met die meeste verlofvoordele in die land, maar al sy werknemers is nie aldag bewus hiervan nie.

Daar is 'n wye verskeidenheid verlof wat by die universiteit geneem kan word, maar selfs net in die basiese vakansie- en siekverlof is die voordele baie ruim.

"Ons hoef slegs 15 dae vakansieverlof te gee, maar die universiteit gee tot 42 dae vir byvoorbeeld dosente en 24 tot 36 dae aan iemand in 'n steundienspos, afhangende van die posvlak," sê Susan van Jaarsveld, Adjunkdirekteur van Menslike Hulpbronne.

"Ons hoef net 36 dae siekverlof oor 'n siklus van drie jaar te gee, maar die universiteit gee tot 120 dae.

"Almal kwalifiseer vir vakansie- en siekverlof. Wat mense geneig is om te vergeet is dat vakansieverlof slegs weeksdae is, terwyl siekverlof kalenderdae is wat afgetrek word," sê sy.

Slegs indien 'n persoon langer as drie dae siek is, hoef 'n mediese sertifikaat ingedien te word. Volgens Susan is 'n algemene probleem die gevalle waar daar nie bewyse ingedien word vir watter tipe verlof ook al nie.

Personnel kan ook nou self vir vakansieverlof op die selfhelpdiens van die universiteit se intranet aansoek doen. Dit is vir alle werknemers met toegang tot 'n


werksrekenaar en skakel die lang prosesse van vorms inhändig uit.

Verder is daar ook drie dae 'n jaar deernisverlof, begrafenisverlof van twee dae per geval, kraamverlof, navorsingsverlof, eksamenverlof en spesiale verlof beskikbaar.

"As iemand vir die universiteit oorsee gaan, kry hul byvoorbeeld spesiale verlof," sê Susan. "Dit is omdat personeel dan met kampusangeleenthede besig is, maar nie op kampus is vir werk nie.

"In gevallen van studieverlof kry onderrigpersonele van ses maande na 'n jaar om hul Ph.D. klaar te maak," sê sy.

Jeanet Conradie, first female professor in Chemistry

Being the first female professor to be appointed shows that South Africa is changing, and that the traditional men's world is achievable for women as well," said Prof. Jeanet Conradie, from the Department of Chemistry at our university. "I suppose it is special. All my lecturers were male: from my first year in 1977 till my Ph.D. in 2000. I never had a female lecturer."

Born in Bloemfontein, Prof. Conradie is a driven career woman with a M.Sc. in Physics and a Ph.D. in Chemical kinetics, electrochemistry and structural aspects of ferrocene-containing B-diketonato complexes of rhodium (I) and iridium (I). Her career thus far includes spending six months as a post-doc at the Department of Physical Chemistry, University of Tromsø, Norway during 2002-2003. She has 91 academic publications in print, three technical reports, delivered 16 lectures at conferences and has several poster contributions to international conferences. One of her career highlights includes being under the top 10 researchers at the university in terms of publication output units (POUs) since 2009. On her wish list for the future is "a higher NRF rating, to maintain a high research output and to be a devoted lecturer and study leader for my students". As a bright and inspiring woman "my main vision in life is to serve my community as well as possible. To achieve this I continuously strive to improve my abilities and to widen my knowledge. I believe, you either make progress in life, or you lag behind."

Although atoms and molecules, "the building blocks of the world", intrigue her most about chemistry, Prof. Conradie also agrees that chemistry within a romantic relationship should exist: "Cuddle a chemist and see the reaction!"


As an academic Prof. Conradie agrees that it is important to keep setting goals for yourself that encourage continuous progress. "To reach a goal, you have to utilise opportunities that come your way, have confidence in yourself and be realistic: climb the mountain step by step. Department of English helps improve teaching at schools

Attempts by the university to improve the standard of English teaching and learning at schools have proven to be successful with our Department of English again hosting a workshop for high school teachers this year.

Approximately 100 schools' teachers in the Motheo District of the Free State attended a workshop at our South Campus to upgrade their skills and knowledge on teaching various aspects of English to secondary school learners.

A partnership between the Department of English and the Free State Department of Education saw the teachers learning strategies on how to teach poetry, short stories, essay and paragraph writing. The teachers, most of them English second-language

speakers, will take the knowledge back to their classrooms.

It was the second time our university presented the workshop. The first workshop was presented in February 2011 and the schools' participating indicated a change in the results of their learners.

Mango Maqeba, Subject Advisor for English in the Motheo District, said they received an overwhelming positive response from teachers. "Teachers are challenged in school teaching-learning situations, and to ensure that they are not left behind, we looked to interested academics from the university, especially the Department of English, who are ever-willing to assist by volunteering their services even on a Saturday."



Die alloksiering van parkeerplekke sal deur die universiteitsbestuur bepaal word. In nie-geerveserde parkeerareas geld die beginsels van eerste kom, word eerste bedien.

Kovsies heading Euro Bursary programme

Our university is very proud of its most recent Erasmus Mundus Bursary programme, also referred to as the EU-SATURN programme (European-South African programme in Tuning for Regional Needs in Higher Education).

Erasmus Mundus is a to-and-out of Europe scholarship project, which mostly attracts scholarships to Europe. Yet in 2010, following serious groundwork, about 2 million Euros were made available for South Africa to become a part of the attraction. This was the result of great intergovernmental relations.

Erasmus Mundus aims at the development of a comprehensive approach to internationalisation demands of South African universities as part of ongoing transformation processes in higher education in South Africa.

In this recent programme where a total of 12 universities exchange either students or staff for studies in any discipline aligning to a national focus, our university serves as the coordinator in consortium with the applicant University of Groningen.

"The existing relations between the two universities helped," says Dineo Gaofwe-Ingram, Assistant Director at our university's Office of International Affairs.

"Beyond the basics of managing the project, we are also involved in marketing, selecting and making proposals for as many applicants as possible."

Students and staff – even non-academic staff – at our university qualify for the bursary. The first and foremost criteria are obviously academic.

"The question is asked what value studying overseas will add to the course," Dineo says. "If all applicants meet the academic criteria and selection needs to be made from a large group, the next phase will be to determine which disciplines are more important in terms of the national focus," she says.

"We have had two Erasmus Mundus projects we are very proud of in Antwerp in Belgium. The second project, although initiated in 2011, will see seven students and two staff members from this university leave now in August/September to study in Antwerp."



Raymond makes huge impact in short space of time

It seldom happens that a player makes such a huge impact on a rugby field in such a short space as Raymond Rhule did in 2012.

After just three matches for the Free State Cheetahs in this year's Currie Cup, some pundits predict it will only be a matter of time before he becomes a Springbok.

Earlier in the year he was still playing for the Shimlas' Young Guns (Under 20) in the Varsity Cup.

He was later called up to play for the Shimlas' senior side where coach Jaco Swanepoel picked him as a winger for the first time in his career.

Rhule had previously played outside centre and fullback.

Although he did not get much game time for the Junior Springboks in the International World Championship in June, when he did, he made it count.

In the semi-final against Argentina, he scored two scintillating tries within the space of two 12 minutes after coming on as a replacement.

What impressed about both tries were the superb angles from which he ran.

He was the only Free State player in the South African squad and describes the win over New Zealand in the final as the highlight of his career thus far.

Being selected for the Cheetahs' first outing in the 2012 Currie Cup, little was known about this "Black Diamond", as assistant coach Hawies Fourie refers to him.

However, afterwards everyone would have taken notice as he scored his side's only two tries and being named the Most Valuable Player for his coaching staff. Not bad for a 19-year-old in his debut game.

Raymond is the first one in his family to play rugby. At the age of six he moved from Ghana to South Africa with his family.

"I was introduced to the sport in the hostel in Bloemfontein where the boys often played touch rugby. I would like to introduce my little brother (4) to rugby as well when he's a bit older," Raymond told *Dumela*.

In die laat-tagtigs was een van my universiteitsvriende, Barry, in 'n rolstoel. Met elke klas het Barry iemand gesoek wat hom by die trappe op te help dra, oor randstene te lig, en teen die einde van die dag help om by die plek te kom waar hy opgelai kon word.

Wat 'n wonderlike verskil is dit nie vandag op die kampus nie. Nie alleen sien die Eenheid vir Studente met Gestremdhede om na fisiese behoeftes in terme van geboue nie. Oor die afgelope tyd het studentebehoefte toegeneem, en het die sentrum al meer geleenthede vir studente geskep. 'n Gesprek met 'n man van een van die studente wat deur die sentrum ondersteun word, som die werk van die sentrum op: "Ek is hulle ewig dankbaar, as ouer vind ek hulle werk besonder waardevol vir my kind."

Die verskeidenheid van studentebehoefte waarmee gwerk word, is verstommend. Daar is die studente met fisiese gestremdhede soos serebrale gestremdheid, veelvuldige sklerose en Spina Bifida. Ander studente is gehoorgestrem, wat wissel van doof, doofwordend tot hardhorend. Siggestremde studente wissel van swaksiende studente tot studente wat blind is. Dan is daar studente met leergestremdhede wat ADHD en disleksie insluit. Gegewe die verskeidenheid

waarmee die sentrum werk, is dit heel insigwend om by hulle kantore in die ingangsportaal van die UV-Sasol-Biblioteek te gaan inloer.

Wanneer mens instap by die kantore van die sentrum is daar 'n positiewe energie wat uit gesellige werkssessies weerklink. Dit is redelik duidelik uit gesprekke met Hetsie Veitch en Martie Miranda dat hulle voel hulle roeping om hier te wees. Om 'n verskil te maak.

En wat 'n verskil maak hulle nie!

In klasse waar dowe studente is, poog hulle om elke keer 'n tolk wat gebaretaal verstaan beskikbaar te hê. Hetsie self is betrokke by verskeie aanbiedings wat dosente en selfs studente meer bewus maak van moontlike behoeftes van studente met gestremdhede. Soms kan eenvoudige aanpassings 'n reuse verskil maak. 'n Dosent wat 'n siggestremde student in die klas het word net daarop attent gemaak dat, wanneer hy/sy op die bord skryf, hulle ook moet sê wat hulle skryf. Klein dingetjies wat 'n reuse verskil maak.

"Die wonderlike daarvan wanneer mens vir mense met gestremdhede voorsiening maak, is die feit dat nie alleen die gestremdes baat vind nie," merk Hetsie op. "Jy bou 'n rolstoeloprit, en skielik kan die ouer wat pakkies aflewier dit ook gebruik, ook die ouer

persoon met seer knieë, of iemand wat 'n baba in 'n stootwaentjie stoot." Hetsie se passie om 'n verskil te maak is duidelik uit haar geanimeerde gesprek en die stories wat sy vertel. Soos die student wat met moeë oë en 'n dik bril in een van die klasse gesit het. "Die student het nie eers geweet sy kan ekstra tyd in die eksamen kry nie, en dat ons van haar werk kan vergroot nie. En sy was al besig met haar honneurs!"

Uitdagings is daar baie. Hetsie lag wanneer sy vertel. "Jong, daar is kopieregwessies wanneer ons byvoorbeeld notas in braille vertaal. Sommige dosente is bekommern oor hulle intellektuele eiendom, en ander is weer nie geneë daarmee om hulle klasse te laat opneem nie." Die uitdagings hou ook nie hier op nie. "Baie studente voel dat wanneer hulle leerprobleme het, hulle nie as gestrem wil beskou word nie – dan kom soek hulle nie hulp hier nie. Selfs die semantiek is 'n uitdaging. Dis mos nie 'n skande om hulp te kry as jy swaarkry nie."

Dis wanneer mens uitstap dat jy besef dat hierdie span nie gestremdhede as uitdagings of probleme beskou nie. Vir hulle is gestremdhede geleenthede.

Prof. Jo van As

Die jaar 2012 is 'n besondere jaar prof. Jo van As, Hoof van die Departement Dierkunde en Entomologie aan ons universiteit.

Sy departement vier vanjaar sy eeufees en hy is self al vir 'n kwart van daardie jare by Kovsies. Boonop het 'n lywige publikasie waaraan die afgelope vyf jaar gewerk is, met hom as koördinerende outeur, die lig gesien. Die boek, *The Story of Life & the Environment – an African perspective*, is deur Random House Struik gepubliseer. Daar word gewerk aan 'n Afrikaanse weergawe en die boek sal ook in e-formaat beskikbaar wees.

Dumela het Jo en sy span in die Okavango-delta vasgepen om 'n paar vroeë oor die boek te beantwoord (Terloops: Hulle moes 'n stywe afstand loop en onder 'n boom gaan sit waar 'Wi-fi' is om die e-pos te stuur!).

Waar het die gedagte aan die boek ontstaan?

Omdat daar 'n behoefte bestaan aan 'n ekologieteks wat handel oor Afrika-voorbeeld. Daar is goeie teksboeke oor ekologie, maar dit is alles voorbeeld uit die noordelike halfond. Die idee het gegroei, totdat die boek van Terrence McCarthy en Bruce Rubidge – *The Story of Earth and Life* gepubliseer is. Nadat daar met hulle 'n gesprek gevoer is, is daar besluit op 'n boek wat aanvullend daartoe is. Hulle boek is hoofsaaklik vanuit 'n paleontologiese, antropologiese en argeologiese perspektief geskryf, en hierdie boek is vanuit die biologiese perspektief geskryf, met 'n Afrika-perspektief.

Gee 'n blik op die omvang van die werk.

Dit was 'n enorme projek, waarvan niemand werlik die omvang in die beplanningsfase besef het nie. Die boek beslaan 450 bladsye, met 11 hoofstukke, 750 foto's en 200 kleurryke illustrasies en met meer as 20 kaarte van Afrika. Feitlik al die kaart-illustrasies was reeds voltooi toe Suid-Soedan onafhanklik geraak het, en daarna moes die kaarte daarvolgens aangepas word.

Wou jy iewers die taak opgee?

Ek was nooit bereid om op te gee nie, want daar is geweldig baie in die projek belê. Daar was wel dae wat ek gewonder het of ek stapelgek was om dit aan te pak! En aan die einde, hoe het dit gevoel om die eindprodukt in jou hand te hou?

Dit is werlik 'n hoogtepunt van my loopbaan, en dit is veral lekker omdat daar ook binnekort 'n Afrikaanse weergawe op die rakke gaan wees. Die boek is ook in elektroniese formaat beskikbaar. Die idee was ook om dit so toeganklik as moontlik te maak, en ons kon met finansiële hulp vanaf prof. Jonathan Jansen ook daarin slaag om die boek baie bekostigbaar op die rak te kry. – Leatitia Pienaar

Prof. Meintjes made the SKA project more tangible for the ordinary person. Even then, some of the information was too complex to grasp. Fundamental questions that will be answered with the knowledge gleaned from the SKA relate to the birth and evolution of the universe – especially the era of re-ionisation after the big bang when the first generation of massive stars ignited.

The telescope's superior sensitivity and resolution will enable it to probe into the darkest corners of the Milky Way galaxy to search for newborn stars and planets.

The telescope, consisting of 3 000 dishes, will give access to deep and dark areas of the universe. It will be so strong that the equivalent of a radar signal at an airport can be detected 50 light years away. It has 10 000 times the exploration capacity of existing telescopes.

The amount of data processed and transferred daily to researchers is staggering: the SKA is going to generate enough data in a 24-hour period to fill 15 million 64 GB iPods. The central computer will have the processing power of 100 million modern personal computers. The optical fibre used will be long enough to wrap around the earth twice.

All eyes are on South Africa with the construction of the SKA telescope at Carnarvon in the Karoo. The world will also be taking note of the quality of scientists and engineers trained at South African universities. Some of these students studied at our university. – Leatitia Pienaar
